WORKERS' CHILDREN FIGHT BOSSES WAR **ON AUGUST** 1st

Demonstrate With Parents Against Bosses War Preparations

Fight Jingoist Boy Scouts Cleveland Pioneers Lead Kids to Demonstration

Millions of workers came out on the streets on August First, all over the world, to demonstrate against bosses wars and for the Defense of the Soviet Union. In every country - France, Germany, Indo-China, Spain, China, etc., thousands of workers and their children answered the call set by the Communist International to demonstrate on this day against the preparations of the bosses for another war and to prevent the bosses in uniting to attack the Soviet Union.

In the United States there were huge demonstrations of workers and children in every large city of the country. In New York City 30,000 workers assembled on Union Square to hear the speakers of the Communist Party and Young Communist League tell them how to answer the attacks of the bosses and fight bosses wars. Thousands of children were present at these demonstrations showing their solidarity with the adults. At most meetings there were child speakers who spoke in the name of the masses of exploited children and pledged the support of the workers children in the struggle against the bosses' preparations for war and the attack against the Soviet Union.

Meanwhile the bosses are going on with the preparations for the coming war. The U. S. bosses are trying very hard to get the Soviet Union into a war. They know that the Soviet Union is ruled by the workers and farmers and they are afraid that the American workers might follow the example of their Russian comrades and here too kick the bosses out and run their own government. CHINESE MASSES **BUILD SOVIETS AS REVOLT GROWS**

Hands Off China!

The Red Army of China, consisting of the terribly exploited peasants and workers of China, are making rapid advances in taking China away from the foreign and Chinese bosses and for the Chinese masses.

The city of Changsha, one of the most important in that part of China is in the hands of the Red Army. The revolutionary workers and peasants are sweeping the entire Yangtze Valley, headed for the big city, Hankow. The Chinese Boss government at Nanking and the Imperialist bosses are all shivering with fear that China will be taken by the enslaved masses, as was Russia in 1917.

The foreign governments of England, United States and Japan are all afraid that the profits that the bosses of their countries have made from the sweat and blood of the Chinese workers and their children will be lost to them. They are therefore, making all preparations for the suppression of the successful revolution of the Red Army. There are in China at present at least 40 gunboats and thousands of troops belonging to the foreign bosses to see to it that their property is "protected." The United States which has such bosses as Standard Oil, etc. to "protect" has sent hundreds of more Marines, in addition to those that are there, to see that the workers are defeated. In 1927, when the Chinese masses last revolted, the United States was one of the leaders in intervening and helping in the suppression of the revolt.

The workers children of the United States must rally to the support of the Chinese Revolution. We must help the millions of Chinese child laborers and starving Chinese children free themselves from their slavery. We must demonstrate with the adult and young workers for their support. We must prevent the boss government from intervening by protesting and showing our solidarity with the Chinese children.

POLICE, FAKERS KILL THREE WORKERS IN ONE WEEK

Two workers have been murdered by the police in New York. They were shot down because they demanded better conditions for the workers. One of them a Negro worker, Alfred Levy, died after being severely beaten by police. Levy and a group of workers were present at a meeting of Garvey where they exposed the fake attempts of this organization to free the Negroes from their misery under capitalism. Levy died a few hours after the police had beaten him up.

Gonzalo Gonzales, a Spanish comrade was shot by a policeman a few days later. On his way to the place where the body of Levy was being held, Gonzales and a group of Spanish workers were stopped by a policeman who did not like the idea of the workers demonstrating against the death of Levy. The policeman upon attacking the workers pulled out his gun and shot Gonzales to death. These two workers died fighting for their class.

Two big funeral demonstrations were held in New York. The Pioneers took part in both. At the head of the lines were the Pioneers with a big banner which said "Always Ready." Many Negro children joined the parade, others cheered the Pioneers and promised to join. All along the line the children with ragged and thin bodies, all real workers' children kept asking what is the matter? What has happened? What do the Pioneers stand for? Why were the two workers killed? Many joined the Pioneers. The weather was hot but the Pioneers marched steady and sang the International with great spirit. None of the Pioneers or the workers are crying because they know that it would not help. Instead the Pioneers sang and pledged to continue the fight of freedom for the working class.

In Chicago, another worker, Comrade Weizenberg, was murdered while giving out leaflets and trying to organize the workers. He was murdered by an American Federation of Labor thug who was sent by the bosses to prevent the organization of the workers. The Pioneers of Chicago marched together with the workers in solidarity, with the murdered comrade Weizenberg. Workers Children! Young Pioneers! Are

Workers Children! Young Pioneers! Are we going to allow the bosses to kill our fathers? Are we going to allow the bosses to lynch Negro workers? Organize and join the Young Pioneers!

