WHOLESALE LAUGH AT MEAT BOYCOTT

Union Men Favor Starvation Plan, While Others Want More Wages.

Wholesale meat dealers yesterday were inclined to laugh at the "meat strike" movement, characterizing it as all talk, the work of agitators whose plans would not carry. Retail dealers, on the other hand, complained that so far as they were concerned the boycott seemed to be already on, their sales having fallen radically in the past few days.

EXPECT SETTLEMENT IN DAIRY LOCKOUT

Medermott Company Make Overtures of Peace to Milk Drivers' Union.

The McDermott Dairy Company, whose one hundred employees are out on strike for shorter hours and an increase in wages, are making overtures for peace, and it is thought that the strike, which has lasted since a week ago Thursday, will be brought to a close within the next few days.

WHOLESALES NOT ALARMED

Among the wholesale meat dealers of the city it was easy to obtain statements ridiculing the probability of a general or widespread boycott on their products. They professed not to be alarmed by the stir due to high prices in Cleveland, Kansas City, St. Louis and other cities of the Middle West.

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U. S. TO PROSECUTE

Dept. of Justice Will Proceed Against Beef Trust.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Right in line with the general movement against high prices of food stuffs, and particularly meats, announcement was made officially today that the Department of Justice is about to begin proceedings against the beef trust. The department, it was said, would proceed against Armour & Co., Swift & Co., Morris & Co. and the National Packing Company, all of Chicago.

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BURTZEF GREETED WITH ENTHUSIASM

But Big Gathering is Angered by Presence of Representative of Traitorous Wahrheit.

Vladimir Burtzef, the noted Russian revolutionist, was greeted last night at a reception given him by his comrades and countrymen at Grand Central Palace. LONDON, Jan. 21.—Eleven of today's sixty-seven polls have been declared. They include one Unionist gain, making the net gains for that party 70. Thus far there have been elected 159 Liberals, 58 Nationalists, 31 Laborites and 184 Unionists.

If unsuccessful, union leaders nothing will be left to them than order a walkout.

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LEWIS ATTACKED AT MEMBERS' CONVENTION

President Defeated on Question of National Organizers After Hot Debate.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 21.—The members of the United Mine Workers of America today reported the election of the year beginning April, 1910: President, T. L. Lewis, Bridgeport, 51,712 1/2 votes over William Cochocton, Ohio, 71,515 1/2 votes.

Secretary-treasurer, Edw. Parry, Iowa; auditors and executive committee, John Mosop, Lawrence, Ohio; Albert Mentz, Glen Carbon, Ill.; William Donohue, Dubois, Pa.

Members William Young, South Fork, William Fitzsimmons, Scranton, William Feady, California, Pa.

Delegates to the American Federation of Labor, John Mitchell, Springfield, Ill., 116,632 1/2 votes; T. L. Lewis, 96,164 1/2 votes; Edwin Perry, 79,770 1/2 votes; Frank J. Hayes, 79,770 1/2 votes; W. Wilson, Blossburg, Pa., 88,529; John H. Walker, Springfield, Ill., 67,000; E. S. McCulloch, Bay City, Mich., 66,579.

The convention was thrown into confusion today when anti-Lewis delegates made an objection to the report of the tellers. Thomas Hargerty, of Pennsylvania, asked that the report be delayed until the standing of eight delegates in Pennsylvania, which he claimed, had no right to vote, could be investigated.

John Fahey, to whom Lewis had stepped the chair, was unable to keep order. Francis Feehan and John T. Dempsey, Pennsylvania, were hooted down when they attempted to ask the

tellers a question. Order was finally restored, and the tellers continued. William Green then asked that the tellers furnish a report showing how the election went in Pennsylvania and Nova Scotia.

That John Mitchell still has great influence with the miners was shown by the big vote he received as a delegate to the American Federation of Labor, compared with the other candidates, and by the enthusiasm which his name caused when mentioned before the convention.

The convention today called on Congress to pass the bill creating a bureau of mines and will send a committee to Washington when the bill comes up for a vote Tuesday.

The action followed the receipt of a telegram from former Secretary-Treasurer W. B. Wilson, the author of the bill, asking the convention to help. Congressman Wilson and former President John Mitchell were invited to attend the convention.

Unmasked Spy in Convention. President Lewis warned J. Rivers, a detective in the employ of the mine owners south of the Ohio, to leave the convention, after W. H. Fairley, Alabama, had denounced Rivers as the man who worked himself into the locals in Alabama following the strike to put them all on the blacklist.

