Scattle, Wash, April 26.—The end is now in sight of the case of Thomas H. Tracy, the workingman charged with murder by the Lumber Trist of the Northwest. The result of his case will soon be known to the workers of America and the world; and from that result we may judge the probable fate of the other 72 workingmen awaiting trial on a similar charge. The effects of Everett's Bloody Sunday-have-been far sweeping. This case and the Mooney trial have both served to awaken the workers to the ruthlessness which the masters will try to crush organization and stifle Free Speech.

Ex-Citizen Deputy Testifies.

Last Saturday the stand was taken by Jöseph Schoßield, who was a witness for the defense. Schoßield was working in a shingle mill in Eyerett at the time of the tragedy and was practically forced by his employers into joining the so-called citizen deputies. On the night of October 30, when the deputies were rounding up some workingmen who had come to Everett to hold a meeting, in the darkness Schoßield was mistaken for one of the Free Speech advocates and was badly beaten up by his own associates. He received from "Governor" Clough, prominent mill-owner and open shop supporter of Everett, \$75 to compensate him for his injuries. He stated that Sheriff McRae and the deputy who assailed him were both drunk that night.

The emancipation of the working class is impossible without the abolition of the wage-system. Industrial freedom means the complete negation of exploitation. In order to be free, the workers must put a stop to social parasitism—the exploitation of man by his fellow-man—for all time. The I. W. W. is organized and is fighting for this very purpose. Kick in.

A labor organization stands either for the working class or against it. There is no middle ground. Either it is an enemy of Capitalism or a supporter of it, either loyal to the workers or traitor to them. And anything less than complete loyalty is greason. Men like Sam Gompers, Viviani and Walling will go down in history as the Judases and Arnolds of the Labor movement.

The well-fed labor-skates who turn the workers over to the boss in times of peace with contracts and agreements would logically turn them over to the ffurderous butchers of Wall Street in time of war. It's perfectly natural, and it has happened just that way.

If the great American Scissorbill would wash his face and clean bis finger-nails he'd lose the only part of "his country" he ever had to fight for.

Only by organizing into One Big Union can the workers prove themselves strong enough to DEMAND the full product of their labor. Only by lighting unceasingly against the hideous System of Exploitation can they prove themselves WORTHY of having the full product of their labor.

Freedom of the press and of speech and of assembly are far more worth fighting for than the fabled "freedom of the seas." The U-boats of the Kauser aren't half as dangerous to the workers of America as are the clubs, guns and slugshots of the private armies of the master class at home. The place to fight for your country is on the job.

Capitalism, blinded with lust, drunken with power and swollen with the bloody increase of its own crookedness, is staggering to its doom to the time of patriotic airs. It is stumbling to its downfall, deafened to the wails of the millions beneath its feet by the plaudits of whores, the panegyrics of idiots and the roar of sixteen-inch guns. But the I. W. W., despised, ridiculed and persecuted, is patiently, stubbornly, ceaselessly "building the structure of the new society within the shell of the old."
