"CHILD Labor" is the work of children at unfit ages under the most unhealthful conditions.

They cannot get education there which they need in order to get on when they are older.

They cannot get recreation which they need in order to be strong and healthy. They should not be working in those filthy, dirty slums, while the children of another class, the capitalist class, go to beaches and sip cold sodas and sit under big umbrellas.

But comrades, why do the children have to work in mills, factories, mines, sweat ons, stores, bundle wrappers in beet fields, sufficiently, on farms, salesberge and salesgirl?

They have to work because their parents cannot get work or are paid in such a small amounts that it is not enough to live on and dren to work instead of schools.

in order to live, they must send their chil-And because the capitalists profit by employing children, because children will work for less pay, because the capitalists say that children cannot work as good as grown ups and because they have skillful little hands that can make many fancy little things such as pasting dots on face voils, putting beautiful feathers on beautiful hats that their mothers never even had on for a second, carding dress snaps. But if the parents of these children would organize into one mass strike and get their pay which they are supposed to, then there would be no child labor for the parents would have enough to live on

But best of all, the parents and the children should organize and form one mass of Communists, they could overcome the capitalists and then there wouldn't be a man richer than the other, no partiality and best of all, no "Child Labor."

But, comrades, child labor does not mean that working of children in their homes helping their parents a little by washing dishes or running on errands or peeling potatoes. No, not if these tasks are given in small amounts. But of course, it is not good in large amounts.

In Russia children do not work until 18 years of age and then they only work four hours a day until they are of age to work eight hours a day.
