The "Suggested Lines of Social Municipal Activity" which are given at the close of this article are to be considered simply as a sum total of the various suggestions that have been thought worthy of consideration by one or more members of the committee. They were compiled after careful ...mparison with a large number of municipal programs in this country as well as those of the European Socialist parties. Whatever may be said of its defects or merits, it is probably the most complete outline of municipal activity yet gathered together and should furnish material for intelligent discussion. It is probably not approved of as a whole, by any single member of the committee, and still less is it to be considered a special recommendation of the committee, and, least of all, does it partake of the character of a proposed platform for Socialist municipal bodies. Such platforms may evolve from it in the future, and it is hoped that it will be of assistance in the formation of such platforms to various cities.

So far as I am personally concerned, I am of the opinion that a municipal platform could be best made up of a plain revolutionary demand for the overthrew of class rule and a statement of the need of the application of colectivist Finciples in mun cipal activity. This would constitute the oner and would be about the length of those now ordinarily adopted In addition to this an elaborate program of probable action could be prepared based upon the suggestion given herewith. This should be accompanied by an explanation that would need to be a rather extensive document, discussing and explaining the various provisions adapted to local needs and show how these form a part of a complete revolutionary program. This was the position which I took at the Indianapolis convention with regard to our National platform, and I have, as yet, seen no reason to change my mird. I say this, because there is persistent misrepresentation of the attitude taken by those who oppose "immediate" demands" in the form in which they now appear in the majority of our plat.
