BOSSSES WANT CHEAP LABOR

Workers Regarded Only as Source of Profit.

The Owning and Ruling Classes See Their Interest in Labor's Degradation—Human Rights and Feelings Count for Nothing in Their Eyes—The Coming Demand for Chinese Exclusion Repeal.

The most work for the least wages is the one standard by which our ruling classes judge the virtues of workmen. A Panama canal is to be dug. It will require a great deal of very hard work under terrible climatic conditions.

SOUTHERN BOSSES WANT COOLERS. But it is not only for Panama that coolie labor or other degraded cheap labor is being considered. The organs of the plantation-owning and mill-owning class in our own Southern States are already beginning to clamor for the repeal or relaxation of the Chinese exclusion act.
