"I call upon the united militant and revolutionary working class to accept this challenge," Tom Mooney says in a fiery reply to Gov. Rolph's denial of a pardon for this framed-up worker.

In his statement Mooney calls upon the workers to intensify the fight to free not only himself, but all class-war prisoners. "They must fight.'

The full text of Mooney's statement follows:

'Governor Rolph's denial of my pardon, in the face of indisputable proofs of my innocence, is a perfect and final vindication of the whole rotten frame-up system. The capitalist conspirators tried by the foulest of perjuries to do me to death on the gallows. They failed to hang me because the demonstration of the revolutionary workers of Russia in April, 1917, called the attention of the entire world to this monstrous frame-up. Having failed to lynch me legally, they decreed that I must die in prison. "And why?"

"Because I was an incoruptible and militant Trade Unionist, always alert and ever active in the interests of the working class. Because of this, I incurred the undying enmity of the labor-hating Public Utilitis interests of this state and their allies, the corrupt officialdom of the American Federation of Labor.

"They turned loose their hired perjuters and assasins, and at the hands of officials completely under the corrupt influence of th Dictatorship of Capital had me convicted on the slimiest framed-up perjured evidence, and have kept me buried alive for the past and best sixteen years of my life in a tomblike cell in San Quentin Prison.

"Governor Rolph and his advisers did not base their findings on the facts of my frame-up but merely carried out the bidding of their masters, men represented individually by persons like Herbert Flishacker, Harry Chandler, Robert Dollar, Frederick Koster, and William Crocker, and collectively by the Chamber of Commerce.

"What chance did I have of receiving a fair and impartial hearing from representatives of as unprincipled a bunch of pirates as ever scuttled a ship? None whatsoever! The cards were stacked and the dice were loaded against me!

"Lest I be accused of making 'wild statements, let us examine the line-up against me. First there was Governor James Rolph, Jr., of California, who needed advisers to 'look into the facts' of the Mooney case. He was mayor of San Francisco at the time of the

Preparednes Day disaster, and could not help knowing the facts of the dastardly frame-up against me. HE WAS IN THE OFFICE OF FREMONT OLDER, NOW MANAGING EDITOR OF THE SAN FRANCISCO CALL-BULLETIN, WHEN DRAPER HAND, A SAN FRANCISCO POLICE OFFICER, WHO HAD CHARGE OF THE WITNESSES IN MY CASE, CONFESSED THE PART HE PLAYED IN COACHING THE WITNESSES TO COMMIT PER-JURY AGAINST ME.

"For his trouble, Draper Hand was kicked off the police force on some pretext. That's what happened to a man for confessing his part in my frame-up. But what happened to the arch-framer, Charles M. Fickert, one of the leading instigators and executors in the conspiracy against me? FICKERT, CAST OUT BY HIS MASTERS, WAS PICKED UP OUT OF THE GUTTER BY GOV-ERNOR ROLPH AND APPOINTED BY HIM TO THE POSITION OF LEGAL ADVISER TO THE STATE MEDICAL BOARD!

"Governor Rolph's chief adviser was Matt I. Sullivan, formerly Chief Justice of the California Supreme Court. In their decision on Billings' pardon application, the California Supreme Court proved its bitter prejudice against Mooney and Billings. When MacDonald came to California to confess his perjury before the Supreme Court, THEY ARRIVED AT THE STARTLING CON-CLUSION THAT HE WAS LYING IN 1930 WHEN'HE TOLD THE TRUTH, AND TOLD THE TRUTH IN 1916 WHEN HE WAS LYING! FIGHT AGAINST HUNGER, TERROR AND WAR

Communist Election Platform

State of California

We are in the fourth year of the crisis. For the workers of California and of the nation this has been the most serious crisis in the history of the U. S. In California alone in the last two years, one worker out of every two lost his or her job. For every dollar which workers in California received in wages in 1930 they receive only 45c today. Hunger, evictions, gas and electric shut-offs have caused an appalling number of people, willing to work but unable to find any, driven to despair, to commit suicide. It is a matter of record that in Los Angeles alone as high as thirteen people have committed suicide in a single day.

