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War Moves On Soviet Union Growing N. A. A. C. P. DENIES PATTERSON FLOOR AT CONVENTION

Pickens Causes Arrest of Eight **Chicago Workers**

Mrs. Janie Patterson, mother of one of the Scotsboro boys, was denied the floor at the National Convention in Pitsburgh of the National Associ-ation for the Advancement of Colored People, which claims to be "defending the boys." The N.A.A.C.P., which is respon

sible for the retaining of the Klux lawyer and drunkard Roddy, who helped to send the boys to the electric chair, thus again gives proof to the workers that it is not at all interested in saving the boys, but in cooperating with the boss men of the South in sending them to the electric chair.

Just like Rev. Bowens of the Chattanooga Ministers Alliance and Dr. Stevens of the same outfit, they are calling directly upon the police to break up the mass defense movement led by the International Labor Defense and the League of Struggle for Negro Rights. The N.A.A.C.P., is also directly cooperating with the police. On charges signed by the faker, Oscar DePriest and officers of the N. A.A.C.P., branch in Chicago, eight workers were sentenced to six months in jail for heckling William Pickens at a meeting. After Wm. Pickens was thru vicously atacking the Committee and the mass defense movement and calling upon the Negroes to have faith in the Alabama lynch court which has already sentenced the boys to the electric chair, workers in the audience demanded the right to John Shabrook to act with him. speak and expose his lies and slander. Pickens and other Judas' present immediately called in the police and the workers arrested.

All the mothers of the boys are now already in the North or on the way to speak at large meetings and demonstrations organized by the I. L. D. and the League of Struggle for Negro Rights. CHARLOTTE, N. C .- An open ain meeting of the Young Communist League of Charlotte was attacked Monday night by a group of hood lums dressed in a peculiar black uni form with white trimmings. The meeting took place at the foot of Eighth St., and the rats in uniforms were too afraid to come close to the young workers so they took up a stand on a hill close by and began throwing huge rocks and bricks down on the meeting in an atempt t break it up.

The speaker, Dave Doran, contin-ued the meeting while about fifty young workers present answered the assault by throwing back even largeer rocks. The skunks on top of the hill were determined to hit the speaker as they kept on throwing rocks for about fifteen minutes until two young work ers took up a stand close by the speaker and pointed guns in the rection of the rats on the hill. Under cover of the defense put up by the young workers, two young girl work-ers went up the hill in the direction of the rats and before this determ ined advance the spit-lickle tools of the bosess fled.

The meeting was continued to close and was extremely enthusiastic. Many young workers present, particularly the young Negro workers, were won over entirely by the Lea-gue. Many joined. The meeting ended with the singing of "Soldarity" and the waving of fists in the direction of the fleeing rats. This is the second time, meetings of the YCL have been attacked by bosses tools on this cor ner. Each time they were chased away.

ALA. BASTLLES **USE 'PERSUADER' ON PRISONERS**

New Orleans, La.

Dear Comrades: I just returned from a start I made the Unemployed Conference held in Washington on February 10. I was thrown into jail for three months. I want to tell you about the rotten conditions that prevail in the Alabama prisons.

There are about 25,000 prisoners in that state. If they are not totally disabled they must perform hard labor from daylight to dark, which is fourteen hours a day. If one goes to the doctor, he is given enough medi-cine to make him sicker than he was; they are not allowed to "lay up" less they have a temperature of at 104 degrees. I have seen men working when they were so sick they staggered like drunken men. If they failed to do their work, the warden has what he calls a "persuader;" it is a strap that weighs nine pounds. All of the prisoners have a mortal 1 "licks" at one time, and the victim usually goes to the hospital after he has been beaten.

Riding freight trains, or being cut of a job, are common "crimes" that will get one 60 and 90 days in Alabama. And then they have guts enough to talk about convict labor in the U.S.S.R.

Danville Workers To Fight Again Under NTWU Lead

350 workers were added to the already mounting army of the unemployed recently when the Riverside Mills No. 1, closed down indefinitely There are now close to 5,000 unemployed workers in Danville. In spite of this being the so-called busy season unemployment is constantly or the increase.

Two years ago, according to the Chamber of Commerce figures there were more than 7,000 textile workers here in the Danville mills. How ever, today, instead of the 7,000 workers normally employed, we find only a little more than 3,000 mill workers, according to the best estimates. And the majority of these are on part time with greatly reduced

Before the present system of inhuman speed-up and stretchout was put into force the limit for the workers in the weaving department the running of 16 Draper looms of 28 inch width. Now they run 32 Draper looms of 36 inch width. The speed-up in the other departments has been equally great, and in some instance much wose. This new system of speed-up was initiated by the efficien y experts which the company began employing about two years ago. Af ter each new stretchout, there inevit able followed a wage-cut. The more work turned out the less the workers received in wages.

The Enemy Comes

Naturally the workers were very much dissatisfied with their already miserable conditions getting worse They were ready to follow any one or anything that promised relief. Gorman gang and their UTW outfit, union such as the National Textile ever ready to prey upon the disconent of the workers, were soon on the job. With rosy promises and poisonous lies of their past achievements they began to sign up workers by the hundreds.

The final big story about having an agreement with the company, effected thru the cooperation of Mr. Flippin a university professor and a relative of the presi dent of the Dan River Mills, and coal Baron, Mr. Morgan, was Gorman's last grand gesture to further fool the workers, and if possible keep a few of them blinded and paying dues to his fake organization.

A Lesson Well Learnt

The Danville strikers were as milia bunch of workers as on the picket line. Against the police, the professional strike-breaking National Guardsmen and the peristent advise of the UTW officialdom, these strikers battled militantly and cessfully, for weeks kept scabs out of the mills. And today the majority of these strikers realize they lost the strike thru the treachery of the UTW eaders. They still believe in a Union. But they have learned their lesson well. Thy want no more of the fake AF of L. They now know the difference between this bosses sell-out machine and a real red-blooded labor Workers Union. These workers prove they have learned by the fact that they are now joining the NTWU. They are preparing for the next big battle, for they know it is coming.
