A radical change in street railroading is contemplated by the Metropolitan Street Railroad Company. The motive for the change is, like all changes or improvements in capitalist industries, the piling up of greater profits. This will easily be accomplished by swelling the ranks of the unemployed army, and, intensifying the labor of those retained. An experiment was conducted Sunday, August 26 on the Lenox avenue line, between 116th and 145th streets, with much secrecy. The experiment consisted in running a train of two cars, equipped with an air brake, and only one motorman and one conductor. It was pronounc-

ed a great success by the officials. Trains of two cars each will soon be in operation on the pricipal lines owned by the company. Preparations for the change are, it is said, being made with great rapidity. A careful estimate of the number of motormen and conductors that will be forced out of employment, by the change, is placed at two thousand. The displacemen of these men will throw into the

coffers of the corporation hundreds of thousands of dollars annually in wages. saved. Another considerable item can be saved in fenders, for many of them can be dispensed with. The company is said to be feling ex-

ceedingly happy over the prospects, and no wonder. But the motormen and conductors? Few of them know that the change, which means perhaps hunger and misery to many of them and their families, has even been thought of by their masters. They have not been consulted in the matter. The company is doing its utmost to guard the secret and prevent a stampede of employes, who may consider themselves the ones most likely to be marked for discharge, when the train system is launched. The childish twaddle of the pure and simpler's 'Identity of interests between master and slave" is once again silenced by cold, hard facts.

The Union Street Railway Company of the Bronx, and the Broklyn and lersey City street car companies will, it is pointed out, logically follow the Metropolitan, thus adding considerable numbers to the unemployed army in this ocality. And as there is no patent on the new system it can be easily guessed what will happen in all other cities throughout the country.

Consequently there, is not one chance in several millions of Haywood being elected this year in Colo rado, and not a millionth part of a chance in twice as many millions of his election being enforced, or of the attempt being even made of erforcing his election, in case he were elected. 1 follows that the question, whether we believe that bloodshed would ensue in Colorado in the event of Haywood's election, is essentially of the nature of Lord Dundreary's question, Does your brother like cheese? addressed to a lady who had no brother.

J. A. S., BISBEE, ARIZ,-In all discussions the endeavor must be to avoid injecting matter that will draw the discussions, from the subject that is actually to be considered, over to other subjects. The statement of things that are untrue is of the nature of such improper injections. It is not true that "the S. L. P. men of Colorado" endorsed Havwood's candidacy. The act was done by the State Committee as a proposition. As far as "the S. L. P. men of Colorado" have been heard from they have been heard from adversely. It is not true that "the S. L. P. as a whole" has done similarly. "The S. L. P. as a whole" position is yet to be ascertained. Whether to endorse or not to endorse is wise or unwise, cannot but be confused by incorrect allegations in the premises. # HUNTER AND KATZ Local New Orleans After Him and Ar-HOLD ROUSING MEETINGS IN

FOUR CITIES AND TOWNS. Bocialist Labor Party Message Deliv-

ered To Workingmen In Cold Spring. Newburgh, Kingston and Rondout -Items of Interest En Route.

Kingston, N. Y., September 2 .--James T. Hunter, of New York, accompanied me on an agitation. tour during last week. We held open air meetings in Cold Spring, Newburgh, Kingston and Rondout.

Cold Spring is a village in Putnam County with a good-sized working class population. Hearst has his emissaries here among the iron moulders' union, which endorsed him. They are the officials of the local "trade union pure and simple."

Our efforts on the street corner in Cold Spring were well appreciated by the large audience that had gathered. Hunter showed up the capitalist parties and the character of many Republican. Democratic and reform politicians, Roosevelt, Jerome and Hearst among them. His audience was spellbound There were a number of shining lights from the various political camps present, but none dared to even ask a question. The meeting created a healthy sensation in the village and the next morning as we went to the railroad station we were greeted by every workingman we met. The whole

town seemed to have attended the meeting. Hunter and I held two meetings a Kingston and Rondout; the one Saturday night, was a large one. Hunter was at his best and ripped the leaders of the black republicans as well as the idols of the would-be radicals to shreds. That he did hit hard was demonstrated by the many attempts that were made to disrupt our meeting. Despite Republican rowdles, Hearst heelers and Hooligans, our meeting was a success, and many a workingman heard for the first time the message that the Socialist Labor Party speaker has to deliver.

The best meeting held was in Newburgh. J. T. Long acted as chairman While Hunter was speaking a drunker Hearstite kept on interrupting. Though told by the speaker that questions would be answered he persisted in his interruptions. Hunter showed how, after Cleveland, who then was looked upon as a reformer, as Hearst is now, was elected in 1893, the industrial lords closed down the factories. He described the panic that followed with its Coxey's army, its soup houses and its bread-line. "Did not Billy Hearst give us the loaves of bread, then?' shouted the Hearst disturber. "Yes,' replied Hunter, "and that is the only

thing you can expect if you elect him, the bread-line. He will give you another 'bum bun' and shove it down your throat." The large audience was with the speaker.

John C. Chase the Gubernatorial candidate of the Socialist Party, was in Newburgh on August 10, but held no meeting in the open air; the street car employes were then on strike and the police department did not "advise" a meeting.

Our cardidate for Lleutenant-Gov ernor, Frank E. Passonno of Troy, was in Newburgh during the strike but he did not follow the "advice" of the po-

never will establish, justice. On the contrary, these parties will be found endeavoring, through persuading you to believe that "Anti-Pass" laws, etc., are of vital importance to you to secure your support in helping themselves to a better living. They pretend to deprecate, and will howl to you about "Graft" in Government affairs; yet what but "Graft," to the tune of four-fifths of the worker's product, is the system which they so ardently uphold! And what but grafters-themselves included-upon the productive workers are three-fourths of the population, as a result of their ideal-"best possible"-system; Again anent "Anti-Pass" laws: What good are they to the workers so long as the power to

enforce them is in the hands of those whose interests are opposed to them? Colorado (or "Colo-Russia") has such laws on the statutes yet the Socialist Labor Party has in its possession letters from Colorado officials, from Governor and Attorney General down to Sheriffs and officers of Militia requesting transportation and acknowledging receipt of same, and letters from the Railroad Companies complying with requests, granting, issuing passes!

In conclusion, members of our class, we maintain that the only issue worthy of your consideration in this, as in all other campaigns, is contained in the economic condition of your, of our class, as set forth in the above analysis and exposition of the present, or capitalist regime .-- In short, that the issue is Capitalism and Wage Slavery or Soclalism and Industrial Freedom.

Workingmen! Read again, and studiously, the above address, and ther anwer as you needs must answer (being loyal to truth) in the negative, the question, "Will the other parties dare to touch upon it?"-and cast your ballot accordingly-for the Socialist Labor Party.