When workers presented their demands for relief, the city and state officials first tried to fool them with speeches full of promises and failing, met them with police clubs and arrests. Men, women and children, on the State Hunger March to petition the Governor for relief during January 1932, had their heads cracked open by thugs of the Los Angeles police department, had a water hose turned on them by Madera city officials, were run out of Monterey County by motorcycle escort, had the leaders arrested, jailed and in one case incarcerated in an insane asylum and were threatened and brow-beaten in every part of the State, in a desperate effort of the bosses to prevent the State Hunger March demonstration from taking place.

Terror Against Starving

When the wrath of the people of California against the corrupt Rolph machine was demonstrated by 100,000 people on January 11 in San Francisco, the State Government answered this not with food, clothing or other forms of relief but with mass arrests and abolition of the ordinary right of citizens to meet and assemble, notably in Los Angeles, Long Beach and San Francisco. Workers striking against wage cuts had the whole State Police force mobilized against them. Negro and Filipino neighborhoods were terrorized and workers arrested on the slightest excuse or without any excuse, beaten without mercy "to keep them in their place." Mexican workers were torn from their families and run across the border without any semblance of a trial on the excuse that the Immigration Officials were "reducing unemployment." In one case, Arispe, a World War Veteran who served in the American Army, the father of four American born children was deported to the swamp-infested region of Acupulco, because he was "suspected of Red ideas."

While the capitalist politicians were using the severest brutality to beat down any attempts of the working class to improve conditions, there were enriching themselves by plundering public funds. It is an open secret that City and State payrolls are padded in order that the corrupt political machines of the bosses may have larger funds to distribute as patronage. More than three times the original estimate of the Hetch Hetchy project has already been spent altho its completion is not yet in sight. Judges and leading politicians in Los Angeles have been caught red-handed accepting graft. Prostitution, bootlegging, and gambling are protected by the capitalist politicians because of the huge graft in them. Los Angeles is officially listed as third in the country in the extent of its vice.

"Public Works Program" A Fraud

In his letter to the Hunger Marchers, Governor Rolph refused to do anything about rendering relief but did promise a public work program. To date this public work program has turned out to be a colossal fraud. Not a shoveful of dirt has been turned on the proposed Golden Gate Bridge. The number of Hetch Hetchy workers have been reduced, not increased. The State Labor camps only accomplished this: that they threw out of work many workers legitimately employed at regular wages in the Sierras. The Associated Charities, likewise, compels thousands of workers to displace wage-earners for the price of a basket of groceries and carfare. Eight hundred thousand workers are pacing the streets and highways of California jobless; but while these men and women are unable to find work, thousands of young children are forced to sell papers, work in the canneries and on the fields at all hours of the night with great detriment to their health. Those workers who once had jobs have had their wages slashed to a starvation level. The workers in the agricultural fields have had their wages slashed as much as 40-50%. The railroad workers were cut 10% and are threatened with still more cuts. There is hardly an industry in the State where the workers have not been cut at least 10%.

ment. The so-called conservation measures in the oil industry, the reduction of acreage in the agricultural industry, the elimination of trains on the railroads—these are only a few of the outstanding examples.

Workers and Farmers of California!

What has this meant to us? These miscrable conditions are rapidly reducing us to beggary. In the midst of plenty we are starving. While we must leave our crops to rot in the fields, the farms are being confiscated and the workers of the cities are dying of starvation precisely for the lack of this produce. Thousands of tons of food are being destroyed in an effort to maintain price levels.

What are the bosses and the bosses' government doing about it?

The whole State is being filled with huge army, navy and air bases. We are being put on a militarist footing in preparation for a new war. The campaign of the capitalist press to increase military fortifications in the San Diego, Los Angeles, and San Francisco harbors means a greater war burden of taxes upon us.

