NATIONAL QUORUM.

Business Transacted at the Recent Meeting of the Quorum of the National Committee of the Socialist Party. The Quorum of the National Committee of the Socialist Party met at the National headquarters, Chicago, Ill., Sept. 16, with E. Bery, Victor L. Berger, M. Reynolds and Chas. G. Towner present. Comrade Work being absent in the lecture field. Reynolds was made chairman and W. E. Clark appointed secretary.

The National Secretary presented Comrade Joseph Barondess of New York, who made the following statement: "I appear before you in the name of the First Agitation District of the Socialist Party of the City of New York, comprising about a dozen party organizations and the balance being labor and progressive organizations, not affiliated with the party. I submit this credential which gives me official authorization to appear before your committee."

"This is to certify that Comrade Joseph Barondess has been duly authorized by the First Agitation District, Social Democratic Party, to appear in person before your body, for the purpose of petitioning you to reinstate to membership Comrade Meyer London, the candidate for Assembly in the Fourth District of the City of New York, on the Social Democratic Party's ticket and thereby enable us to carry on our propaganda for the cause, which was so enthusiastically and earnestly started. We bespeak your favorable consideration of our earnest appeal."

"Signed, E. Feigenbaum, in behalf of the First Agitation District, New York City."

"I ask you to place a construction upon Article 12, Section 8 of the national constitution of the Socialist Party, in order to settle a dispute now existing in the City of New York as to the nomination for Assembly in the Fourth District of Comrade Meyer London."

"Comrade Meyer London has been for eighteen years, and still is, active in the Socialist movement. He is still a member of the Socialist Party, but in arrears. He has never been notified of any suspension or expulsion; by virtue of this fact he is still a member of the party. Someone in the City of New York protested against his nomination. Comrade London requested reinstatement before the City Executive Committee of the City of New York, which request was granted; then the matter was submitted to the General Committee of the City of New York, where Comrade Alex. Jones and myself appeared in behalf of the First Agitation District and myself. The committee decided to refer the matter to the State Committee of New York, with request that they ratify the nomination of Comrade London. The state constitution of New York of last year provided that candidates who are not members of the Socialist Party for a full year may be permitted by the state committee to accept a nomination of the Socialist Party. It is for this reason that Comrade Jones and myself requested the General Committee to act favorably upon the nomination of London and also requested the State Committee for a similar action. When the matter came before the State Committee, we were informed that, in view of Section 8, Article XII of the National Constitution, the State Committee could not act in the matter."

"We find ourselves in this position. We have nominated our candidates, printed our literature, called meetings, hung out our banners and announced to the citizens our candidates and the withdrawal of London for a technical reason would simply paralyze our campaign and tend to help the enemy."

"Comrade London has been in the Socialist movement for over eighteen years and is well known throughout the country as an able agitator. For this reason, I respectfully request your committee to place a construction on Section 8, Article XII, so as to permit Comrade London to pay up his dues and allow his nomination to stand."

"After consideration, Berger moved: 'That it be the sense of the Quorum that the state organization of New York be granted full membership and full control over its membership, and can recognize anybody to membership if it sees fit, in accordance with Article 2, and Section 4, Article XII, of the National Constitution.'

"Furthermore, that as far as the construction of Section 8, Article XII, is concerned, in the opinion of the Quorum, anybody who is a member should be recognized as such until he has been dropped or expelled from membership by his respective organization." The motion was carried unanimously.

A delegate committee from the Bohemian Central Committee appeared and entered a verbal protest against Charles Pergler acting as national organizer. The National Secretary submitted communications from the Illinois state committee. Cleveland Bohemian branches and others upon the subject. After consideration, Berger moved: "That Pergler be requested to appear at the next meeting of the Quorum (Oct. 17) to answer the accusations of the Bohemian Central Committee." Carried.

Upon inquiry, the committee stated it was agreeable to have the four of Pergler continue until he could appear at the next Quorum meeting. The National Secretary suggested

that a telegram be sent to the convention of Brewery Workers in session in Indianapolis. Upon motion of Berger, suggestion was adopted and the following telegram was sent: "National Quorum of the Socialist Party in session sends greetings to the United Brewery Workers in convention assembled and hearty appreciation of the noble stand of Brewery Workers in all political and economic struggles of the working class."

At the second session on the following day Bery was made chairman. A telegram was read from Local Kings County, N. Y., protesting against Debs speaking in the afternoon in New York on the same day he was to speak in Brooklyn in the evening. The National Secretary was advised to get further information before acting.

A suggested call for the campaign fund, written by Comrade Debs, was read and Reynolds moved: "That the appeal be issued as read, sent to the Socialist press for publication, and issued in circular form with the endorsement of Quorum added; and that all individual contributions be sent direct to the National Secretary, 269 Dearborn street, Chicago, Ill."

Berger moved to amend: "That contributions be sent through state secretaries and that one-half be retained by respective state committees and the other half forwarded to the national office."
