

WHERE 16,000 TOIL IN ACTUAL SLAVERY Life in the Amoskeag Mills, of Manchester, N. H., Is Veritable Hell.

By SIGURD RUSSELL. MANCHESTER, N. H., Sept. 12.—I went all through the Amoskeag Manufacturing Company today and found hundreds of children of 14 and under working there. These pale-faced little fellows have to go to school and they do the work of men from 8 in the morning to 6 at night.

Some of them I found sweating and coughing. Many of them are deformed, hunched-backed, now-legged and countenances looking like the skulls of the number of them in what is known as the Candler Mill, built in 1911. The company employs about 16,000 persons. These men, women and children work 24,000 hours and at \$55,000,000. They produce over 250,000,000 yards of cloth and over a million and a half pairs of shoes.

U. S. NOW TURNS TO DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

Sends Warship There Preparatory to Quelling Latest Revolution.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—With disturbances in other parts of Latin America quieting down, the United States Government is now preparing to take a hand in the unpleasant situation which has long existed in the Dominican Republic.

In just what form the authority of the United States will be asserted in Santo Domingo has not yet been decided. Unless matters show some improvement in the near future, however, "drastic" measures will be adopted.

The latest outbreak is believed to be promoted by the prime movers in the recent insurrection, which culminated in the battle of Sabana, August 1 to 6, when that place was taken by the revolutionists.

FOREIGN POPULATION GAINS. Census Shows Five Million Aliens Arrived Here in Last Decade.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The census of April 15, 1910, enumerated in the United States 15,348,545 white persons of foreign birth, or almost exactly 6,000,000 were new arrivals who had reached this country between January 1, 1901, and the taking of the census. A statement issued today by Director Durand of the Bureau of the census, gives the distribution among the States of these recent additions to the population of the United States.

CHARGES VIOLATION OF CIVIL SERVICE

Italian Interpreters in City Courts Said to Be Employed Without Examinations. Hugh Gordon Miller, general counsel of the New York Civil Service Society, sent a letter to Mayor Gaynor yesterday protesting in the name of the civil service institution and 75,000 civil employes in Greater New York against "most brazen violations of civil service" in connection with the list for Italian interpreters in the city courts.

Although there is a regular civil service list, Miller wrote, unqualified outsiders are employed as interpreters and some of them have been so employed for nearly two years, despite the society's protest and against the plain service rules which limit temporary appointments to a period of two months and forbids their renewal. "These outsiders were employed before examination for interpreters was ever held."

Miller pointed out that the temporary interpreters took the first examination, held in February, 1912, failed to pass and succeeded in having the list cancelled three days after publication. They also failed in the second examination, held in August, 1911, and contested the second list on a technicality, obtaining a mandamus, but still clung to their temporary appointments. Miller said that the Civil Service Society succeeded in having their salaries stopped, but the temporary appointees "even then stuck to their positions like burrs" and stated that they would work without pay.