A. F. of L., Socialists Aid Bosses

Together with the capitalist officials who openly work as agents of the bosses against the workers, the leaders of the American Fededration of Labor and the Socialist Party have united against any protest of the working class. In the northern part of the State, the A. F. of L. leader organized a fake Union Labor Party which in no way represents the interests of the workers and is established only to mislead the people into supporting their enemies, the present city and state administrations, which they endorsed. It is a notorious fact that the leader of the Socialist Party, Cameron King, has been given a soft job by the Rossi-Rolph machine in S. F. City Hall as payment for services rendered them in helping to suppress the protests of the workers. In Southern California, Buzzel, the head of the A. F. of L., is working hand in hand with the Red Squad, to ferret out those workers who propose to fight against wage cuts, to strike and to picket against worsening conditions. T. A. Reardon, formerly one of the leading bureaucrats of the A. F. of L., has now become Rolph's chief advisor against the workers.

The Socialist Party has tried to split and mislead the jobless workers by pretending to organize demonstrations for relief separately from the Unemployed Council movement and then deserting the workers at the last minute, thereby throwing confusion into the ranks of the unemployed and helping the bosses. The notorious Hynes of the Los Angeles Red Squad openly boasts that Busick of the Socialist Party calls him in to cooperate against the Communists and other militants.

These boss agents are partners to the outrageous exploitation of human misery by the Associated Charities which compels starving workers to work all day for carfare and a basket of groceries each week, or in the case of single workers only for a bowl of soup. These same Associate Charities refuse on every pretext, food to starving families although it has collected tens of millions of dollars for that purpose. The largest part of these funds collected under the guise of feeding the starving, have been turned over to such organizations as the YMCA, Boy Scouts, and other militarist and semi-militarist bodies.

Communist Party Leads Struggles

Every fight for unemployment relief, for social insurance, against boss terror, against imperialist war, for the protection of women, youth and children, has been led by the Communist Party. It is for this reason, that the Communist Party has been hounded by the police and immigration officials, by the A. F. of L., by the daily press, the courts and other agents of the bosses.

Against Unemployment and Wage Cuts

 To give every unemployed worker immediate cash relief, no evictions, gas and electric shut-offs, because of non-payment of rent by the unemployed.
 We demand a permanent system of social insurance at the expense of the employers providing for full wages to the unemployed workers, support of sick and aged, and for the support of women unable to work because of child-birth.

3. These funds shall be raised by a graduating tax on all incomes above \$3,000. All salaries of city officials above \$3,000 shall go to the relief funds, and no taxation of city employees earning less than \$3,000 per year.

4. Immediate stopping of all wage cuts. All contractors on city and state jobs to be forced to pay union rates of wages. All private fee-charging employment agencies are to be abolished.

5. We are against all discrimination now being practiced by the City administration especially in the distribution of relief to Negro, Chinese, Japanese, Filipino, and other foreign born workers.

Against Bosses' Terror and Police Brutality

1. We demand the abolition of all ctiy regulations which interfere with the unlimited right of workers to meet, organize, strike, demonstrate or picket on the streets or in halls.

2. The immediate abolition of the "fink" agencies and the black-list system on the water-front and in all employment offices.

3. The immediate release of Mooney and Billings, the Imperial ψ alley and all other political prisoners.

4. The repeal of the State Criminal Syndicalism Law.

5. The right of workers on city and state jobs to organize.

6. The control of all jobs distribution on city relief jobs by committees elected from the ranks of the unemployed.

7. The abolition of vagrancy laws.

8. We demand the abolition of special police squads for persecuting workers, such as the Los Angeles Red Squad.

Fight Against the Pauperization of the Farmers

 Farmers shall have the right to a minimum return for their labor put in irrespective of the claims of banks or other credit corporations.
 2. All foreclosures shall be strictly prohibited.

3. Government insurance for live stock and crop losses.

4. Immediate reduction on all water and power rates.

Protection of Working Women, Youth and children

We demand the immediate abolition of all child exploitation and support, from Government funds, of the children now working.
 We demand the abolition of all rules which discriminate against women and youth in the distribution of city relief jobs.

