Birth Control Economics

We once knew a Marxian who warned his exclusive disciples against the man who was so straight theoretically shat he fell over backwards practically. Some of this Marxian's survivors are now indulging in that performance in a manner that proves that their great master has lived and ded in vain. One of them says of birth control: "If small families become the cheered thing, the workers will be control to the cheerer." All of which does not accessarily follow. Small families mean a decreasing labor supply with increased labor demand and wages. It is large families that mean cheap living, because they mean cheap wages.

Says the same disciple of the illustrious Marxian further:
"Poverty has its roots in exploitation and not in large families."
That is true; but it is also true that large families help to accentante both the exploitation and the poverty. The workingmen with large families cannot fortify themselves for the struggle against exploitation and want as well as the workingmen with small families can.

We are also told that "With developing capitalism the workers' condition cannot help but get worse, and birth control will not stave it off. The only remedy that will be of benefit to the workers is to abolish capitalist production and appropriation, and institute social production and appropriation instead institute social production and appropriation instead with the control is intended with the control is intended with the control is intended with the control in the creation of some of the forces and aid in the creation of some of the conditions that will make the abolition of capitalism more possible.

But, when one stops to consider the wide-spread resort to hirth control now going on, as we know, for practical, social purposes, and dictated by the same wage system so learned referred to by our Marxian friend, one wonders after all whether it was worth his while to discourse so profoundly against an all-pervasive social tendency. It sure looks like a case of being so straight theoretically as to fall over backwards practically.
