FIFTY THOUSAND **CITIZENS DEMAND** C. S. LAW REPEAL

Gov. Rolph Hides From Delegation, Sends Secretary, Who Passes Buck to Other Officials

A delegation of 25, elected at the Mooney-Harlan-Scottsboro Conference, representing 89 organizations in California, on Tuesday, January 19, presented the petitions for the Repeal of the Criminal Syndicalist Law, containing 50,000 signatures. to the state secretary at Sacra mento.

Sacramento workers' organiza tions wanted to greet the delega tion and escort it to the State Capi tol, but the state secretary, backed by the militia, would not permit that. The delegation was therefore met by the Sacramento workers at a large militant demonstration in the central city park. The demonstration was the biggest seen in Sacramento for a long time, and was very enthusiastic.

Try to Terrorize Delegation

When the delegation reached the State Capitol grounds, it had to go through a gauntlet of several hundred state policemen, who swarmed in every nook and corner in and outside the Capitol building. At the state secretary's office a whole host of state officials, including the attor ney general, as well as many re porters and plain clothes detectives, were waiting for the delegation, prepared to dispose of it (Continued on Page 2, Col. 6)

Over 2,000,000 Workers Affected By Spread of Bosses' Campaign

CHICAGO, Feb. 1-A 10 per cent cut in wages went into effect this week on the major railroads of the United States, as the result of an agreement arrived at in the Chicago parley between the employers' organization and the betraying representatives of the railroad workers. All attempts at compromise and arbitration by the officials of the Brotherhoods on behalf of the workers resulted in the usual defeat of the workers' demands and the ac-

Arbitration Subdues Struggle The railroads several months ago issued notice that a 15 per cent wage-cut must be instituted, in order to stabilize the operations of the railroad companies. The rank and file railroad employes opposed this cut from the beginning and the Brotherhood officials were compelled by their pressure to attempt to stop the intended reduction. Arbitration being the bosses' weapon of controlling the workers' organizations through the officials, the recent "conference" was merely a part of the railroad companies tactics and was in their favor from the

Labor Defense Attorneys Appeal Scottsboro Case

WORKERS' DEFENSE FORCES FREEDOM FOR DEC. 25 CASES

Judge Checked in Red-Baiting; Tried to Force Workers to Salute Flag

When the entire number of December 1 cases were called again by Judge Schonfeld on Wednesday. January 27, the workers faced a very weary judge. It was clearly evident that the capitalist judge did not relish the agony of another batch of self-defense trials. He had a good example in the trial of the first group of six, where the workers laid bare the whole system of boss terror. Nine of the 12 jurors voted "not guilty."

Twenty were given 10-day suspended sentences. The rest, who faced very heavy trumped-up mis demeanor charges, were dealt out 30 days suspended. Among the latter, Jack Berolla's three heavy misdemeanor charges (kept in reserve in the event of his acquittal on two felony charges) were disposed of with 10 days suspended on each.

Of the entire number, only one worker, Xavier Moreno, is serving 30 days for battery. He was convicted on a separate trial. Other charges against him were disposed of by a 40 days suspended.

Force Judge to Dismiss Case

Fred Bernard, secretary of I. L. D., was arrested near the court house on Thursday, January 28, and placed under \$1,000 vagrancy bail. This was on the heels of a new method by Judge Steiger in which he terrorizes workers by compell-

ing them to "salute the flag." The dicks told Comrade Bernard that he, too, would have to salute. In the meantime the International

Labor Defense wired strong protests against this red-baiting judge and his tactics, with the result that when Comrade Bernard appeared before him the following day he dismissed the case without his favorite practice of making the worker salute the flag.

Dick Durant and Emil Johnson, two workers jailed when they refused to "salute," will soon appear again. The I. L. D. will continue their defense. The I. L. A Lynch Atmosphere

The defense also proved the lynch atmosphere, the death verdict being greeted by a brass band, Negroes jim-crowed from the jury and court room, the betrayal of the Negro boys by Stephen Roddy, Ku Kluxer, who was appointed by the court to "defend" the boys.

The latest case in point is El Salvador. This small Central American republic has one and a half million people. Its chief crop is coffee, which totals 90 per cent of its exports. American capitalists have invested 26 million dollars in coffee plantations. During the past several years there has been so great an overproduction of coffee and such limited markets that Salvador exports have practically stopped.