3. We demand that all young people who are old enough to work shall have the right to vote.

4. We demand free lunches, clothing and carfare for workers' children in public schools.

Against War Preparations

1. We demand the right of soldiers and sailors to organize into trade unions and workers clubs; to have the right to discuss political questions, and to fight for the improvement of their conditions.

2. We demand the right of all soldiers and sailors to vote.

3. We declare ourselves against all military preparations, the creation of new air bases, navy bases, military colleges and fortifications, on the

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Farmers Driven Off Land

Throughout the State farmers are losing their land. The Bank of America is conducting a campaign called "Back to Good Times," but its land subsidiaries are foreclosing on the farms, driving the farmers off the land and pauperizing the whole country population. The farmers are unable to find a market for their produce and railroads insist on payment in advance for freight charges before they will accept the produce for market. Even those farmers who in previous years were able to make a comfortable living are today losing the roofs over their heads. The farmers working irrigated land are dispossessed by foreclosures and the land turned into desert because the banks are tearing up the pumps in order to reduce the taxes. Thus, rather than let the farmers eke out some livelihood, the government and the banks are turning irrigated land into desert land.

In all industries the State and the bosses are combining to reduce production and throw still more workers into unemploy-

All events have proven that this government is a bosses' government. That under this Government no permanent solution can be found for the misery and suffering which is the lot of the workers and poor farmers today. That only the destruction of the bosses government and the profit system which it protects, and its replacement by a government of workers and farmers which abolishes private ownership and runs industry for the social benefit of the producers can find such a permanent solution. It is precisely because the workers of the Soviet Union have shown this correct road that huge military preparations are being made for war against it. Unemployment has been completely abolished, the conditions of the workers are continually being raised to a higher level in striking contrast to the every deepening crisis in the capitalist world. The candidates of the Communist Party pledge to carry on the fight against such a war and to promote the closest alliance between the masses of the American workers and farmers and those of the Soviet Union, against the imperialists who want war.

MOONEY MAKES STIRRING REPLY TO ROLPH'S ACTION DENYING PARDON

"The Supreme Court is one of the Sacred Cows of Capitalism, and woe be unto him who offends its dignity. With the exposure of Henshaw, the great traditions of the Sacred Cow were dashed into the mud. Since that time, five governors have held office in California; the California Legislature has met at least once every two years; the American Bar Association meets annually; and the San Francisco Bar Association meets regularly, but not once have these dignitaries of the Law and the State ever mentioned the Henshaw bribe publicly and demanded that it be investigated. Silence has pervaded the atmosphere of California's officialdom on this \$410,000 bribe of Justice Henshaw of the California Supreme Court.

SULLIVAN-HANGMAN

Sullivan, with the traditions of the Supreme Court behind him, was a step in the direction of killing, from the start, any chance for a favorable decision on my pardon application. "Another 'adviser' was Mr. Lewis F. Byington. IN FOLLOW-ING THE HOOK-UP BETWEEN MR. BYINGTON AND THE UNITED RAILROADS, REMEMBER THAT THIS ORGANIZA-TION WAS ONE OF THOSE THAT WAS LARGELY INSTRU-TION WITH MY PARDON APPLICATION.

"Lewis Byington was an attorney for Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads, when the latter was tried at the time of the San Francisco Graft Prosecution. He is a nephew of Tirey L. Ford, who was chief attorney for the United Railroads, also implicated in the San Francisco Graft Prosecution. Mr. Byington has a nephew, who is a detective for the United Railroads. For prosecuting the grafters in the graft scandal involving officials of the United Railroads, District Attorney Francis J.⁴ Heeney was shotdown in open court. Charles M. Fickert was the United Railroads candidate for District Attorney, who, when elected, appeared in court and moved for the dismissal of the indictments. Martin Swanson, detective for the United Railroads, together with Charles M. Fickert, were the leading lights in instigating my frame-up. I incurred the undying enmity of the United Railroads when I tried to organize their platform men who went out on strike in 1916, just a few days before the Preparedness Day disaster, Weinberg and Billings were framed because they refused to accept \$5,000 offered them by Swanson to become a part in the conspiracy against me. Had they accepted the bribe to testify against me, they would have been the Oxman and MacDonald in my case.

