TWO TRUSTS.

Steel and Automobile Trusts Mark New

Again there has been a movement in the great developement of concentration that is of sufficient importance to dethe socialist. Two trusts of more than ordinary significance have been formed The first of these is the new steel trust which was fully described in these co umns a few weeks ago. It was then pointed out that this is truly a "trust of trusts" and that in this age of steel its owners literally had a steel grip on everything in sight.

Just now the point to be noticed is the relation of this movement to lab At the head of this tremendous mass of capital is Henry C. Frick, a man known far and wide for his bitter hostility to labor. He was the man who originated the "nothing to arbitrate" po-sition, and developed the idea of a privately trained body of Pinkertons to shoot rebellious wage-slaves into submission.

He is now placed in a position where his employes will be as helpless in his grasp as any negro in the hands of a Southern plantation owner before the war. There will be but one employer in not like the treatment they are receiving they can just simply go and starve.
If they get rebellious in any one mill, it will not be necesary to even go to the expense of shooting them down. The work can simply be done at another establishment where the workers are duced where local conditions are favor able and this reduction used to force all other establishments down to the same level. This playing of different localitles against each other has ities against each other has been worked to perfection in the coal trade, and to some degre in the packing industry.

The other trust which is particularly worthy of our attention is the au tomobile trust. This is significant as showing a combination of vario phases of a related industry. This trust, which finds its base in a new form of transportation, the control of whose patents secures a monopoly and of using that power to crush out the older forms of transportation, makes a combination with them. Thus even competition between improvements and outgrown conditions is done away with and each new invention but strengthens the old monopoly.

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

The Socialist Labor Party of the United States, in Convention assembled, re-asserts the inalienable rights of all men to life, liberty and the pur-

suit of happiness.

With the founders of the Americ With the founders of the American republic we hold that the purpose of government is to secure every citisen in the enjoyment of this right; but in the light of our social conditions we hold, furthermore, that no such right can be exercised under a system of economic inequality, essentially destructive of life, of liberty and of hap-

with the founders of this republic we hold that the true theory of politics is that the machinery of government must be owned and controlled by the whole people; but in the light of our industrial development we hold, furthermore, that the true theory of economics is that the machinery of economics is that the machinery of the state of the s production must likewise belong to the

people in common.

To the obvious fact that our despo-To the obvious fact that our despotic system of economics is the direct opposite of our democratic system of politics can plainly be traced the existence of a privileged class, the corruption of government by that class, the alienation of public property, public franchises and public functions to that class, and the abject dependence of the mightlest of nations upon that class. Again, through the perversion of Democracy to the ends of plutocracy, labor is robbed of the wealth which it alone produces, is denied the means of self-employment, and, by compulsory

self-employment, and, by compulsory idleness in wage slavery, is even de-prived of the necessaries of life. Human power and natural forces are thus wasted, that the plutocracy may

Ignorance and misery, with all their concomitant evils, are perpetuated, that the people may be kept in bond-

Science and invention are diverted from their humane purpose to the en-slavement of women and children.

slavement of women and children.

Against such a system the Socialist
Labor Party once more enters its protest. Once more fit reiterates its fundamental declaration that private
property in the natural sources of production and in the instruments of lahor is the obvious cause of all econbor is the obvious cause of all econ-omic servitude and political depend-

The time is fast coming when, in the natural course of social evolution, this system, through the destructive action system, through the destructive action of its failures and crises on the one hand, and the constructive tendencies of its trusts and other capitalistic combinations on the other hand, shall have worked out its own downfail.

We, therefore, call upon the wage workers of the United States, and upon all other houses citizens, to organize

all other honest citizens, to organize under the banner of the Socialist La-bor Party into a class-conscious body, aware of its rights and determined to aware of its rights and determined to conquer them by taking possession of the public powers; so that, held together by an indomitable spirit of solidarity under the most trying conditions of the present class struggle, we may put a summary end to that barbarous struggle by the abolition of classes, the restoration of the land and of all the means of production, transportation and distribution to the people as a collective body, and the substitution of the Co-operative Commonwealth for the present state of planless production, industrial war and social disorder; a commonwealth in which every worker shall have the free exercise and full benefit of his faculties multiplied by all the modern factors of civilization.

