







NEW HAMPSHIRE S. P. HAS TICKET IN FIELD Party Organized in Every County—Prospects Are Very Bright.

By JOHN P. BURKE. FRANKLIN, N. H., June 19.—The New Hampshire Socialists have nominated by referendum the following State ticket:

Governor, William H. Wilkins, of Claremont. Congress, 1st District, Michael B. Roth, of Manchester. 2d District, Horace W. Spokesfield, of Littleton.

This is the strongest ticket ever nominated by the Socialists in New Hampshire. W. H. Wilkins is a veteran Socialist, well grounded in the principles of Socialism and a tireless worker for the cause he represents.

The Socialist party calls upon the workers to affiliate under its banner. The workers must enter politics because their masters are in politics. By the political activity of the capitalist class, it has captured the government and uses the forces of the government in its industrial battles with the workers.

This deplorable fact has been proven by the action of the combined political and business interests of Manchester in suppressing free speech and denying the right of peaceable assembly at a time when the working class sought to voice its protest against existing wrongs.

NOTED ANARCHIST DIES IN CHICAGO Voltarine De Claire Succumbs at Last to Injury Sustained in Attempt on Her Life.

Anarchist circles in this city were saddened yesterday by the news of the death of Voltarine De Claire, of Philadelphia. Miss De Claire, who stood in the front ranks of anarchist writers and lecturers, died at about 11 o'clock yesterday morning in a Chicago hospital where she had gone about two weeks ago for treatment of her throat and ear.

Miss De Claire was born in Michigan about forty-two years ago. She came of conservative parentage and was educated in a Catholic convent in Canada. Her attention was directed to radicalism about the time of the Haymarket affair, and throughout her career, in quote Alexander Berkman, she was "intensely idealistic and remarkably uncompromising."
