A correspondent whose name is unknown to us, but who time to time vigorously objects to the statement of Socialists declare that labor receives one-third, one-fourth or one-fifth of total value of the product, sends in the following report from Interstate Commerce Commission showing, according to his figure that in the business of the express companies the capitalists rec 35 per cent and the workers 65 per cent. We reprint the report s mitted verbatim herewith:

EXPRESS COMPANIES.
Capital's and labor's share, 1910. (From statistics published by the Commerce Commission.)

Gross receipts (\$140,000,000) minus express privileges (paid to railros \$00,000). That is: Operating revenue Operating expenses Net operating revenue

(The total net corporate income was \$18,000,000.)

LABOR. (To be compared with companies' net plus outside capital or profit comparable to outside labor.)

Labor's share, \$37,468,000 (65 per cent); capital's share. \$20,422,000 (35 cent), which compares well with both the railroads and the manufacturing industry. Note—This calculation is extremely rough and hasty. The exact and praratio may be, in a way, very different. But from this cursory analysis of the instance Commerce Commission's figures for 1910 no doubt is left in my mind that any rate labor's share is not less than capital's share.

(The real loss to the workers, or the public, caused by private speration and appear from such statistics.)

Our correspondent admits that the conclusions he draws be only approximate, but is certain that labor's share is not less capital's, that is to say, 50 per cent each.

Now, we have never taken much stock in any of these calcu tions made either by Socialists or non-Socialists showing the relation shares of capital and labor. On the whole, we are of the opinion that the data available is hardly sufficient to insure exact calc When the Socialist talks of one-fourth or one-fifth as labor's he is instantly met with the retort that he hasn't taken into calcultion the cost of raw material, etc., and interminable wrangling result

Now, we may be wrong, of course, but on looking over the a we don't agree on the 65 and 35 per cent shares, to say nothing of the even divide. If we understand figures, these quoted show no suc

Perhaps we might make a digression here to state for the bene of our correspondent that in making calculations of this sort the Socialist does not confine himself to what the actual capitalist of capitalists who employ the labor whose share is calculated gets. means what capital gets, that is, all capitalists who in any way share

in the product. We will agree, without further argument, that the capitalists as owners of the express companies, got but \$20,000,000 and the wa

a...d salary employes \$37,000,000. But what did other capitalists get The gross receipts of the express companies were \$146,000, and out of this the railroad capitalists got in round figures \$70,000,

000. Who produced that \$70,000,000? and why does our correspon dent exclude it from the total labor product? Suppose the railroad capitalists could have got \$80,000,000

the total instead. That would have left the express capitalists little over \$10,000,000 and our correspondent would have be able to prove that labor got 821/2 per cent and the employers got 171/4 per cent. And if the railroad companies had got \$90,000,000 it wo show that the express companies' wage earners got 100 per cent a the express capitalists nothing.

The Socialist calculations are not made on the "total net i come," but on the total product, in this case represented by the gross receipts

But probably the express capitalists and the railroad capitalists may be the very same people. Many think they are. But whether they are or not makes no difference. Out of this total labor product the fact remains that some capitalists got \$70,000,000, which was earned by the express business, but which our correspondent leave

Now it may very well be that the railroad capitalists didn't ge all this \$70,000,000 clear, either. Out of it they may have had to pay some to wage labor and some to other capitalists who do not appear in the report at all. The point we make is that in producing gr receipts or product of \$140,000,000 the actual wage workers got \$376 000,000, or just about one-fourth.

If our correspondent disagrees he will have a chance to com back, but we maintain that this is what the figures show, althou share being one-third or one-fourth or one-fifth, and don't cons it of vital importance in its bearing on Socialism. We are not after the capitalist's profits. They are too small and petty to bother with He doesn't know how to produce, and we are after the means of production. Capitalism is now a fetter on production, and the miser able amount it has to "divide up" is a matter of very minor considers

what their economic oracles had adjudged impossible, to traverse the capitalistic creed that declares wages to be regulated by the etarnal law of supply and demand, and to propose regulation by statute law in its place. Though little may result from their attempt, nevertheless their readiness under pressure of fear to abandon or ignorate the fundamentals of their economic philosophy is highly significant, and demonstrates how insecure and unstable are the foundations of the present industrial system.

The labor giant, putting forth all the economic strength he could muster at the time, was able to rock violently the entire fabric of the capitalistic structure. His economic strength, however, gove out before he was able to accomplish its overthrow, and at this point the lack of political power was painfully evident.

Nevertheless, there will be other trials, this particular strike being but one of an ever increasing series which will follow to More economic power must be obtained, the "general strike" must be come progressively more "general" and inclusive of all industries, and with it must be accumulated its indispensable co-efficient, political power.
