GOVERNMENT WON'T DISCUSS DR. CRIPPEN

William Thorne's Questions in House of Commons Coldly Turned Down. France Is Searched.

LONDON, July 20.—In the house of commons this afternoon, William Thorne, Social-Democrat, asked the home secretary the questions of which he gave notice yesterday in regard to the action of the police in allowing Dr. Crippen to escape.

Out of the tangled mass of mystery and uncertainty that has heretofore surrounded the case now begins to loom isolated clear, and a few meager facts. From Dieppe, France, comes definite confirmation of the cable dispatch a few days ago, to the effect that Dr. Crippen and his woman companion had been seen there.

The whole French nation has been agitated by the exciting man hunt, and the desire for Crippen's arrest there is almost as keen as it is in England.

The Scotland Yard detectives today announced that they had succeeded in finding an intimate friend of the Le Neve woman, who is thought to be with the hunted dentist, and they say they secured much valuable information from the woman.

Backing Down of Bucks Stove and Range Co. From Anti-Union Position Creates Stir in Labor's Ranks.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Declaring that the settlement last night at Cincinnati with the Bucks Stove and Range Company, of St. Louis, is another victory for organized labor, officials at the headquarters of the American Federation of Labor here today are well pleased at the prospect of the Bucks concern, which has been the union's bitter foe, becoming a straight union shop.

While the agreement will not put an end to the contempt proceedings against President Gompers, Secretary Morrison, and John Mitchell, which now are pending in the Supreme Court of the United States, it will remove the prosecution heretofore conducted by the company, and leave the whole matter simply in the hands of the court to decide.

It is believed here that the death of its late president, Van Cleave, had much to do with the changed attitude of the St. Louis firm.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 20.—The settlement of the long standing fight between organized labor and the Bucks Stove and Range Company of St. Louis, at Cincinnati, is regarded here today as a notable victory for unionism.

JOHN KIRBY EKUDE A FEW REMARKS. DAYTON, Ohio, July 20.—The agreement between the Bucks Company and the labor leaders will not surprise Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison from all unless the United States Supreme Court grants their appeal, according to John Kirby, Jr., president of the National Manufacturers' Association, today.

BUCKS COUNSEL SAYS FIGHT WILL CONTINUE. BRIDGEPORT, Conn., July 20.—Daniel Davenport, of this city, counsel for the Bucks Stove and Range Company, said this afternoon:

"The cases have been passed up to decide whether the action of the lower courts was regular," he said. "My understanding is that the proceedings can be stopped only by the court itself."

DOES NOT AFFECT THE CASE, SAYS GOMPERS. ST. LOUIS, July 20.—President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, arrived in St. Louis from Cincinnati at 2:10 this afternoon.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, July 20.—"It must be understood that the agreement we have reached with the Bucks Stove and Range Company does not affect the standing of the cases against John Mitchell, Frank Morrison and myself, in which we are charged with contempt of court for having published notices of the boycott in the American Federation of Labor Journal after the court had enjoined us from doing so," said Samuel Gompers in a statement following the announcement of the agreement.

STORM-LASHED SEA ENGULFS TWO MEN

Four Others Barely Escape After Horrifying Scenes in Atlantic City Breakers.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 20.—Monster breakers driven on the beach by a deep sea storm claimed two victims today and imperiled the lives of four more men, three of whom bravely manned a lifeboat to save the fourth before the arrival of the life guards and nearly lost their own lives in the sea struggle.

The drowned men are H. E. Barlow, of 1839 North 52d street, Philadelphia, and Daniel Gallagher, janitor of the Foster Home, who was lost in the breakers immediately in front of that institution.

20 YEARS FOR MURDER

Ex-Soldier, Who Killed Wife and Baby, Receives Long Sentence for Crime.

Isidore Neuman, who killed his wife and eight-months-old boy on May 29 last, was sentenced yesterday by Judge Foster in General Sessions to serve not less than twenty years in state prison for the first murder, while sentence for the second murder was held in abeyance.

EX-MINISTER FAVORS JUDICIAL MURDER

Andrew D. White Urges Bishop Laddon to Crusade Against Laxity in Homicide Prosecutions.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 20.—Former Ambassador to Germany Andrew D. White has written Bishop Patrick A. Laddon thanking him for coming in a recent newspaper article the phrase "multimillionaire Mormons of Barnyard morals" and "the sporting tuff and title-hunting fraternity," and taking occasion to urge the bishop to take up other subjects for publication.

"White says: 'With homicides increased within fifteen years from 2,000 a year to nearly 10,000, placing us by far in the lead of all civilized nations in this respect, and with capital convictions in only about seventy cases last year; with life sentences averaging at most seven years; with trials for murder, which in most other civilized countries would be ended in a few months, stretched out to years by new evidence, by the testimony of paid experts, by endless facilities for appeal, by every sort of chicanery and pettifoggery, until the whole thing becomes a farce; with the fact that the penal law as regards murders seems to have utterly ceased to have any deterrent effect, it seems to me that you and men like you should undertake a better education of public opinion on this subject.'

"THE RIGHT TO WORK." George Pfeifer, thirty-five years old, a baker, of 3614 13th street, Brooklyn, hanged himself with a clothesline from a transom in his home yesterday while his wife was out. Mrs. Pfeifer, who found the body, told the police Pfeifer had spent weeks in a futile search for any kind of employment.

PRESIDENT OF R. R. SHOT DOWN IN HOME

Ira G. Rawn, of Monon System, Meets Death Under Mysterious Circumstances.

CHICAGO, July 20.—Ira G. Rawn, president of the Chicago, Indianapolis and Louisville railway, the Monon system, was shot through the heart and instantly killed at his summer home in Winnetka early this morning by a would-be robber. The burglar escaped and there is no clue to his identity. Servants and women in the house, aroused by the shot, found Rawn lying in the hallway on his face. The front door was open. There was no one in sight.

The fact that the murder was committed by a burglar was established by the finding of jimmy marks on the door, which had been forced open. The assassination is the climax to a reign of crime that has driven the residents of the North Shore suburb to a frenzy.

The shooting of Rawn was told by Ralph G. Coburn, a son-in-law of the victim.

"Mrs. Rawn was awakened by sounds on the first floor of the house," he said. "Rawn also was awakened and he also heard the sounds. He insisted upon going down to ascertain the cause, although Mrs. Rawn tried to persuade him not to do it."

"He descended the stairs and had barely reached the landing when every one in the house was awakened by the roar of two shots, fired in quick succession. I rushed out as did the others. We found Rawn lying in his night clothes. Blood was trickling from his breast."

"He struggled, turned over, tried to speak and could not. We went in hurried calls for a doctor. Rawn died within five or six minutes after the shots had been fired. He did not regain consciousness."

"We immediately summoned the Winnetka police and it was they who