MURDEROUS NEW YORK POLICE GIVE OUTINGS TO KIDS

The New York police that have murdered two workers in the last month and that have put our Comrade Harry Eisman in jail for 6 years, are trying to fool the workers children. The officials of the Police Dept. who are very anxious in preventing the workers and their children from fighting for their interests have used the following scheme of trying to make the workers children forget their suffering and misery.

The police of New York have all contributed from their pay to a fund to be used for excursions of children up the Hudson. Two such excursions of children have already been held. In each case a few hundred children have gone along, only those children having passes which they can only get from a cop in their section, being allowed to board the boat. In this way you can easily imagine what kind of children went along. They were of course mostly workers children that can't afford to go on excursions. However, any one of these children that might have shown any interest in or try to help the Pioneers or any group of workers children would never have had a chance to go along on any police excursion.

In this way the police who carry out the instructions of the bosses and their government try to make the hundreds of thousands of workers that are out of work, and the millions of children that are suffering from lack of food and clothing, forget their misery. The workers and their children in New York will not be fooled so easily. They will rally under the banner of the Communists and the Young Pioneers and will fight for a workers' and farmers' government. A government in which the workers children will be able to get excursions free and regularly and not have to let bosses police fool them with fake excursions.

Unite Children In Fight For Jobless Insurance

On the 4th and 5th of July the first National Conference of Children of the Unemployed met at Chicago. This conference, the first of its kind in working class history, was represented by 30 children from seven different states of the country.

The conference of children of the unemployed was held in conjunction with the National Unemployed Conference called on the same date by the Trade Union Unity League. At the conference of the adult unemployed workers there were 1,500 delegates representing the unemployed of the entire country.

Plans were made for the holding of demonstrations of unemployed workers all over the country on Labor Day, September 1st. On this day the workers and their children will storm the streets and expose the fake Labor Day by fighting for WORK OR WAGES!

At the conference of the children of the unemployed we discussed the conditions of the children that we represented and of the children of the Unemployed all over the country, and how to fight against it. The two main slogans around which this conference centered were: 1 Free food and clothing for the children of the unemployed. 2. The immediate and unconditional release of Harry Eisman. After all the delegates had related the conditions of unemployed workers children, we drew up a draft platform for the clubs of the children of the unemployed. This platform included our two main slogans and also the abolition of child labor with state maintenance of the children who are at present unemployed. We decided to go back to all our cities and start spreading the message of the conference. Helping in the formation of the Clubs for the children of the Unemployed, we also decided to go back to our organizations and carry on an intensive campaign for the immediate and unconditional release of Harry Eisman.

Comrades! We must go forth and carry out the decisions of this conference. Every one of us must help carry on the work for relief for the children of the Unemployed. Join in the demonstrations of the Unemployed workers and their children before and on Labor Day! Raise the slogans of free food and clothing in the milk stations, playgrounds, and schools! 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CHILD MASSES Hail Second World Meet

Twenty thousand children and adult workers demonstrated at Halle, Germany at the conclusion of the 2nd world meet of workers' children.

This meet and conference of workers and farmers children from all parts of Germany and different countries of the world lasted from July 23 to the 27th. This is the first time in the history of the workers children of the world that an International gathering of such a kind has been held in a land still under bosses control. Last year the first workers children's meet was held in Soviet Russia, where the workers and their children are free from all forms of bosses' oppression and slavery. The success of last year's meet resulted in the calling of the 2nd World Meet in Germany by the workers children of that boss controlled country. The city of Halle, is in the center of Germany and was therefore selected as the place for the meet. This made it easier for the German workers' children to come from every city and town in Germany, representing the hundreds of thousands of child laborers, and the millions of



unemployed and oppressed workers and children of this country.

Before the conference of children from all over the world was held, a great demonstration of workers and children took place in Halle. Then came the monster Spartakiade or Sports meet in which participated child athletes from all over the country and even from different lands. This great sport festival was held under the supervision of the Labor Sports Movement of Germany and exhibited the strength of the workers children, which they are building to be better prepared to use for the IN THE WORKERS CHILDREN'S CAMPS

HARRY EISMAN **GREETS CONGRESS**

Jail Will Not Break His Militant Spirit

I went to see Harry Eisman about 3 weeks ago. He was at the Hawthorne Jewish Reformatory, or in plain English, a jail. You all know about Harry, I'm sure. He is the militant Pioneer who was arrested on March 6th, because he stayed out of school

on that day and went to the demonstration of the workers against unemployment.

The bosses' courts then sentenced him to jail until he was 21 yearse old, which means more than 5 years in jail.

Very few visitors are allowed to visit Harry. The bosses are afraid that any news of him will leak out to the workers' children on the outside. Once in six weeks, two of his relatives are allowed to see him. We could see him for only 2 hours, and while we talked, we were watched by one of the guards there. Harry's mail is not even given him. Many letters that are sent to him are stopped by the guards, because they want to make him feel lonely and break his spirit.

