National Executive Committee

November 12, 1912.
To the National Executive Committee.
Dear Comrades:—The vote on the resubmitted motion by Irvine that the National Secretary appoint a territorial secretary for Alaska for three months, and that \$100 be appropriated toward his expenses, resulted as follows: Voting Yes—Haywood, Hillquit, Irvine and Spargo; the others not voting. The motion is therefore adopted.
Before the appointment is made an attempt will be made to secure the consensus of opinion of the Alaska comrades as to who should be appointed.
On November 7 the following motion was sent to you by wire:
"Motion by Spargo: I move that the books and the accounts of the National Campaign Committee be immediately audited and with auditor's report be transferred and accepted by National Secretary, that the account of the Campaign Committee be entered as part of regular party account. Vote by wire."
All members of the committee voted Yes. The motion is therefore adopted.
The owners of the building in which the National Office is located desire to know whether or not we want to continue to occupy our offices here after April 30, 1913. I have delayed the matter a couple of months, thinking that you would hold a meeting soon after election. But our assuming some \$10,000 or \$12,000 of debts of the Campaign Committee makes it impossible to take up any new work soon. It will also probably be necessary to set aside 20 or 25 per cent of the dues to meet the expenses of the meeting of the National Committee next May. It is also probable that the Lyceum Department will need considerable of additional financial assistance. Under the terms of the new National Constitution a stenographic report of all discussions taking place in your meetings must be taken and published, which will probably cause each meeting to cost a thousand dollars, more or less, according to the length of the meeting. Under these circumstances I take it that you are not likely to meet soon, and I therefore wish to place this matter before you by correspondence.
At present we are sub-tenants. The second floor costs us \$2,250 per year, and the third \$2,500. The owners will rent these floors to us beyond April 30, 1913, for \$2,400 each per year. We can have them for one, two or five years. If taken for one of the shorter periods, it is possible that the rent would be increased at the end of such period.

It is impossible to know at this time whether we will want additional room for a printing plant or otherwise. All other floors in the building are already rented beyond April 30, 1913. The place is well suited to our purposes. If not taken now, it will no doubt be rented to others. I recommend that we take these two floors. Kindly let me know your opinions as to whether we should rent them or not; and, if so, for what length of time. It is necessary that I have this information soon.
The Lyceum Department will occupy the space vacated by the Campaign Committee. With a growing Lyceum Department, a new Information Department, an additional translator-secretary and increasing need of room for storage, files, etc., we need both floors.
The following communication has been received from Translator-Secretaries Armin Loewy, Hungarian; N. Juel Christensen, Scandinavian; Joseph Corti, Italian; Joseph Novak, Bohemian; Frank Petrich, South-Slavic, and J. W. Sarlund, Finnish, with a request that it be transmitted to you:
"We earnestly urge your speedy action on a matter which we think is of great importance to the Socialist movement.
"Down in one of the darkest corners of the civilized world, in the Balkan peninsula, a bloody war—a wholesale butchery of the unawakened masses of working people—is going on. Tens of thousands of our unfortunate brothers, Christians and Mohammedans alike, have already been massacred on the altar of Mammon, to the joy of plutocracy. Thousands of Greeks and Turks, Armenians, Servians and others in America are being induced and transported by the agents of capitalism to defend "their countries," to take the places of their butchered brethren in the long-planned-for work by the European powers to drive away "the sick man of Europe." It seems at present that the allies are more successful than was expected at first, and the powers are likely to intervene at any hour, and, according to the latest dispatches, two American warships are now speeding to the scene to care for the American missionaries and, of course, to protect the American interests.
"The International Socialist Bureau at Brussels has issued a manifesto to arouse the people to protest against this war, and protest meetings have been held everywhere in Europe. Similar meetings are being arranged for in some parts of the United States, mostly by the foreign-speaking So-

cialists, and one is to be held in Chicago on December 1, but the National party has not made any move in that direction as yet.
"In this respect we would suggest that you authorize your National Secretary either to issue a manifesto in the name of the Socialist party of the United States or to republish the manifesto issued by the International Bureau and send it to the Socialist press."
Please give me your opinion on this matter.

"I move the National Secretary rent the two floors for two years.
"I move that the National Secretary republish, as the expression of the Socialist party of America, the manifesto issued by the International Socialist Bureau."
November 29, 1912.
To the National Executive Committee.
Dear Comrades:—Herewith is submitted amendment by Spargo to Irvine's motion in regard to leasing space for National headquarters:
"That we renew our lease, for one floor only, at the present rental for one year.
"Comment: It seems to me that it would be a big mistake to contract for both floors for a period of two years. The time has come, in my judgment, to consider seriously the whole question of party headquarters' rental. Why should we pay an annual rental of \$4,800? Would not three or four times that sum pay for the erection of a suitable building in some less expensive place than Chicago?
"In my judgment, we ought to renew the lease for one floor only for one year. Then we should elect a small committee of two or three comrades (I would suggest Comrade Goebel and Comrade Dan White for the service) to make a thorough investigation of the facilities available in a number of cities with a view to the removal of our headquarters from Chicago. With such a report before us it would be possible for us to make some very definite suggestions to the new National Committee at its first meeting."

Dear Comrades:—Herewith are submitted for a vote of your body motions Nos. 7 and 8, proposed by Maurer of Pennsylvania, and supported by Hogan of Arkansas; Bes-

semer, Clifford and Eby of Ohio; Fuller of Pennsylvania, and Noble of Texas:

Motion No. 7: "That the National Secretary be instructed to discontinue lease of present headquarters at a rental of \$4,800 per year, beyond the time when the present lease expires, April 30, 1913."

Motion No. 8: "That a representative of the National Committee be elected to investigate the possibilities of Springfield, Ill., and Indianapolis, Ind., as location for National headquarters."