saw us was when we were pointed out to him in the police station after our arrest. Lieutenant-Governor Carnahan, while examining John MacDonald before Governor Young and the California Pardon Advisory Board, August-2, 1930, proved beyond all shadow of a doubt, that what MacDonald swore he witnessed at the scene of the explosion was not only untrue but a physical impossibility as A well.

IGNORE EVIDENCE

"It is not a matter of evidence that is holding Mooney and Billings in prison. The Capitalist Dictatorship holds us there because they fear the effect of our release on the working class. As a leading member of th San Francisco Chamber of Commerce told Duncan Aikman of the Baltimore Sun, in reply to the question, "Then if Mooney is to your satisfaction proved innocent of the Preparedness Day murder, you believe in finding a way of keeping him in jail permanently?' 'We've got a way,' he answered earnestly, 'He's there.'

"The comment made by Edward A. Cunha, Assistant District Attorney, who was caught red-handed in the perjury plot to hang me, is also symbolic of the attitude involved in Governor Rolph's decision. Cunha cynically remarked: 'If I knew that every single witness that testified against Mooney had perjured himself in his testimony I wouldn't lift a finger to get him a new trial,' and further he said, 'If the thing were done that ought to be done, the whole dirty, low-down bunch would be taken out and strung up without ceremony.'

"This decision proves the utter impossibility of any militant worker ever securing justice at the hands of capitalist-controlled courts, governors and other politicians.

"To think they needed twenty-five or thirty thousand words to 'arrive' at a decision! JUSTICE DEMANDED ONLY THREE WORDS-'MOONEY IS INNOCENT.'

CLASS DECISION

"Capitalist clas hatred and prejudice demands the life of Tom Mooney, a militant worker of the working class. The issue is so clear-cut that a blind, man can see through it. It is a class decision, with a class motive, and along these lines it shall be fought out in the future.

"The Capitalist class will, no doubt, celebrate this decision as a great 'victory' for them. A few moret such victories and the Capitalist system will be ready for the junk-heap, where it historically belongs.

"Does this decision settle the Mooney case? Not by a long shot! The fight for my freedom must and will go on. I have grown old in prison before my time, but my head is erect, my back unbent, my spirit untamed. They have forced me to the wall. Fight I must and fight I will! I am ready and willing today, as always, to give my life to the cause of the toilers of the world, regardless of race, creed, color or nationality.

"It is not Tom Mooney, the individual, that they hate-it is what Tom Mooney, the militant worker, symbolizes that they (the ruling class) despise and want to crush beneath the Iron Heel of the Capitalist Juggernaut.

"This decision in the face of world-wide protest against my brutal frame-up is an insolent and sinister challenge hurled by a doomed Capitalist system into the teeth of the entire working class.

CALLS FOR MILITANCY

"I call upon the united militant and revolutionary working class of the entire world to accept this challenge. They must close ranks and raise louder than ever the demand that th Plunderbund of California let go their victim. They must fight not only for my freedom, but for the abolition of the Capitalist system. It is the only thing that will prevent, in the future, the framing-up of workers for loyalty to their clas. "They must also demand that the framed-up Scottsboro boys do not die, and defend the Harlan miners and all political prisoners. With millions of aroused and determined workers and sympathizers rallying to my defense we will yet smash this frame-up and the whole vicious frame-up system."

Acute lead poisoning happens very seldom except when a large amount is taken at one time. Cosmetics, hair dyes, and face powder very often cause poisoning.

