As a result of these social economic and political institutions we find at one extreme an educated, thoughtful and refined class of the few, on the other a more numerous body ignorant and still worshiping charms and images and gods little better than demons with elaborate ritual ceremony, them. > At no time in the history of human society has the ruling class been very particular as to the means employed hands. It is the natural result of the class struggle. Russia is no exception. Indeed there is no exception to this rule. The expression of the class struggle may vary in character-the rule is the same. In modern capitalistic states the ruling interests are indifferent to religous professions, therefore no anti-simitic movements. To the American capitalist a Jew and a Christian look alike. The capitalist wants this, and when the proletariat refuses or rebels, the American capican capitalist is not very particular as to how the proletariat is subduedstarvation or bullet, it is immaterial to the capitalist. It is this which makes the history of human society a history of continual robbery and slaughter!

The Jews have been driven from Spain, not because they were not chrisitians, but because of the class struggle. Modern capitalism was not established then and the expression of the class struggle was torture and expulsion from the state instead of legalized murder by militia and federal troops as is done here in the United States.

The Jews have been admitted to Russia, Poland, Germany and England as beggars, and treated as beggars not because they have been a demoralized and degenerated people, but because of the class struggle. Whatever the Jew is to-day is due to the treatment received at the hands of the respective countries that admited and permitted him to live therein!

In Russia and Poland he was admitted under conditions not to become a craftsman or a professional; he had no right to ocupy any political or military office, he was denied admittance to any and all the educational institutions. He was but to become a trader or a money lender. Under such conditions whatever noble aspirations killed. Whenever the nobility needed money they went to the Jaw. -He dared not refuse, the lash never left his back. Humiliation and insult was his lot! To free himself from the lash, he finds bribery a good means. He finds money buys him tranquility and peace and he throws himself heart and soul into money making. MONEY BECOMES HIS MESSIAH, HIS CHRIST. From the philosopher, the refined, the brave he becomes the ignorant, the filthy, the supersitious, the cunning, the coward, the petty trader and the usurer!

But the conversion of the Jew did not stop the class struggle. The antagonism of class interests, of wages is here and is going to last as long as the proletariat has not fullfilled his historic mission.
