There was no floor in the tent and recent heavy rains had so flooded the ground that the interior of the shelter had been soaked, wetting such bedding as the family possessed, and making their floor a mud puddle.

The workers found that she had been evicted from a nearby house. They also learned that she had been working for the local branch of the Salvation Army for three years, but that this organization not wanting her services longer had refused to help her find a house in which to live. She had been compelled to live in this tent, and to sleep with her children in a bed laid on the soaking wet ground.

The workers immediately moved ner and the children back into the house from which she had been evicted, and from all reports she is still there.

Editorial Column GET BEHIND THE VACAVILLE STRIKE!

That the strike of the 400 Vacaville agricultural workers against a wage cut is of even greater significance than the number would indicate, is quite obvious, even if we are to judge by the prominence given in the capitalist press.

The bosses do not take it as mere local struggle. The police and deputy sheriffs of all the towns in the vicinity have been mobilized to crush the strike.

The National Guard is likewise held in readiness.

But the struggle is also significant for other reasons. In the first place most of the strikers are of the "home guard" element. This refutes the idea among many that only migratory workers can be counted upon for militant struggle. In fact we have already seen examples of the finest courage and militancy in struggles of agricultural workers in recent years. Of special significance is the fighting spirit displayed by the women strikers.

Despite the efforts of the bosses to pit one race against the other, splendid solidarity has been displayed by the American, Spanish, Fillipino and Japanese workers.

Secondly, we have a clear demonstration that here where the workers have a union, the wage cut was stopped at least temporarily. The bosses already offered some concessions which, however, are far from satisfactory, and other ranches in the vicinity which would naturally follow suit with a wage cut, continue paying the old rate.

Thirdly, the strike follows immediately after the election, and is chiefly against Frank H. Buck, Congressmanelect on the Democratic ticket. The millionaire ranch owner illustrated to the workers what could be expected from the Roosevelt administration on a national scale. Before the election he promised the workers \$2.25 per day, but three days after the election, announces a cut from \$1.50 to \$1.25 and an increase of one hour per day in the bargain. Most of the workers on strike probably voted for Frank H. Buck, the Democrat, but in experience they are now finding that it's the Communiist Party and the Agricultural Workers Industrial Union that lead them in the fight for an existence wage.

The strike also gives a splendid example how the struggle for relief lays the basis for a union. It was only since August that the workers heard of the Agricultural Workers Industrial Union, when four of the organizers leading hungry families to Winters for relief were arrested. Two of the same organizers have now been arrested as strike leaders.

The fight of the Vacaville strikers is the fight of all workers. They are now on the firing line, making a stand against the wage cuts which are reducing the standards of the workers virtually to boxes of groceries and carfare.

The last Executive Committee session of the A. F. of L. for the first time went on record for Unemployment Insurance.

We Communists, however, immediately pointed out that this was not a serious proposal, that it was only an effort to stem the movement for Unemployment Insurance among the A. F. of L. membership and to divert them from supporting the Unemployment Insurance bill, proposed by the Unemployed Council and the Communist Party.

We are told that the federal courts ruled that Federal Unemployment Insurance would be unconstitutional, the_ refore the policy must be carried out on a state scale. The model plan offered is the one proposed in Ohio. The emplovers are to pay 3% of the total weekly pay roll for a fund out of which the Unemployed would receive benefits for a maximum of sixteen weeks per year of an amount equal to one half of the weekly wages, but not to exceed \$15 per week.

In the first place the amount provided in total is hardly more than that obtained through charity channels in many cities now. Half the normal wages, in most cases will amount to between \$5.00 and \$8.00. And don't forget Green makes no próvisions for rent, gas or light, and what you get is for only 16 weeks out of a year.
