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### GREAT LEADER DIES

A NOTHER old Bolshevik has died A as a result of sacrifice and over-work in the cause of the revolution. This time it is Felix Djerjinski, who died on the 20th of July from heart

Felix Djerjinski was one of the most heroic figures of the Russian

revolution and of the world working revolution and of the world working class movement. In him there was no thought, no desire, no wish that was not for the revolution and for the freedom of the working class. He carried out the Pioneer pledge to the last letter: One aim thruout my life—freedom for the working class.

Under the Czar, Comrade Djerjinski was born in 1877. By 1885 he was already active in the working class movement. He was soon arrested and sent to S. beria. But he continued his revolu tionary activity and was arrested and imprisoned many times, so that he spent many long years in the czarist dungeons.

Fighting the Counter-Revolution. In 1917 Comrade Djerjinski was a leader in the revolution and when the workers triumphed and the So-viets got all power he was entrusted with the most difficult job of fighting the counter-revolutionists. These agents of the Russian and international capitalists were carrying on a bitter campaign against the workers government - shooting Soviet of ficials (that's how Lenin was shot), blowing up bridges, destroying fac-tories, and in other ways trying to ruin the government of the workers. The workers set up a special committee to fight these counter-revolutionists. This committee was called the Extraordinary Commission for the Fight Against the Counter-Revolution, in Russia it was called the Cheka and Djerjinski was nut at the head of it. He save was put at the head of it. He gave up his whole life to the defense of the revolution and was rewarded when he felt that the workers' government was safe

Building the Economic Life.

Then Djerjinski was transferred to another difficult position in the workers' government. He was made people's commissar of internal affairs, of transportation, and later on chairman of the supreme council of public economy. He was also the head of the state political administration (the police). In these tasks it was his job to build up the eco-nomic life of Russia, and this he did wonderfully well.

'Discovers" That Pioneers and Young Comrade Support Passaic Strike

#### "DISCOVERY" MOVE AGAINST STRIKE

THE Passaic bosses are desperate! Every method they have tried to break the strike has failed! Police terrorism could not even make a dent in the workers ranks. The fake "company union" schemes which the bosses tried to use to fool the work-ers through fake organizations they called "unions" but which were really controlled by the bosses had no better success. Then the bosses tried and are still trying to frame up the strike leaders just as bosses in other part of the country have framed up Sacco and Vanzetti, Tom Mooney and other labor leaders and sent them to prison on fake charges for things they never did. But this also failed.

The Scabby "Citizens' Committee."

Now as a last resort the bosses have turned to their "Citizens' Commit" This is supposed to be "impartial" and "neutral." But really it is nothing more than a tool of the bosses and its purpose is to fool the workers of Passaic and of other parts of the country and weaken their solidarity and tighting spirit. This bunch of scabs called the "Citizens' Committee" is trying to tell the workers that the strike is lost, that the Passaic mills are a paradise, that the strike leaders are not to be trusted, and so on. But the workers recognize his "committee" for what it is and pay no more attention to it than they would to the mill bosses' dogs. (Continued on page 2)

The carpentry and other work strikers, and the cost of equipping the playground was very small.

Food and Sunshine.

The playground is equipped with a children's kitchen and milk station, and the kids are given a nutritious meal and lots of milk during the day. Women of the United Council of Workingclass Housewives take care of the kitchen and milk station.

Order is kept in various novel ways. One method is by song. "Sit down, sit down, this is a union town" will invariably send the children squatting on the grass. Perfect discipline is maintained without ever a cross word maintained without ever a cross word from the leaders. Religious instruction of children is prohibited and the priests are not allowed any longer to form any political parties or interfere in politics in any other way.

The church and religion in Mexico supports and defends the big land owners and the foreign bankers who have been sucking the blood of the Mexican people for a long, long time. Now the government of Mexico, which stands for the little Mexican capitalists against the rich land owners and against the foreign capitalists, has decided to smash the strongholds of darkness and reaction—the church. 
A Martyr to Revolution.