The peasants and plantations workers were in most prosperous times near starvation level. With the intensification of the crisis the suffering of the people became incalculable.

The Terror in Southern California In another section of the Western Worker the story is told of the bestial brutality with which the police attacked the workers gathered at the Long Beach meeting. Workers were beaten, in one case into insanity and another into unconsciousness. With the exception of two, all of the prisoners were held incommunicado for four days. Even where cells with beds were available fifty-two of the prisoners were herded into a "tank" which had no beds and had sitting room for about thirty people.

The majority of the prisoners were laid up with influenza and pneumonia after they had been bailed out by militant workers in Southern California who were aroused by the cruelty of the bosses' terror as shown in the activity of the Red Squad and the Long Beach police department.

FREE SPEECH - ONLY FOR "YES-MEN"

When the attorney, Leo Gallagher, protested against the raid and the treatment which the prisoners were receiving, the police officials informed him that "these s- of b-s have no constitutional rights."

Apparently the right of free speech and free assemblage exists for those who agree with everything that the rulers of Southern California do, but if anyone opposes it, then "these s---- of b----s, have no constitutional rights." This is rather peculiar "democracy." It is not democracy at all. It is the terror of the capitalist class, frightened by the increased militancy of the great mass of workers against hunger, and is an attempt to cow the people into silent starvation.

DEMAGOGY IN BOSSES' PROPAGANDA

The press and other spokesmen of the boss class are issuing great volumes of words in an attempt to convince everyone that workers' and farmers' government, such as exists in the Soviet Union, would never be acceptable to the people of the United States. If that is so, why is it necessary to use such terrorist methods against groups of workers who gather to discuss how to improve their conditions?

Because these capitalist apologists do not believe what they themselves are saying. They know full well that the widespread growing militancy of the workers is a sign that the working class is growing in understanding and organization and is becoming increasingly disillusioned with capitalism. The bosses are desperately trying to stem the rising tide of working class support to the fight against wage cuts and for social insurance. That these raids followed on the heels of the successful Hunger March and the exposure of the bosses' starvation program is indicative that what we say is true.

REAL DEMOCRACY VERSUS LOS ANGELES TERROR

The police terror is covered with the excuse "you s---- of b---believe in the Soviet Union. You know d-n well that in the Soviet Union you would get shot for opposing the government."

May we inform these most "democratic" gentlemen that in the Soviet Union the leading newspapers are required to and do provide whole pages where the workers can expose any bureaucratic practices in the government or any anti-labor tendencies shown by government officials, factory managers, and other people in responsible positions. More than that. With the help of the Soviet Union and the Communist Party, flying squads of workers have been organized to go through the various factories, public institutions, and similar places, to investigate the conditions of workers, and where anti-labor or bureaucratic tendencies are shown these officials are promptly corrected or removed.

May we also inform these gentlemen that in the Soviet Union workers can recall elected and appointed government officials, should these officials not serve to the satisfaction of the people, merely by calling a meeting on a few days or even a few hours notice, submitting the question to decision and popular vote. In other words, while the Soviet Union does not allow counter-revolutionary terrorists to destroy the Socialist society which the masses are building, yet they provide the broadest democracy for useful citizens in order to be sure that the interest of the masses are protected.

Contrast this with the alleged democracy as exemplified in the activity of the Los Angeles Red Squad. Instead of the government providing means for popular expression of opinion and control, meetings of starving unemployed workers are smashed and the arrested vilely maltreated, strikes are broken with police clubs and imprisonment, and the elementary rights of free speech, assemblage and petition are abrogated. This is in the nature of capitalism. Real democracy can only exist in a workers' and farmers' government.

CHASING WILL-O'-THE-WISPS' First, let us consider the question of prohibition. Prohibition was advanced in the last decade as a means of insuring permanent prosperity. Now that prohibition has not insured prosperity, the abolition of prohibition is advanced as a means of insuring permanent prosperity. It is an everlasting will-o'-the-wisp . . . an apology for capitalism. We are against the prohibition law. It has inflicted great hardships upon the masses and has given the government oppressive power over the people of the United States beyond what the most centralized autocracy has ever had. But it is idiotic to say that prohibition is the cause of the crisis. If that is true, why is England, which has no prohibition, so seriously involved in the crisis? Why are the whole German people on the verge of starvation and
