#### And Now Milwaukee Also Has Its Dreyfus Case By Victor L. Berger.



R. WILLIAM COLBY RUCKER, the health commissioner of Milwaukee, a young man of great usefulness and of na-tional reputation, was arrested upon the charge of one Kath-

crine Heisdorf—a sexual pervert and an evidently mentally unbalanced woman. Dr. Rucker was accused of bastardy.

The case, with all the revolting details, as invented by the imagination of the woman and embellished by the district attorney, was printed in the daily papers. In fact the story was set up and put into cold type a few before the warrant was issued. One paper, the Germania, even came out with it about four hours before the warrant was served.

It created a most unparalleled sensation, not only in Milwaukee, but everywhere where Dr. Rucker's name was known.

This was on Sept. 10, A. D., 1910.

But on Sept. 24 District Attorney McGee was asked by the writer of these lines-who upon his return from Copenhagen, at the request of Mayor Seidel, had investigated the affair-at once to dismiss the case and to resign. It had soon become clear that the case was an infamous fabrication.

The District Attorney dismissed the case the same morning, after the

demand had been made through the newspapers.

However, instead of at least acknowledging his fearful blunder, he read into the court records a story about an alleged miscarriage. This he did without giving any opportunity for evidence in the defense and without trial, to cover up his contemptible act, and also to protect his accomplices. Nor was the woman brought into court, although she was discharged from the hospital a day later-because she was absolutely well.

As for the details of the case, and its impossibilities from a medical point of view, I refer to the investigation made upon order of the United States government by Major J. O. Cobb, surgeon of the United States Health and Marine Hosiptal Service, which report is reprinted in another

We will simply take up a few of the other aspects.

Let us begin with the personnel.

Who is Katherine Heisdorf? She is a notorious woman and a sexual pervert, as the District Attorney could have found out if he had taken a few hours' time for investigation.

During the last year she has accused about half a dozen different prominent men of bastardy. At three various times since last fall she claimed to be pregnant. She went under various aliases to innumerable physicians of this city asking them to commit abortion upon her. She was pulled out of a house of ill fame once this year and the man with her was fined \$22.50—this is a matter of court record. And she spent about two months last fall in an insane asylum, because it had been found that she suffered

Yet upon the testimony of this woman District Attorney McGee arrested Dr. William Colby Rucker a few weeks after the alleged illicit intercourse was supposed to have taken place - when no medical authority in the world could have stated whether there was any pregnancy, even if the

Moreover, the only interest the state or the county has in all such cases is that the child shall be properly cared for and not become a charge

And therefore the law clearly intends that all cases shall be settled out of court and without publicity if possible.

There were over 300 cases in the district attorney's office this year, many of them involving very prominent and wealthy men of this com-munity. In all these cases the evidence was there, in other words, the

And yet, not in a single other case was there any agrest or any publicity.

But in the case of Dr. Rucker, where the main evidence was missing where there could possibly be none, the district attorney and the judge went right ahead with the arrest.

And in order to bolster up the story, district attorney McGee and a judge of the Civil Court, John J. Gregory, scoured the town in an automo-bile until they got a scrap of paper which they considered would fit in as

And on the strength of this, they gave the whole story to the daily

For the so-called evidence of District Attorney McGee was not merely outbreak of the imagination of this degenerated woman, but also a chain s, fabricated to make up a sensation.

The main "evidence" was a registration in a hotel of "R. Notman and," which a so-called Milwaukee hand-writing expert declared to be the writing of Dr. Rucker.

Now, this so-called expert has fallen down before. And if the case had ever come up in the courts, there would have been a dozen other experts ready to testify that the hand-writing did not at all look like Dr.

And the truth of the matter is the doctor never was in that hotel and never heard of it.

### The Progressiveness will Depend on the Red Goblins

OBERT M. LA FOLLE TTE is a man of unusual talent and ability. He is in every respect a much superior man to Roosevelt.

