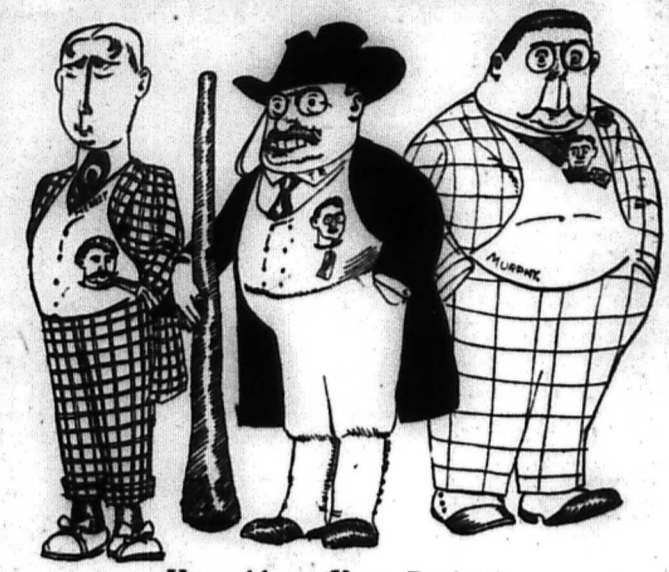

KEIR HARDIE FORESEES REVOLUTION IN FRANCE

WOMEN TOIL IN FOUNDRIES

In Syracuse Girls Slave Labor Hours Doing Men's Work for Pitifully Small Wages.

'OPEN SHOP' BLESSINGS

Workers Slowly Poisoned for a Horrible Pittance at Solvay Process Plant.

Syracuse is a typical industrial city of great extremes of poverty and riches. A city where women do the hardest and dirtiest kind of work.

Some time ago a big railway official told me of the wonderful industrial development of Syracuse. Of the great salt works, of the many malleable iron works, of the Solvay process works, sending millions of dollars' worth of freight over the railroad each year.

At the approach of a storm the alarm is given, and suddenly the shuttles become alive. Men, women and children stream out like ants from a disturbed hill and hustle to cover the vats.

Happy as larks. A child ruddy and awakened from sleep in the dead of night must be as happy as a lark.

A student from the University of Syracuse told me he had a job that day: test work in the chemical department. He said: 'Three of college fellows are there, and we are having an easy time. We work eight hours, from 11 p. m. until 7 a. m. and get \$2.00 for the company's time.'

They don't mind it. 'Oh, they don't mind it. The system becomes accustomed to it in time. And anyway, the men enter the works, and expect to stay there as long as they live. They really don't mind it,' answered the student.

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ORGANIZED LABOR WELLMAN NOW OUT OF FIGHTS FOR BABIES TOUCH WITH SHORE

Labor Movement of Greater City Demands Municipal Milk Stations to Save Infants' Lives. Last Message From Europe-banded Air-ship Received at 12:40 P. M. Ex. C. Position Unknown.

An effort to force this city, the richest in America, if not in the world, to give the babies of the working class a standard of life comparable with that of the dogs of the rich, as Alexander Irvine so eloquently phrased it, is being made by the Joint Labor Conference on Municipal Milk Depots of Greater New York.

A campaign to force the city to spend \$300,000 for the installation of municipal milk stations, where fresh, clean and healthful milk for babies can be obtained, is being launched.

The demand for municipal milk stations is made in behalf of thousands of little babies doomed to die if not helped.

Robert W. Bruere, secretary of the Joint Labor Conference on Municipal Milk Depots, states the case as follows:

"The labor bodies of Greater New York have formed a joint conference to push the plan of Dr. Lederle, commissioner of health, for the establishment of municipal milk depots throughout Greater New York.

THOUSANDS PARADE IN PORTUGAL'S HONOR

Socialists and Republicans Turn Out in Madrid—Manuel and Moher Bend for Britain.

MADRID, Oct. 16.—Several thousand Socialists and Republicans paraded today to demonstrate their sympathy with the Portuguese republic.

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ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 16.—

Walter Wellman and the five men of his crew aboard the dirigible balloon America cut loose from this continent at 12:40 today. The last message expected from the America until it strikes the transatlantic steamer lane came into the wireless station at Siasconset, on the northerly end of Nantucket, and was relayed through Sogapont station and from there to the United wireless station here.

The exact position of the America when the last message was delivered appears to be a matter of conjecture, both on shore and with the members of the America's crew, who did not report having made an observation.

Thousands Interested. Before the first message received from the America's wireless operator this morning had been picked up at Nantucket Light, there was great eagerness regarding the position and probable fate of the airship, both among the members of the families and friends of the daring aeronauts, and the curious residents and visitors deeply interested in the flight.

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"If I should say what I really think about the future of aeronautics people would laugh at me. I believe that the time will come when the public will look upon such men as I am and wonder how they have been as foolish as to trust our lives in the aeroplanes of today."

AUTHOR TELLS HER LIFE IN NOVELS

Ohio Woman Draws Inspiration for Strong Stories From Her Own Experiences.

ASHTABULA, Ohio, Oct. 15.—Mrs. Harriet True Bates, of Ashtabula, who has petitioned the county courts to allow her to take the name of Hilda Vernon, the heroine of a novel which she published in 1891, as part of a new name for herself, is writing another romance.

Like her first book, "Two Men of the World," she says it will incorporate the story of her own life. While it will not be a direct sequel to "Two Men of the World," she says it will take up her life story where the other book left off.

Mrs. Bates today related dramatic episodes in her life, unveiled the characters in her early novel and narrated events that she said she will incorporate in her new book. She is now fifty-seven and says she is reduced in circumstances. She has been engaged here in forming a branch of the Modern Brotherhood of America.

The authoress carefully opens the door to visitors. She is tall, courteous and refined. She talks fluently, makes her assertions with positiveness, keeps her brown eyes fixed upon one. She always dresses in black.

"When I published 'Two Men of the World' there were many who said a pure-minded woman could not have written it, yet every line was penned with noble motives. It was not until long afterward, when evil-thinking enemies pointed out the double significance in some lines, that I saw it.

"I made Hilda Vernon, the heroine in the book, my ideal of womanhood. Brian Fitzgerald, the hero, was my ideal man. I put my own soul and life into Hilda, in Brian I represented the late Edward C. Carrigan, a noted lawyer of Boston. Mr. Carrigan was the father of the Massachusetts teachers' tenure law, the fourteen-year-old school law, and first proposed free text books. I was engaged to him at the time of his death.

"After losing him I was overcome with grief. When I had become convalescent from a long illness a wealthy aunt in Youngstown invited me to live with her, and she intended to make me heir to all her property. I went.

"Then a cousin tried to influence my aunt against me. She produced my book and tried to show the authoress must be wicked. When my aunt died I entered suit for what I believed rightfully was mine, but this woman and other relatives opposed me.

"This novel shall be a vindication of my first. After it is given to the world, in explanation for that much misunderstood book, I will be ready for death—a death which will reunite me with my ideal."
