Haledon was today the scene of another monster demonstration in favor of the Paterson strikers and the I. W. W. The injunction, "Go to Haledon" seems to be followed by an everincreasing number of persons. The attendance of this afternoon surpassed even that of last Sunday in size. One estimate is 30,000 present. As for enthusiasm, it was more in evidence than ever before. This was due to many reasons. In the first place, the police have, during the past week, acted with their usual high-handed, unlawful and unconstitutional methods. They prohibited the strikers from meeting in Helvetia and Turn Halls, on the ground that they were disorderly persons in disorderly assemblage.