Comment by Clifford (Ohio): "I agree with Comrade Maurer that \$4,800 per annum is more than the movement can afford, and that some other city, where moderate rent could be secured, would answer the purpose as well as Chicago. What would thus be saved in rent would enable the party to pay its National Secretary a few hundred dollars more in salary. Considered from the viewpoint of responsibility, executive ability and labor performed, our National Secretary is the poorest paid official in the United States."

Motion carried.

Motion by Simons: That the next edition of "Madam, How Will You Feed Your Family?" be published as a grocery poster.

Time for comment closes November 25; vote closes December 1.
Voting yes: Simons, Brewer, Berger.

No action taken.

Composite motion by Berger, Twining and Simons:

We move that our International Correspondent, Meta L. Stern, be instructed to communicate, by motion or by letter, with the proper international officials urging that the last Sunday in February be set aside as International Woman's Day.

Time for comment closes November 25; vote closes December 1.

Voting yes: Berger, Twining, Simons and Branstetter.

Not voting: Lewis and Carr. Motion carried.

Motion by Berger: That Comrade Ida Crouch Hazlett be given credentials as a fraternal delegate to represent the Socialist Woman's Committee; provided, however, that no expense accrues to the Socialist party.

Time for comment closes November 25; vote closes December 1. No action taken.

Whitehead, Kansas: Reports committees organized at Baxter Springs, Galena, Skidmore, Wier City, Pittsburg, Humboldt. This closes Comrade Whitehead's work in Kansas.

PROPOSED REFERENDUMS EXPIRED.

That proposed by Local Abbeville, La., that a committee composed of Berger, Clifford, Haywood, Hickey, Hillquit and Spargo be authorized to formulate and agree on a definition of the word "sabotage" and that said definition be published in both Weekly and Monthly Bulletins for the guidance of locals in trials of members accused of advocating sabotage, first published in the Weekly Bulletin of September 7, expired November 6. Number of members in good standing represented by seconds, 174.

That proposed by Local Toledo, Ohio, to recall Berger, Harriman, Hillquit and Spargo from the N. E. C., first published in the Weekly Bulletin of September 7, expired November 6. Number of members in good standing represented by seconds, 1141.

That proposed by Local Hamlin, Tex., relating to amending the land plank and the Fourth Political Demand of the National Platform, first published in the Weekly Bulletin of September 14, expired November 13. No seconds received.

That proposed by Local Paducah, Ky., to recall Berger, Harriman, Hillquit, Spargo and all other members of the N. E. C. that supported the motion to suspend the vote on Referendum C, first published in the Weekly Bulletin of September 14, expired November 13. Number of members in good standing represented by seconds, 162.

That proposed by Local Twin Falls, Idaho, moving the recall of J. Mahlon Barnes as Campaign Manager and Victor L. Berger, Job Harriman, Morris Hillquit, Alexander Irvine and John Spargo as members of the National Executive Committee, first published in the Weekly Bulletin of September 14, expired November 13. Number of members in good standing represented by seconds, 268.

That proposed by Local Oak Harbor, Wash., that the National Secretary be instructed to print the minutes of all the Barnes trials of February, March and August of last year, same to be edited by representatives of both sides to the controversy and submitted to the membership without unnecessary delay, first published in the Weekly Bulletin of September 28, expired November 27. Number of members in good standing represented by seconds, 44.

A state convention of the Socialist party of Delaware was held at Wilmington, Sunday, November 10, for the purpose of taking the preliminary steps towards forming a state organization. A state constitution was adopted and candidates for State Secretary and National Committeeman nominated.

The National Office is putting the constitution and the candidates to a vote of the state membership. If the vote on the constitution is favorable, the question of granting state charter will then be put to the National Executive Committee.

An extraordinary international Socialist congress was held at Basel, Switzerland, November 24, to consider the international situation arising from the Balkan war. The conference was called by the International Socialist Bureau at its recent meeting.

GENTLEMEN:—We have audited the Books of Account of your Treasurer for the period September 1, 1912, to November 9, 1912.

We beg to report that we have found satisfactory vouchers on file, duly approved by either the Secretary or Treasurer, for all liabilities incurred and disbursements made. All cancelled checks returned by the bank were examined as to signature and indorsements and compared with their respective entries in the Cash Book and found to be in order. The bank balance as at November 9 was reconciled with the statement furnished by your bankers. We have compared all receipts during period under investigation, as recorded in Cash Book, with the duplicate receipt stubs; the details of same were also compared, as regards September, with the lists published in the Bulletin, whilst, as regards September, October 1 to November 9, certified lists have been handed by us to the printers, and will be compared by us with the Bulletin when published. No detailed list of cash receipts for literature and supplies sold is published. All postings and additions in the Books of Account were checked by us.

We have satisfied ourselves that the statement of cash receipts and expenditures for September, as published in the October Bulletin, is correct. We have audited the statement of cash receipts and expenditures for the month of October and have handed a certified copy of same to the printers. We submit herewith the following schedules:

"A" Statement of Assets and Liabilities as on November 9, 1912.

"B" Statement of Income and Expenditures from May 23, 1912, to November 9, 1912.

"C" Details of Miscellaneous Accounts Receivable as on November 9, 1912.

Schedule "B" embraces all the financial transactions of the committee during the present campaign, and includes income not yet actually received and such expenditures as have been incurred, but which still remain unpaid; a detailed list of these unpaid accounts is submitted in Schedule "D". As will be noted, the fund shows a deficit of \$12,016.86. As before stated, our audit has only covered the period September 1, 1912, to November 9, 1912, the transactions prior to September 1 having been checked by other auditors, whose figures have been incorporated by us in the statements submitted herewith.
