We don't believe in abolishing the rights of property; and therefore we are endeavoring to secure those rights for every useful citizen.

We don't believe in paternalism, therefore we wish to prevent the law from favoring a few monopolists.

We don't believe in losing our individuality; and therefore we object to a grinding process that stops numan development, condems nine-tenths of us to monotonous drudgery, and one-tenth to a life of apish etiquette and frivolity.

We don't believe in diminishing incentive and ambition; and therefore we resist a state of things which places everything worth striving for beyoud our reach.

We don't believe in the destruction of the family, and therefore we paytest against a social system that has broken up our homes and fostered vevery species of licentiousness.

We don't believe in less morality; and therefore we are trying to establish a purer, nobler and more brotherly state of society.

A friend of mine wrote to me the other day; "You are too radical. You are making the people discontented with your utterances. You are liable to stir up a revolution, and then you'll b sorry. It is true there are many reforms needed in our present system, but be conservative, be calm."

I was sitting with my friends lett r in my hand, duietly thinking over what he had written, when my eye fe l upon a copy of the Life Boat, published by the Life Boat Mission of Chicago. I picked it up and began to read. I ask yon to read it. Read about the wife whose husband was sick -no, job, no coal, no food, no friends. Wealth-millions of it-on every hand. Plenty of food, plenty of coal, and ye this woman and her sick husband and her three months' old baby were s arving, and this woman had gorb out on the streets to sell herself for fi ty cents with which to buy food for her loved ones. Ye gods! Isn't it ti ne some one was, getting radical? If this be the product of conservatien, may God strike me dead for ever thinking of being conservative! I have three little girls of my own growing up into womanhood. When I pick up one of them, and look into her laughing blue eyes, the thought comes to ma: - How do I know but that some day she too may stand in the streets of some great city and beg of passers by to buy her soul for fifty cents with which to buy for her sick husband something to eat? It's not impossible under the damnable system we live under. And then I am asked to be caim! Oh yes, I'll be calm, and I'll urge my brothers to be calm; but it will be the calmness that preceeds a cyclone.

. It is in order to remind the workers that capital is always class conscious. The monopolists may hate each other with the greatest intensity, but the moment special privileges are attacked, presto, there is a cessation of hostilities and all unite to fight the common foe. There is only one body of workingmen in the world who compare with the capitalists in this respect, who are likewise ready to lay aside personal differences to fight for the rights of their class; who meet organization with organization and ballot with ballot; who cannot be led, cajoled, compromised with or driven. That body of men are those within the Socialist movement and they are destined to yet make the big brutal blustering giant who owes his existence to the ignorance of the masses, bite the dust.