In general symptoms occur first in the muscles: twitching in the muscles, cramps in the calves of the legs, cramps in the abdomen are the very early signs, A very important sign is a blue line along the margins of the gums at the base of the teeth. Nausea, metallic taste and fetid breath are other common symptoms. With these signs there are always present constipation, coated tongue, and unbearable thirst.

PRECAUTIONS

For every worker, who comes in contact with lead it is very important to know how to prevent this serious and painful disease. (1)-Use separate clothing to

(2)-Before meals always scrub

the hands with soap and warm water; rinse mouth and teeth with warm salt water (half of a teaspoonful salt in a glass of water). (3)-After the days work, if it is at all possible take a bath or wash the whole body with warm water and soap, because absorption occurs through the skin,

Rinse the nostrils with warm

salt water. Besides these precautions, workers should demand that the employers keep the shop well ventilated and clean from dust. If the boss refuses to do this, the work-

When the periodic crises of capitalism in the highly industrialized East brought a demand for more land, it was found in the West. Great farms arose, the fruit and vegetable industry was the marvel of the world. When the expansion of eastern industry brought the demand for oil, copper, lead, zinc, etc., it sent millions of workers west to get them. Huge cities sprang up and farms where deserts were before. When capitalism needed new markets they went to the Orient and Pacific Coast ports became thriving centers of activity.

Horace Greely told all the youth to "Go West," the land of promise.

The West-Then and Now!

Look at West now! Millions of unemployed. Hunger stalks every city, town and farm. The forest of once great oil gushers in Texas, Oklahoma and Southern California are deathly still. The canneries for fruit, vegetables and fish are working at about 20% capacity at this writing, which is near the high point of the season. Acreage is being systematically cut by the great landowners and the banks. Metal mining is as dead as a door nail. The lumber camps are silent. The shipping corporations are begging for trade with the Soviet Union in order to revive their dying hopes for "prosperity." The Southern Pacific, the Nortern Pacific and other western railroads have cut trains, shut down whole sections and in some cases have abandoned regular freight schedules and let their locomotives pull out only when they can get a "load." The West, like all of U. S., and world capitalism, is in severe crisis and decay.

Bosses Yearn for War

All the capitalists of the West are looking longingly for the spread of the war in the Orient-they hope that that will be a good way out of the crisis for them. A great imperialist war in the Orient will mean increased shipping of munitions across western railroads, via Pacific ports on the Dollar and other western lines. It will mean new profits for the cotton growers, for Hercules Powder and other munitions corporations, for increased demand at profiteer prices for metal, foods, oil and other products. War means a new epidemic of "patriotic hysteria" against "radicals." That's fine for the bosses.

WASHINGTON, April 22 .--The State Department admitted today that a larget number of American consulates abroad have asked for "data" on the Scottsboro case.

This is striking confirmation of the tremendous internatoinal protest aroused against the lynch frame-up of the seven Scottsboro boys. Fiery demonstrations have taken place in numerous European capitals.

Mass protest meetings continue to be held thruout the U. S. against the sentencing of the boys to the electric chair for May 13, while protest resolutions pour into the office of Gov Miller of Alabama, Lawyers for the International Labor Defense are at the same time preparing an appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

LENIN ON ROLE OF MAY 1

The Russian revolutionary movement utilized May Day to great advantage. In the preface to a pamphlet, "May Day in Kharkov" published in Novmeber, 1900, Lenin wrote:

"In another six months, the Russian people will celebrate the first of May of the first year of the new century, and it is time we set to work to make the arrangements for organizing the delebrations in as large a number of centers as possible, and on as imposing scale as possible, not only by the number that will take part in them, but also by their organized character, by the classconsciousness they will reveal, by the determination that will be shown to commence the irrepressible struggle for the political liberation of the Russian people, and, consequently, for a free opportunity for the class development of the proletariat and its open struggle for Socialism (Communism).

(Lenin, "The Iskra Period," Bk. 1, p. 44).

It can be seen how important Lenin considered the May Day demonstrations, since he called attention to them six months ahead of time.