President Lewis today appointed as the committee to confer with the delegation from the Western Federation of Miners to bring about a working agreement or amalgamation: John R. Lawson, district 15; John Walker, district 12; E. S. McCulloch, district 2; Charles F. Gilday, district 7; Jacob Ritter, district 13; Patrick Gilday, district 23. Lewis will act as chairman of the committee.

original motion was made and lost. A motion was then made to table the amendment, and this motion was carried and the discussion was continued.

Delegate John H. Walker, of Illinois, who opposed Lewis for the national presidency a year ago, talked on the subject in support of Delegates Hayes and Green. If the international organization is to pay some of the delegates let them pay all.

Delegate Duncan McDonald, president of the Illinois district, who directed the work of relief at the Cherry mine disaster, was formerly a national organizer, declared that there were forty or fifty international organizers appointed by the president and seated as delegates, there was no reason why 100 or 500 should not be appointed to carry out certain policies.

He said that he was opposed to allowing appointed national organizers being allowed to decide upon the policies of the convention. McDonald referred to an annual report made by John Mitchell, as president of the miners, in which Mitchell said that unless the convention decreed otherwise, the organizers would not be invited to attend the convention, and be paid out of the international treasury.

When a miner's pay is cut off he usually quits. Some of these delegates do not like to do that, declared McDonald, and as he sat down the convention burst into applause.

TO TESTIFY AGAINST MOTHER. Sneed Will Attempt to Fasten Crime Upon Parent. Fletcher W. Sneed, husband of Mrs. Ocey W. M. Sneed, the East Orange bathtub mystery victim, will return to this country from Canada, it was learned yesterday, and testify against his mother, Mrs. Mary Sneed, who, with her two sisters, is now under arrest at Newark, N. J., awaiting trial on the charge of having brought about the death of Mrs. Ocey Sneed.

This strange turn in the bathtub mystery developed after Dr. William H. Hicks, of Newark, had submitted a report to Prosecutor Mott, of Essex county, N. Y., in which he stated that the stomach of Mrs. Ocey Sneed contained morphine at the time of her death. Dr. Hicks was chosen by Prosecutor Mott to make a chemical analysis of the stomach, and his findings bears out the suspicions of Mott that the young wife was drugged.

Census Agents' Wages Fixed. WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—A favorable report has been ordered by the house census committee, on a joint report fixing the maximum pay of special agents of the census at \$6 a day, and traveling expenses and allowance of \$5 a day, in lieu of subsistence. The resolution has already passed the senate.

Jane Addams Improving. CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—Miss Jane Addams, who has been at the Augustana Hospital recovering from an operation, left that institution yesterday. It was said that there was nothing in her condition that need occasion worry, but she is weak from the effect of an operation, and will be in charge of nurses until about the middle of February.

Dead After Abilite With Turkey. PITTSBURGH, Jan. 21.—Harry Colfeah, a man of sixty-one, is dead at the home of his brother, Kerwin Colfeah, in North McKeesport, as the result of a struggle with a big turkey on Christmas eve. When Colfeah attempted to cut off the bird's head, he missed the first stroke and was knocked down a flight of steps. Several ribs were broken, and he was otherwise internally injured.

FOUR KNEE PANTS PICKETS ARRESTED

Gang in Employ of Bosses Attacks Party of Strikers—Many of the Unionists Hurt.

Great excitement prevailed in front of Rosenblit Brothers' shop, 49-51 Elizabeth street, yesterday, when a dozen or more pickets of the Knee Pants Makers' Union were set on by a number of hirelings of the bosses.

After a few minutes of fighting, two patrol wagons full of reserves put in an appearance and called into the strikers. The police were very particular in picking out the heads of pickets to batter with their clubs. The tools of the manufacturers were left untouched and four of the unionists were arrested.

Those arrested were Joe Goldsmith, who was held in \$100 bail; Sam Stern, \$1,000 bail; Joe Kutzino, \$100 bail, and M. Cohen, \$100 bail. They were arraigned before Magistrate Steinart in the Essex Market Court. The cases will come up in the Court of Special Sessions Tuesday afternoon, January 25.

Joe Goldsmith and Louis Morrisoff both received severe injuries about the head, and found it necessary to secure the treatment of physicians. Five bosses gave in to the demands of the union and a still larger number are expected to accept the strikers' terms today.

Yesterday morning a large meeting of Italian knee pants makers was addressed by M. Maroto, the organizer of the Garment Makers' Union. The meeting was held at Lincoln Hall, 235 Sack street, Brooklyn. 200 girls joined the union and entered their names as pickets at the various shops that are still unfair.
