Y., Feb. 22.—In forty-second annual report submitted to the Legislature to-day, the State Board of Charities makes a strong plea for power to inspect the work of private charitable institutions. It is set forth in the report that there are now not less than seven hundred and fifty institutions, with an annual expenditure of more than \$10,000,000, over which the state authorities have no control and no right to inquire into their management.

HOW THE DIAZ GANG RULES MEXICO.

(Continued.) How damnable are the lies that have been told concerning Mexico and her infamous dictator! Because of the systematic and carefully planned misrepresentations of the people of the United States have slumbered in woful ignorance of the cruel process of enslavement that has been going on in that country during the last quarter of a century. Much has been written of the wonderful resources of Mexico, and her cheap labor has been held out as a special inducement to foreign capitalists, but nothing has been said regarding the part foreign capitalists have played in cheapening labor, and maintaining it in that condition. It is no exaggeration to say that to the invasion of the country by foreign capitalists is due, in large measure, the present degradation of the Mexican working class, and that the rule promulgated by Diaz has been an increase of wages and a shortening of the working day for the toilers was brought about at the instigation of American and European capitalists operating in Mexico. Diaz has proved a splendid instrument in the hands of Mexican and foreign capitalists for the enslavement of his countrymen and it is not surprising that he is being represented as the ideal ruler of the age.

HIGH HATS IN JAPAN.

A Japanese newspaper, the "Yorodou Choho," recently published the following: "The silk hat is now an inevitable and laughter provoking feature of a public function in this country. In joy or sorrow, at a garden party or a funeral, on the platform of a station or on the pier of a harbor, go where you will, you are sure to meet Japanese swells strutting about with tall silk hats on their heads. It is really a sight which cannot be described in words, and which is the most pessimistic of men. Why our countrymen, who are famous for their artistic taste, should have come to adopt this ill proportioned hat is beyond our comprehension. It is to be hoped that it will soon go out of fashion. Even in England the silk hat is fast disappearing. Since the Russo-Japanese war this country has been one of the best customers of English makers of the silk hat. We are almost inclined to think that the craze for the silk hat among our people is one of the attendant evils of war."

"LIVING LAMPS" AID SCIENCE.

Living lamps from luminous bacteria are shedding light on certain sciences. Prof. H. Morlisch, of Prague, has experimented especially with the common variety, the bacterium, which he has called "photogen." Professor Morlisch has succeeded in preparing with a glass flask filled with gelatin that has been vacuated with a colony of these bacteria, a perpetually glowing lamp. Its light intensity is less than that of any candle, but it suffices for photographic purposes, and it is capable of inducing germinating plants, like peas or lentils, to turn toward it as a source of light energy. The most striking feature of the light is the total absence of heat rays. Thus the bacteria solve a problem which is the despair of engineers and which is to convert energy into light without loss due to heat.

GLASS CLOTHING.

Spinning glass for practical uses was very well known by the ancient Egyptians, and we are now rediscovering it. Spun glass has long been known as a curiosity. A Frenchman in the middle century developed the process along commercial lines, but died without revealing his secrets. These seem, however, to have been recently rediscovered in Germany. Glass thus drawn out into very thin threads is flexible and it is thought it will be possible to spin and weave it into clothes. These garments would be incombustible, non-conducting, and impervious to acids. They can be beautifully tinted by using tinted glass. The insulating properties of the glass-wool would render it valuable as a covering where it is desirable to keep in or exclude heat. In this case we should be resorting to the mineral kingdom for our clothes, though as yet we have not got those abbeys garments which could be washed by throwing them on the fire.—"Van Norden Magazine."

THE SAVED AND THE DAMNED.

Who then are the damned? Upon whom is pronounced the condemnation? Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels. Were they blasphemers and unbelievers? Were they denigrators of churches? There is no indication in these verses that they had not been wearing the liveliest of hosiery. Had they been felons—thieves, murderers and the like? What was the great sin of which they had been guilty? The mortal sin of that damnation? Heavy implication is that these rogues were highly respected and respectable citizens. Their manifest astonishment at their doom indicates as much. Jesus was here chastising what He had uttered before. "The things which are highly esteemed among men are abominations in the sight of God." The Son of Man accuses these goats of having Him relieved in hunger, thirst, homelessness, nakedness, and imprisonment. When those accused utter a horrified disclaimer they are answered, "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of these lowly, I ye did it unto me." The allowance without protest and without the utmost effort to make it otherwise of poverty, sickness and imprisonment on earth is taught by Jesus to be the summation of villainies. Those who actively sought to stop the hunger and thirst of the needy, to end a condition of things under which homelessness, rage, disease and imprisonment abounded were guilty of damnable sin. Now, you must remember that Jesus told this parable to the rich and religious people of His time—the Scribes and the Pharisees. They too had the means of relieving the misery of the poor. It was to such that He had said, "The publicans and the harlots will go into the kingdom of heaven before you." The words of Jesus meant anything that they meant, the supreme condemnation of an order of things under which hunger, thirst, homelessness, rage, disease and imprisonment were allowed to go unrelieved. The first step toward the redemption of the world was to supply these elemental physical needs. Now what is the modern church doing to meet the conditions of salvation laid down by Jesus in this parable? Professor S. N. Patten in his book on "The New Basis of Civilization," which he shows to be not a new basis after all, says, "The present order is to be made durable by the cultivation of a social consciousness that will lead to a generous sharing of the surplus product of industry with the poverty class." This he declares to be Christian. But the Rev. Edgar Walters, an English clergyman, says more truly when he declares, "I cannot too strongly emphasize that when the motto of the church of Jesus is justice, not charity, the dawn of a new day will have come."
