## **ELECTION AFTERMATH.**

Some Remarks on the Defeat of the Labor Candidates. The Scab's Reward.

The gratifying growth of the Socialst vote throughout the country and especially in Chicago is mainly due to that most active agitator for our cause -capitalist development.


