MILWAUKEE, WIS., U.S. A., AUGUST 12, 1911 Washington Letter

(By National Socialist Press.) Washington, Aug. 9-"Within a year you will have to make up your minds on the subject of old-age pensions," declared Victor L. Berger, the Socialist representative, on the floor of the house to-day. "You will have to determine where you stand. A mighty wave of demands for the pas-sage of some such law will roll in from every section of the country, and the issue will have to be met."

Berger obtained unanimous consent to address the house on old-age pension legislation. He spoke about fif-teen minutes. At the conclusion of his address he was applauded by mem-bers of both old parties.

"In the life of the toiler." said Ber-"there are weeks, and sometimes months, of enforced idleness, weeks of unavoidable illness, losses from cheating and swindling, and then, as age creeps on, from about his forty-fifth year, a constantly declining capacity to earn, until at 55 or 60 he finds himself helpless and destitute.

"There is hardly a more pitiful tragedy than the lot of the toiler who has struggled all his life to gain a competence and who at 60 years faces the poorhouse. The black slave had no such tragedy as this.

"Any toiler who has faithfully labored for a meagre wage for twenty years or more, has created vealth than a meagre pension in old age can repay. Every toiler produces more than he is paid. Otherwise he would not be employed. It is a condition of the capitalist order of society that the employer must get the lion's share of the product.

"The word 'pension' is thus a mis-nomer. The payment ought to be called either 'partial restitution' or old folks' compensation. The Socialist representative took ce-

casion to attack the pension schemes now being established by various corporations. He said:

"In order to gain a pension from a corporation it is necessary for the workingman to the himself to the corporation for life. In order not to lose the pension the workingman or working woman must be satisfied with his or her wage, laboring conditions and hours of labor. This subservience makes the laborer virtually a serf or slave and establishes a new feudalism.

"The second objection to private old age beasions in that the system smacks of charity It causes the worker to feel that some one owns him. The private system results in the bestowal of too much power in the hands of the employer over his workers."

In the course of his remarks Berger included his statement which he issued to the press at the time of the introduction of his old-age pension bill. Berger also inserted for publication in the Congressional Record the supreme course decision of 1868 which admitted that congress has superior powers to the courts.

From press clippings received by Berger it is evident that the public is greatly interested in old-age pension, legislation and in his efforts to secure the enactment of the same.

On the presentation of the facts in the case by Berger, Secretary Nagel of the department of commerce and labor, has granted a stay in the deportation order against Theodore Markoff, the Russian political refuges held at Ellis, Island.



Jailing the Workers

Organized labor in Los Angeles is fighting bravely against this incoming rush from across the seas. And here the political and the economic strug

During the past year 400 workingen in Los Angeles have been thrown into jail. At one time seventy work ingmen were behind steel bars because they had dared to speak other workers. 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

"Those two young men operating the two magnets from the cages of those traveling electric cranes are now doing the work it formerly required twenty-five men to do the foreman of the department in re-

Socialists cannot too earnestly repu diate and discredit such ideas and their advocates. In the co-operative commonwealth when any person is suspected of having committed murder, rape, arson, theft or other crime, he will be tried before a judge and jury, and if found guilty, locked up, the International Socialist Review to the contrary notwithstanding. Of course, all Socialists hope for a time when the "administration of things" will have made a "government of persons" unnecessary, but it will take generations of Socialism to raise the numan race to that high level, if it ever does, and we shall continue to employ judges and policemen as long as we find them necessary.

All expenses of said commission for all time in which said commission shall be actually engaged in this in-vestigation, shall be paid out of any unds in the treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated, on a certificate of the chairman of said commission, who shall be selected from the membership of the commis-sion named under this resolution, and the sum necessary for carrying out the provisions of this resolution is hereby appropriated: Provided That the total expense authorized by this resolution shall not exceed the sum of \$15.000, which shall include the compensation herein authorized

OBSTRUCTION OF STREET RAILWAY TRACKS

Many of THE MILWAUKEE ELEC. TRIC RAILWAY AND LIGHT COM-PANY'S serious troubles in the operation of its railway lines are caused by obstruction of its tracks. In most cases this might be avoided.

The Public requires that street railway service shall be regular and prompt. Any failure in this respect causes general impatience and complaint, and the company must take the blame.

Operation of the whole street railway system of Milwaukee is regulated by time schedule. Any interruption of that schedule causes confusion and trouble for the company and inconvenience for the Public.

It is of great importance to the People of Milwaukee as well as to the company that the cars shall be run at regular speed and with regular intervals between them.

Many of the Milwaukee streets on which there is the most travel are very narrow-Even if every vehicle using those streets were handled with the greatest consideration for other traffic there still would be some congestion at times.

A motorman cannot turn his car out to go around a coal wagon or moving van or load of merchandise. He must wait until his own track is clear.

Owners and drivers of other vehicles should consider this and as far as they reasonably and properly can should leave the street car tracks unobstructed for the running of the cars.



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

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

Milwaukee's New Poor List - Only 700 Are Assessed on Moneys and Credits, Although State Says There Are 22 Millions of Intangible Property Here—Many Erasures—Other Startling Facts!

In St. Louis the other day a wealthy woman dies and the probate proceedings showed her to have died possessed of (besides real estate holdings) a total of \$152,000, made up of notes, stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit, cash, etc. Out of curiosity the St. Louis Socialists looked up her assessment for moneys and credits on the books of the tax commissioner's office and found that her personal property had been assessed at \$2,700. And on this assessment, knowing, as she of course did, that it was grossly fraudulent, she paid her taxes. She was a "leader" in the respectable set of the city, yet she was a miserable thief, a swindler of the city and a disgrace to the very thought of civic

Swindling at Home

Only Half Pays

Under-Assessed!

Another example of the intelligence and sagacity displayed by the assessors, is shown in the assessment of the Random Lake Ice company. This company is located at o64 Locust street in the Twenty-first ward, and their ice house stands on the west bank of the river, directly north of Locust street bridge.

The personal property assessment of this concern is as follows: Horses, 38, assessed valuation, \$9,500; wagons, 25, assessed valuation \$2,500; stock, \$7,500; all other personal property, \$500; total, \$20,000.

The stock represents the ice which was in storage on the first of May. As they sell 2,000-pound books for \$6 and 1,000-pound books for \$4, a very conservative estimate of the market value of the ice while in storage would be \$4 per ton of 2,000 pounds. This would mean that on the first of May they had in storage 1,875 tons of ice, according to the assessor. With their equipment they deliver at least 250 tons per day. This would mean that their season lasts about seven days! Anybody can see the absolute absurdity and incompetency of this assessment.

As a matter of .act their icehouse, which even at the present time is about two-thirds filled up, has a capacity of about 15,000 tons, and the as-sesament, instead of being \$7,500 for their stock, should be at least \$50,000 -that is for the stock on hand on the first of May.



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
