GERMAN CHRISTIAN UNIONS ATTACKED IN PAPAL LETTER

Messages From Rome to Confederation of Catholic Unions Commend the Members for Their "Childlike Submission" and Urge That "the Church Must Also Dictate to the Organization."

BERLIN, June 6.—Last week the Confederation of Catholic Unions held their convention in this city. The Catholic Unions, having their headquarters at Berlin, must be distinguished from the Christian Unions of the Cologne region.
