The inquiry is in such general terms and takes such wide scope that anything like a comprehensive answer would fill a book without exhausting the subject, while a review of the "interviews" would embrace the whole gamut of absurdity and folly and produce a library of comedy and tragedy. Not one of the replies I have seen has sufficient merit to be printed in a paper read by grown folks, and those that purport to come from leaders of labor and representatives of the working class take the prize in what would appear to be a competitive contest for progressive asininity.

The leader, so-called, who puts it upon record in a capitalist paper and gives the libel the widest circulation. that Chicago is alright, so far as the workers are concerned, that they have plenty and are prosperous and happy. is as fit to lead the working class as is a wolf to guide a flock of spring lambs

LABOR WORLD. John Mitchelli in advocating the acceptance of the arbitration proposition to the miners the other day said a mong other things, "THE INTERESTS OF LABOR AND CAPITAL ARE NOT IDENTICAL". This is good and com-ing from Mitchell is in a way remarkable. Mitchell by his executive ability in handling the great coal strike has won the admiration of the entire country. The only criticism ever heard against him was his close association with Mark Hanna and the National Civic Federation. Hanna's main argument has been that the interests of labor and capital are identical. Evi-dently the strike has shown Mitchell a new light that the teaching of Hanna cannot overcome. The interests of labor and capital are not identical, and the man who says they are has either not studied economic conditions, or he like Hanna wilfully trying to befuddle the minds of the workers of the country. When men like Mitchell me out openly and declare that the interests of labor and capital are not identical, it helps to show the class lines more distinctly. When the work-ers of the country awake to a full realization of the fact, strikes will not be necessary.

NOTES FROM THE

The Free Labor Association of Sreat Britain which is holding its tenth annual convention now in the city of Leeds, England, has come out with a virulent attack on trades unions. The president John Chandler said that the excess of trades unions in violation of personal freedom was a disgrace to of the Socialist Party of the State of labor in general. To those who do not know what this Free Labor Association really is, it may be well to state it is composed of scabs who have organized for the purpose of being able to supply men to take the place of strikers whenever trouble arises. Their love for unions therefore cannot be expected to be very strong, but were it not for trades unions this scab association could not live, as the members of it work only when the others are on strike battling for their rights.

Once more the sacred inviolability of an agreement between employers and employes has been brought to the front. . The employes in the wholesale grocery houses made an agreement with their employers providing among other things that the men should be classified into separate divisions and paid accordingly, and that differences should be submitted to arbitration. The merchants did the classifying, with the result that old men in the service who were members of the anion were reduced, while the nonanion truck-shover was taken off the sidewalk and placed in a good position. This was done to show the men that the union was a detriment to them and that they should desert it. Instead of descriing the union they went an strike, and the Chicago Federation ative-Rice Wasbrough. of Labor raised a yell against violat-ing agreements and ordered them to work. Of course the other fellow didn't violate his part of the agreement. Strikes are not blessings and they should be avoided wherever, but the much praised principle of arbitration has some drawbacks.
