P. S. C. MAY GIVE LONGER FRANCHISES

Will Delay Consideration of Subway Schemes Until Eisberg Act Is Amended.

The Public Service Commission will do nothing with the interborough subway proposition until the Legislature has amended the Eisberg act to permit the granting of longer period franchises than the twenty-five years and twenty years renewal now stipulated.

Mr. Shonts has set forth that if the offer made by his company to build \$50,000,000 worth of new subways is accepted it must be on condition that the franchise shall run as long as the seventy-five year term, under which the present subway franchise was granted.

It was rumored yesterday that the Amsterdam company, the Wilgus syndicate, was preparing a new proposition to the Public Service Board to offset the one made by Interborough, but there was no confirmation of the report.

NEAR CHILD LABOR LAW.

Proposed Measure to Restrict Employment in Dangerous Occupations.

ALBANY, N. Y., March 12.—An amendment to the Labor law, introduced today by Assemblyman Voss, prohibits the employment of children less than sixteen years old in operating circular and band saws, wood turning and rolling mill machinery, laundering machinery, etc., in adjustment to machinery, cleaning machinery, manufacturing or packing paints, or operating freight or passenger elevators.
