Cohen, manufacturers of overalls, 247 West Broadway, went on strike yesterday because the firm refused to renew its agreement with the Overall Workers' Union, Local 178 of the United Garment Workers. This firm has been run as a union label shop until recently, when the agreement with the union had expired.

AUTO VICTIM GETS \$3,500.

James H. Hunt Wins Verdict Against Fitzpatrick's Chauffeur. ALBANY, May 27.—A verdict of \$3,500 was returned by a jury today against James H. Hunt, chauffeur of the Erie County Democratic leader, William H. Fitzpatrick, in the \$30,000 damage suit for injuries inflicted when Hunt was run down by an automobile owned by Fitzpatrick.

COLLAPSES AT LIFE SENTENCE.

When Giuseppe Corcolio, 23 years old, a grocer, of 228 East 63d street, was arraigned before Judge Malone in General Sessions yesterday for sentence on a conviction of murder in the second degree, he collapsed when a term of from twenty years to life was pronounced. A few minutes later his wife and two children in the corridor outside the court room heard the sentence and they created a scene which caused an uproar.
