CENTRAL LABOR UNION. Hot Weather Had Depressing Effect on Attendance. The hot weather had a depressing effect on the attendance at the regular meeting of the Central Labor Union last night, and the attendance was light.

The only new delegate seated was Chas. Phillips of the Beer Bottlers. Delegates reported as follows: Horseshoers—Terre Haute Transfer Co. still refuses to employ union men; new Ice Company had its horses shod in a non-union shop.

The Labor Day executive committee reported that invitations would be sent to all unaffiliated organizations in the city and to all surrounding towns at once.

The printing committee submitted a contract with Ward & Schaffer, granting them the programme privilege for 12 1/2 per cent of the gross receipts, they to print and distribute 5,000 copies.

W. H. Terrill resigned as trustee, and A. R. Markle and John Coorides were nominated to fill the vacancy.
