ENSLEY, Ala.—Over 2,000 men were cut off at the Ensley T. C. I. plant last Thursday. Out of the whole plant only one blast furnace is run-ning. All the rest and all the open hearth furnaces are cold. The report orkers are milling thru the streets of Ensley daily wondering what to do, where to turn for relief. The great T. C. I. company which has piled up millions from the work of these men, far from helping them now, lacked even the decency to give the men one day's notice of the great

The Community Fund is busy with preparations for a new drive for funds and is refusing to help the men laid off who were forced to contri-bute thousands of dollars to the fund when they had jobs.

Textile Workers In Elizabethton Want Red Union

Evizabethton, Tenn, As time goes on conditions grow worse in and around the big rayon mills here. Only recently one union was' told at the employment fice that there was no use for him or any other union people to apply for work, that not a damn one of them could ever again work there. At the same time they are hiring people from other states.

With winter coming and hundreds t of employment we see no way to get by unless we can organize a fighting unit of the T. U. U. L. and stay with them until all the workers get justice. The old saying: "Katey hyp-red the door" dor't apply here.

The A. F. of L bosses who said to e workers: "No more relief, take whatever is offered you," took what was offered them and left with it. As none of them have ever been back we judge they must have gotten a good sized pile, else they would have been back for more. No meetings are being held. The members who stood thru it all have become disgusted and hung up the fiddle and the bow. So far as the A. F. of L. is concerned we are now in the millenium. The A. F. of L. fakers came into

lizabethton in April, 1929, and were leading the strikers. to a complete victory, as we thought. The mills com-pletely closed down and business was tied up. At the Basis of Lynch Law

Lynching is not some "evil" separate and apart from the whole evil of the capitalist system. It is part and parcel of the whole system of capitalist exploitation,

Any ruling class, which exploits the masses in the manner in which 12,-000,000 Negroes are being exploited in this country, must have resort to all manner of terrorism to "keep the nigger in his place." In other words, to keep him chained to the wheel of profit. Lynching is the most extreme and brutal form of terrorism used against the Negroes. Actual lynching by rope, stake and gun, by some mob of white hoodlums usually led by white busi-ness men, is not, however, the only form that lynching takes. There are many more subtle and deceptive methods, covered with the cloak of dem-ocracy, in which lynch law takes its toll. Under the guise of "fighting that horrible lynching evil" the courts are being made to function more effect-ively against the Negroes. A Governor Gardner can make himself seem more "humane" by offering a reward for the arrest of a lynchmob leader and or-erding an investigation which he knows will bring no results, but at the same time make lynch law serve its function by giving it a legal flavor. Thus, in one week, the state of North Carolina executes 15 Negroes. Lynchings are becoming too uncomfortable for the ruling class for they arouse too much revolt among the workers, both white and Negroes. Therefore, let's do it legally, by putting the mark of approval of the state on every lynching! Continually, every minute of the day, the whole system of segregation

and jim-crowism functions as a lynch law process in a thousand and one ways, making the Negro suffer all forms of humiliation and persecutions. Making the Negro seem like a lower form of humanity, who for some reason or another have not yet attained that degree of higher white civilization which finds such keen delight in all the delicacies of lynching, makes it that much easier to give him lower wages, the dirtiest work, take his crops away from him, fire him. And if the Negro revolts there is lynch law to deal with

The increased wave of lynchings this year over last year-there have been more than twice as many lynchings thus far this year than during the whole of 1929—is a reflection of the increased misery of the masses due to the crisis and their revolt against these conditions. As the bosses clamp down the iron fist of exploitation harder, so must they wield the lynch rope more often.

The prowing realization of the white workers, under the pressure of the stark reality of unemployment and wage-cuts, that any attack upon the Negro masses is an attack directly upon them also, has already hewed a great hole in the wall of segregation. The Communist Party, since its entry into the South, has played no little part in breaking thru the bosses' lynch law system, by exposing it and organizing Negro and white workers together.

The fight against lynching is a part of our whole struggle against capi-talism. Only by defeating capitalism, by smashing the whole lynch law system, can we do away with lynching. No worker must be fooled by the com mission of "white supremacy" professors and editors such as recently form-ed in Atlanta, to "survey the lynching problems." Their results, if any, will to perfect the legal lynching system, and utter a few words about the 'horrors of lynching,'

These votes express the determination of over four and one-half million German work-'s to fight against the oppression of the German bosses and their American boss directors and put an end to the rule of capitalism in Germany.

Since the world war the life blood of the German workers has been sucked dry by their bosses who have made them pay the toll of \$900,000,000 year ly in reparations, thru wage-cuts, speed-up and unemployment. The bigges bosses of America, the best planners of exploitation—Owen D. Young, J. P Morgan and General Dawes—have foisted their newest blood-sucking Young plan on the German masses, and strengthened and prolonged the bonds of the Versailles Treaty, which has split up and dismembered Ger-many. The workers remembered well that the German Socialist Party voted for the Young Plan and came to an understanding with the capitalists to pave the way for a wholesale reduction and even abolitios of the social in surance for which the workers fought so hard, in order to make possible the payments demanded by the Young Plan. The result was that the socialists lost 10 seats in the Reichstag and over one-half millions votes. The bosses of Germany are now losing faith in the ability of the socialis

part to misdirect the workers into an acceptance of exploitation. It is not long er so easy for the socialists to fool the workers. To take their place the bosses are giving the place of honor to the National Socialists (Fascists) protecting them and arming them in preparation for the decisive battle

which will not be fought in the Reichstag, but on the streets. The elections are not decisive, althe they show the growing power of the Communist Party and indicate which way the wind blows. The solution for getting rid of capitalist oppression lies in the final struggle to smash the entire capitalist apparatus and set up a German Soviet Republic. Towards this end the German workers are traveling. As a part of the international prole-tariat, the American workers must help their fellow workers in Germany gain victory by constructing the revolutionary unions, by building the Com-munist Party in this country.