There is no danger that La Follette can be bought or influ-

enced by anything or by anybody except by his own ambition. But there is of course that danger. La Follette's overwhelming victory in Wisconsin has cleared the road

for him to the Republican nomination for the presidency-the ambition of his life. I sincerely hope that he will reach it, for personally I have the kind-

liest feeling for Ropert M. La Follette and for Francis E. McGovern. However, I will also say that La Follette will then find his limitations. He will learn that the capitalist system can not be changed from within, not any more than a man can pull himself out of the mud by his own hair.

Nevertheless, the platform which La Follette dictated to his convention last Tuesday is a most remarkable document. The framers have taken as many planks from the Socialist platform as they possibly could and stay within a capitalist party."

They have especially plundered our political demands—the demands for democracy in the political field. Several of these cannot be introduced without a thorough change in our constitution.

Of course, even in the political field La-Follette does not go far enough. For instance he does not stand for the abolition of the Senate-being a senator himself. Yet in his primary election campaign he adopted the Socialist habit of

calling the Senate a "millionaire club," where Guggenheim represents the smelter trust; Aldrich, Standard Oil; Depew, Railroad; Smoot, Sugar; Dryden, Insurance, and so on down the line. But as a student of constitutional history La Follette ought to know

that the Senate was established for the purpose of representing wealth and vested interests.

The Senate is a check upon any uprising of the people against the domination of wealth-otherwise the Senate has no function.

However, this we will forgive him, because for the first time in the history of the Republican party he made some economic demands.

So, for instance, the workingmen's compensation law and that losses from injury be borne by the industry-although I am sorry that Mr. La Follette did not also include an old age pension plank, which was put into the national Republican platform in the convention in Philadelphia in 1900, at the instigation of that great Republican leader, Marcus A. Hanna, in order to take the wind out of the sails of the Socialists.

The Republican state platform also stands for better factory legislation of course, as far as the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association of Milwaukee, which is the backbone of the Republican party in this county, will permit,-and for an investigation of the conditions in city and county to eliminate waste, to promote co-operation and to reduce the cost of living.

We make an especial note of this, because we will be sure to remind the legislators in Madison of this plank in the platform, which is a good plank, as is also the plank demanding the retention of title to coal lands in Alaska, and asking the Federal government to own the railroads there.

But why only in Alaska, pray? And not also in Pennsylvania, and in
Iowa, and in Wisconsin, and in other states? What is a good thing for

Alasks ought to be a good thing for the rest of us-And the demand for the amendment of the anti-trust laws, to permit organizations of farmers and workingmen, the state and national income

tax, the state aid to highways, are also good demands. And I only hope when the Republicans make a new platform, and especially a national platform, that they will take a good deal more from us. And especially that they will carry out these measures

Of course, all of these, fall fearfully short of any of the Socialist immediate demands, because they do not go to the root of the system and leave untouched the upas tree which bears the poisonous fruit.

Moreover, whether the Republican party of Wisconsin and of the nation will ever attempt to carry out even such platform pledges as they have made this year, will depend entirely upon the strength which the Social-Democratic party will develop this fall.

The leaders of the Republican party in their speeches openly admit that these demands are dictated by these leaders' fears of Socialism and of the Social-Democratic party.

These leaders point towards Milwaukee and what happened here last

spring, and they say to their followers, "You be Progressive, or the goblins will get you!" Now, if the Social-Democratic Party of Wisconsin grows considerably in its vote this fall—if the Social-Democrats elect their county ticket in Milwaukee—elects many representatives to the legislature—and particularly elects two congressmen—then the Republicans of the state of Wisconsin

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

Heretofore a million and a half trade unionists have paid into a common fund a shilling annually to be used for political purposes. A man named Osborne, a railway employe, and one of the old school of "pure and simplers," doubtless put up to it by the capitalists and old party political leaders, brought suit to prevent the organization of which he is a member from levying and using money in politics. The case was fought through all the courts and finally the house of lords ruled in favor of Osborne. Following this decision capitalistic political heelers in a dozen other organizations secured injunctions to prevent any more money from being paid into the Labor party treasury. As it costs an average of \$5,000 in each district to pay the election expenses of a candidate and then \$1,000 a year salaries to members of parliament, the Labor party finds bankruptcy staring it in the face. The Labor party is paying the wages of 30 members in parliament at present, and is said to have enough money ahead to defizy that expense for about a year and a half, and Citizen.






