Japanese Communists Sentenced

TOKYO, Japan, Oct. 29.-Seventeen more, the last of the 202 ommunists arrested in raids since 1928 were sentenced here today. Four including one for whom the prosecution demanded a death sentence were given life sentences, the others got from 9 to 15 years mprisonment.

The only charge against the defendents was that they are Comnunist. The fascist Patriotic Youth was mobilized to put down deonstrations expected to take place in the court.

25 Young Communists Executed

CANTON, China, Oct. 31.-Desperately trying to put down the Communist wave which is spreading in South China, the Canton government has executed 25 young Communists today.

Spanish Police Shoot Jobless

GIBRALTAR, Spain.-Ten workers were shot by the police at Santander during a demonstration of Unemployed.

Insurgents Gain in Manchuria

HARBIN, Manchuria.-The Japanese military position is being seriously menaced in Manchuria. Insurgent forces already in control of Northwestern Manchuria are making a drive towards Tsitsihar from he North and West.

The situation is made more serious for the Japanese by the fact hat more Manchukoa troops have deserted and are aiding the insurgents.

Ktsuji Debuchi, is touring Manchuria, before returning to his post as ambassador to the U.S.

Argentina Unemployed Increase

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Nov. 3.-There are now 333,997 unemployed in Argentina according to the registration of the Labor Department.

English Spinners to Strike

LONDON, England, Nov. 3 .- The spinners have rejected the proposals of the union leaders, to accept a wage cut and will join the 200,000 weavers now on strike.

Two hundred thousand more are affected. This will close the mills completely.

Sandino Attacks Imperialists

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Oct. 29 .- At least 60 are believed to have been killed when Sandino forces ambushed a patrol of the Nicaragua National Guard. Immediately the entire student body of the Military Academy with U. S. Marine Corps instructors were rushed to the scene. The policy of the U.S. government is to train a National Guard

MADRID, Spain, Oct. 31.-Students at the University of Madrid have gone on strike, until such time that Premier Herriot of France who is here will depart. This is in protest to what is considered an attempt to involve Spain in Imperialst War.

The anti-Jim Crow demonstration defendants were arraigned before Judge Luxford, another pliant tool of the boss system. This anti-working-class fanatic took the job of prosecution away from the district attorney, and instead of trying the men on the charges ogainst them, his questions and vituperations were directed at the fact they were leaders in working-class activities. His viciousness was fanned to a flaming heat by the presence of a court room full of militant white, Negro and Mexican workers.

Attorney Menin protested against finding the defendants guilty on the basis of issues outside of the case, and was summarily jailed for contempt of court. Kaplan was given four months.

The police grew active after the trial and hace incessantly terrorized workers and their families. "Vagrancy" charges are being placed against workers, some of themregistered voters and long time residents here. The cases of Kaplan and Guynn are being appealed, and a desperate stand is being taken to check the efforts to railroad all class-conscious workers and Communists to jail on trumped up vagrancy charges.
