

Dear Sir—The Coroner's office is a veritable factory for the manufacture, or suppression of evidence in personal injury cases. The average citizen considers the coroner's office a rather unimportant and useless office, while the street railway, steam railroad, other public exploiting corporations and the grafting rich regard it as a very important one from the standpoint of saving money at the expense of the surviving dependents of killed persons. The examples to prove this office to be of practically sale benefit to the man-killing corporations, although maintained by the public treasury, are so numerous that I will give only two of them. A man of 52 years was killed by one of two speeding, street cars coming from opposite directions. Matters were so arranged that the children of the deceased could not find any witness in their favor. Even one of the bellboys of the Pfister hotel claimed to have witnessed the accident and testified for the company. The children could not prove anything and did not get anything.

Some time ago another man was killed by the man-killing-and-crippling street railway at South Milwaukee. An inquest was held. The company did not offer anything to the widow, who retained then a lawyer. The lawyer stepped into the coroner's office, were immediately at work to settle with the widow, and did settle for \$300. If space would permit I could relate to you innumerable horrible cases similar to this, but I sincerely trust that the cases you have indicated in last week's Herald will arouse the indifference of the citizens of Milwankee county to this very important office, where the welfare and perhaps the very existence of a number of widows and orphans depend upon the careful and impartial investigation of the causes of such accidents.

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
