.. There is no chance for compromise or excuse. The Republican and Demecratic Parties alike stand for a policy, which means the robbery of the working people. The difference between the two old parties concerns factions of the capitalist classes only.

The Republican party represents the large money interests and it is at least honest enough to say so. Mark Hanna stated the case in two words in his speech last Saturday: "STAND PAT". The interests he represents are satisfied. They have the whole governmental machinery back of them. The legislative, executive and judicial branches are in their control and they mean to retain them.

The interest of the Republican Party in the working class is the interest of a slaveowner in his slave. He must be fed and clothed to be fit for work, while the wealth he produces goes to his master.

The Democratic Party represents the dying middle class and the disgruntled factions of the capitalistic class, who are being squeezed to death by the consolidation of wealth.

Its pretended freindship of the working class is well expressed in the following doggerel:

"When the Devil was sick, the Devil a saint would be.

But when he got well, the Devil a saint was he." Let the condition of the miners in West Virginia, the injunctions of democratic judges and child slavery in the South testify to the Democratic Party's interest in the working class.

Both parties defend a system of society by which the producing classes are robbed of the product of their labor.

ANY SO-CALLED REFORM, IN SHAPE OF TARIFF REVISION, REF-ERENDUM, MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP AND THE LIKE DOES NOT TOUCH THE VITAL QUESTION AT ISSUE-THE ABOLITION OF THE WAGE SYSTEM THROUGH THE COMMONOWNERSHIP OF THE MEANS OF PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION. FOR THIS REASON WE OF THE SOCIALIST PARTY ARE EQUALLY OPPOSED TO BOTH PARTIES, REGARD BOTH AS THE ENEMIES OF THE CLASS TO WHICH OUR PARTY BELONGS AND WHICH OUR PARTY REPRESENTS-THEWAGE EARNING CLASS.

Frivate ownership of the means of production and distribution is responsible for the ever increasing uncertainty of livelihood and the poverty and misery of the werking class, and it divides society into two hostile classes—the capitalists and wage-workers. 