IMMEDIATE DEMANDS With a view to immediate improvement in the condition of labor we present the following demands:

1. Reduction of the hours of labor in proportion to the progress of pro-

2. The United States shall obtain possession of the railroads, canals, telegraphs, telephones and all other means of public transportation and communication; the employees to operate the same co-operatively under the control of the Federal government and to elect their own superior officers.

3. The municipalities shall obtain possession of the local railroads, fer-ries, water works, gas works, electric plants and all industries requiring municipal franchises; the employees to operate the same co-operatively under the control of the municipal ad-ministration and to elect Their own superior officers, but no employees shall be discharged for political rea-

4. The public lands declared in-alienable. Revocation of all and grants to corporations or individuals, the conditions of which have not been

complied with.

5. The United States to have the exclusive right to issue money.

6. Congressional legislation providing for the scientific management of forests and waterways, and prohibiting the waste of the natural resources

of the country.
7. Inventions to be free to all; the inventors to be remunerated by the nation.

8. Progressive income tax and tax History of the Commune of 1871to be exempt.

9. School education of all children

9. School education of all children under fourteen years of age to be compulsory, gratuitous and accessible to all by public assistance in meals, clothing, books, etc., where necessary.

10. Repeal of all pauper, tramp, conspiracy and sumptuary laws. Unabridged right of combination.

11. Prohibition of the employment

of children of school age and the em-ployment of female labor in occupa-tions detrimental to health or morality. Abolition of the convict labor system. 12. Employment of the unemployed the public authorities (county, city,

state and nation).

13. All wages to be paid in lawful money of the United States. Equalizmoney of the United States. Equalization of woman's wages with those of men where equal service is performed.

14. Laws for the protection of life and limb in all occupations, and an efficient employers' liability law.

15. The people to have the right to propose laws and vote upon all meas-

ures of importance, according to the referendum principle.

16. Abolition of the veto power of

the executive (national, state and municipal) wherever it exists.

17. Abolition of the United States Senate and all upper legislative cham-

bers.

18. Municipal self-government.

19. Direct vote and secret ballots in all elections. Universal and equal right of suffrage without regard to color, creed or sex. Election days to be legal holidays. The principle of proportional representation to be introduced.

20. All public officers to be subject to recall by their respective constitu-encies.

21. Uniform civil and criminal law throughout the United States. Admin-istration of justice to be free of charge. Abolition of capital punishment.

Platform of Socialist Labor Party.

Chicago Municipal Campaign of 1899.

The Socialist Labor Party of Chicago, by its delegates in convention assembled, declares its adherence to the principles set forth in the national party platform!

We hold that the present miserable condition of the working class of Chicago, as well as of the rest of the capitalist world, with compulsory idle ness, uncertainty of employment, and small portion of his product received by the laborers when permitted by the capitalists to work, is caused by the private ownership of the means of production and distribution by the capitalist class.

We, therefore, pledge our nominees, if elected, to immediately comply with the following demands:

Plank 1-The city shall furnish employment to all unemployed citizens by the establishment of public works to be operated co-operatively under the control of the municipality.

Plank 2-We demand the municipaligation of all public means of transportation, lighting and communication, the same to be operated co-operatively under the control of the municipality, the services to be furnished at cost to ali, with wages of all employes as high as are paid for similar services by any private employers, and eight hours to constitute portionally shortened.

Plank 3-We demand that no pains be spared in giving a thorough, free and system and the substitution therefuniversal education to all children the co-operative commonwealth.

in the public schools; that sufficient school buildings be immediately erected to afford adequate accommo dation for all children of school age; that the laws against child-labor be strictly enforced; and that provision be made for feeding and clothing school children where necessary, and that all school books be furnished

Plank 4-We demand that the medical and sanitary service of the city shall be so organized as to secure to all good medical care free of cost.

Plank 5-We demand that the city provide free and commodious public baths and gymnasia; small parks to be located in the densely populated workingmen's quarters of the city. and free public drinking fountains for both man and beast in each ward Plank 6-We demand the abolition of the veto power of the mayor and the adoption of the initiative and referen-

Plank 7-We demand that in all cases where workers are obliged to resort to strike the city government shall furnish every possible assistance to the strikers
