The Durango Trades Journal of reent date has the following to say with egard to the clear cut character of the Socialist movement throughout the entire civilized world: 'A feature of the late elections in

the German empire for members of the reichstag, deserving more than passng notice, is the marked gain acade by the Socialist Party in the membership of that body. For many years the Socialists of Germany, as well as in several other countries of Europe, have had a growing political party that has made its influence felt in a powerful way. There is at the present time not a parliamentary body in Europe that has not one or more Socialist members. The party being international in scope of its organization is substantially the same in every country in the world. There may be, and there undoubtedly is, considerable latitude given to the party in each country and each locality, but fundamentally it remains the same in all

A world-wide fundamental of the Socialist program is the one that prohibits fusion with any other political tonomy of the organization, and however small it may be, prevents it being swallowed up and absorbed by any other political party. This policy also between it and its rivals. There are no entagling alliances to straigten

out. When success does come to the Socialist Party it can move forward in the work of giving practical expression to its principles without undue annoyance. There may, and doubtless will be

ome diversity of opinion as to details, but there can be no serious difference as to fundamental principles. Aiming to establish an industrial government instead of a political onethe mere matter of electing men to office, of securing official positions for individuals is considered of small consequence. The Socialist Party has therefore aimed to educate the masses of the people to its principles and made no strenuous effort to increase its vote more rapidly than the convictions and the educational training of the rank and file of the voters would warrant.

The great capitalist bourgeoisie

does not choose to work, either with

its hands or its brains; it chooses beastly and cumbersome luxury; it does not even deign to occupy itself with politics; men like Rothschild, De Lesseps, Vanderbilt, Carnegie, Rockefeller, do not run for office; they find it more economical to buy the officers than the voters, and more convenient to put their clerks into the ministries than to take part in parlimentary struggles. The big capitalists interest themselves only in the operations of the stock exchange, which afford the delights of gambling; they dignify these by the pompous name of "apeculations"-a word formerly reserved for the highest process of philosophical or mathematical thought. The capitalists are replacing themselves in the supervision and management of the great industrial and commercial enterprises of the police in time of strike. 

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
