

HE following interesting paragraphs are taken from a letter written by Henry George at the time of the death of Karl Marx, and are worthy a place in Socialist scrap

"I never had the good fortune to meet Karl Marx, nor have I been able to read his works, which are untran-slated into English. I am conse-quently incompetent to speak with precision of his views. As I under-stand them, there are several imporstand them, there are several impor-tant points on which I differ from them. But no difference of opinion can lessen the esteem which I fee for the man who so steadfastly, so patiently, and so self-sacrificingly labored for the freedom of the pressed and the elevation of the




