Thereafter, for the next two years, the party of the working class will have on representation in the national legislature. Berger will stay at his desk here until the last minute of his term, which will be the minute before 12 noon of March 4. On March 5 he will leave for Milwanbee, and tor the next two years will divide his time 'tetween his duffes as editor of The Milwankee Leader and traveling workers to return a strong delegation of Socialists to congress in 1914. That Berger has achieved an extraordinary record in the copitalist party, held by millions of people of the country. Berger's hills, resolutions and speeches have opened

On Feb. 13 a resolution was submit-ted by Berger demanding an investi-gation of the post office censorship, which is being used arbitrarily by mi-nor officials to limit and harass a free press. The particular instances which brought forth this resolution were the indictment of the editors of the Appeal to Reason for that paper's expose of conditions in Leavenworth prison, and a very recent case in which the post office suppressed an article in the New York Call dealing with sea hygiene. 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by Bosses' Orders Y BOSSES Uraers NEW YORK CITY--Sensational developments are forecasted when the grand jury takes up the charge that thraham Steinberg, business agent of the Buttonhole Workers' union, was murdered as the result of a con-spiracy of the manufacturers, because of his activity in the clothing strike, as the result of which nearly every concern in the trade was tied up. — Four leading clothing manufacturing contractors, Max Orenstein, Max Weisberg, Louis Weinstein and Abraham Fiolkoff, are in the Tombs, committed without ball, by (oroner Feinberg, charged with having instigated the murder. The coroner clothing contractors, through the confession of Harry Wagner, who admits the slaying. — Detained as the go-between in the case is Anabelia Fiolkoff, young and pretty daughter of Abraham Fiol-koff. Wagner charges that she carried messages from her father and his associates, demanding that he black-jack and beat up Steinberg because he was too active in enforcing the strike rule, and later to the juit, promising him support.

Koenig and Bernard Sander, today declared that the Wagner confession was part of a compiracy to force the clo hing manufacturers who have not asceded to the uni-n demands, to give in. They said they would obtain release of their clients by habeas corpus proceedings. The charge that these men instigated the killing, how-ever, has stirred the ranks of the clothing makers' unions, and it was stated today that efforts will be made to se-cure confirmation of the Wagner confession.
