

production was brought in by the

great inventions and discovery of steam power. James Hargreaves in 1770 invented the spinning-jenny. This was a machine that held many spindles side by side and these spindles being run by machinery the work of many times the old hand spinning wheel was accomplished. In 1771 Arkwright put in operation his water-frame, which was an improvement on an earlier invention. In 1776 Crompton combined these two into Crempton's "Mule" This drew out the raw material when it had recoived its first twist by an adaptation of the water-frame and passed it on to be twisted into yarn by an improvement on the spinning-jenny. These three inventions greatly increased the spinning power but the weaving was still done by the hand loom. In 1785 Dr. Cartwright patented the power loom and now modern industry re delved a new impetuous through the discovery of a power that would enable it to grow to vast proportions. 
