profesor of political economy in Chi-cago University, and we would advise all Secialist teachers and speakers to read this book, so that they may be posted in regard to the wonderful knowledge displayed on economics by plutocracy's intellectual slaves who teach economics in our great subsidized institutions. The dangerous thing about it, however, is that this book is gotten out by the American Book Co. and is being used in great many of the schools and colleges of the country; will be lacking to see that this book is supplied in any number to every educational institution in this country. The teachings of this book are en tirely wrong as to the origin and development of capital, the theory of value, the laws of wages and of diminishing returns; it is totally errone ous on the subject of rent, profit and interest, regarding these as being the natural product of capital, instead of coming out of the earnings of labor The work is a mixture of the classical and historical schools of political economy; it contains no scientific economy. It has a chapter on Socialism, which confounds modern scientific Socialism with the old state So cialism. This chapter is a tissue of misrepresentation of Socialism from beginning to end. Towards the end the book contains a great deal of cant about the identy of true Chistianity with capitalist economics. It looks very much as if John D. Rockefeller himself wrote this particular chapter on Christianity, or it may have been complied from the notes of one of John D. Rockefeller Jr.'s Sunday

### Stuffed Pay Rolls at Springfield.

A timely report by the Legislative Voters' league deals with the disgraceful waste of public funds at Springfield Briefly the facts are said to be that 334 persons are now on the public pay rolls as employes of the house and senate the daily cost of their socalled services being \$825.25, though a statute limits the number, of appoinfees to seventy-three at a total cost of \$218.50 a day. The figures given are the average of forty days' pay allowed this horde of clerks, jaintors, police-men and what not from Jan. 7, when the legislature first met, up to Feb. 19 though during that time the house and senate were in session but seven teen days.-Editorial in Chicago Daily News.