I couldn't speak to Harry of everything I wanted, because of the guard. He was

First Sacco-Vanzetti Murdered and Now Frame-up of Atlanta Six

In August, 1927, two of the brave fighters for the workingclass, were murdered by the Massachusetts bosses. Sacco and Vanzetti today stand before the workingclass as two martyrs for the revolution. Even though the facts of the case were in the favor of Sacco and Vanzetti the bosses' justice took the life of two men who had done nothing but fight for the interests of the workers. Even though the real murderer of the paymaster of Baintree confessed the bosses electrocuted Sacco and Vanzetti.

Today there stands before us another one of the frame-ups of the bosses. The Georgia bosses are attempting to railroad

I told him about the 2nd World Congress of the workers' children that was held in July in Halle, Germany. The 5 months that Comrade Harry has

spent in jail has had no effect on him, and he is still a fighter for the workers and the workers' children.

Harry sent greetings to the Pioneers of the whole world at the International Congress in Germany, and told them to keep up the fight against the bosses.

When I had to leave him, he said to me, "Tell all the pioneers and the workers' children who are fighting to get me out of jail not to lose hope! My spirit will not be broken by the bosses and their police! I call upon all workers' children to join the Young Pioneers! Comrades, for the cause of the working class, STAND READY!"

the six organizers sent down into Georgia to organize the white and Negro workers to fight the rotten conditions which exist in the "sunny south."

The bosses arrested them and dug up an old law made just after the civil war which



gives the death sentence for any one who is found guilty of sedition.

While they were in jail the bosses worked up a lynch wave under the leadership of the Ku Klux Klan. They threatened to lynch the five organizers and also any Negroes who started to fight the race oppression and exploitation in the South. Now these organizers, Powers, Carr, Newton, Dalton, Storey, and Burlak are facing death either by the hands of lynch gangs or by the hands of the bosses justice.

The International Labor Defense is rallying the workers to the defense of these six comrades and the workers the world over are protesting this railroading. The workers' children should also rally behind their parents and fight against this threat against the workingclass in the south.

The workingclass children should remember the murder of Sacco and Vanzetti, Joe Hill, the railroading to life in jail of Mooney and Billings and the many other martyrs of the workingclass. When the date of the Sacco and Vanzetti memorial comes around the workers children should protest with their parents against this attempted murder of the Atlanta 6 and demand their release.

WORKERS KIDS OF U. S. A. HAIL YOUTH DAY!

16 years ago, on September 6th, 1915, in the midst of the World War, when millions of workers were being killed to make more profits for the bosses, there was held in the city of Berne, Switzerland, a conference of young workers. This conference was called to take up the question of fighting the war, and mobilizing the youth for a revolutionary struggle against capitalism.

This conference was led by the great fighter against militarism and war, Karl Liebknecht. Since that year, the youth have gathered on that day every year to demonstrate against bosses' militarism and war and to pledge revolutionary struggle against the boss class. The children of the workers, having the same interests as the young workers join in the demonstrations and activities of the young workers on this day.

This year, International Youth Day will be celebrated for the 16th time on Monday, Sept. 8th. What are the conditions of the workers' children today and why must the workers and farmers children of the United States demonstrate this year as never before? With 8 million workers walking the streets without jobs, 3 million children work on farms, in factories and on the streets of "prosperous" America. Millions of children are without food and clothing. What is the government doing about this? Nothing. All it does is to help the bosses prevent the workers from striking for better conditions and beating down those workers that do struggle for a hetter living.

While more and more children are slaving away the best part of their lives to increase the profits of the bosses, the workers children are being prepared for boss wars. JOHNNY RED LEARNS ABOUT CODES

Johnny Red told us that he is interested to know how you tackled the problem of decoding the message that he was trying to decode in the first installment. Write to the Editor of the Young Pioneer and let Johnny know.

Here is how he did it. First, he went into his older brother's room and took a book on codes from the book case. He learned from reading this that he must first find out what language the code was in. He decided that it was English. Then he saw that he must find out how many times each character was used. He found that 'W' was used 24 times, 'I', 21 times; 'R', 14 times; 'B', 13 times; 'U,' 11 times each; ' ϕ ,' 9 times; 'A' and 'K,' 7 times each; 'G' and 'N,' 6 times each; 'Q' and 'Y,' 5 times each; 'S' and 'T,' 4 times each; 'O,' 3 times; 'F' and 'V,' 2 times each; 'C,' 'H,' 'J,' 'X,' 'Z' and ' $\frac{1}{2}$ ' once each.

From the book, he learned that in English, the letters most frequently used and placed in line in the order in which they are most used are like this: E, A, O, I, D, H, N, R, S, T, U, Y, C, F, G, L, M, W, B, K, P, Q, X, Z.

Taking this table, he tried to find out if 'W' in the message really meant 'E' if 'I' meant 'A' and etc. These were the most often used in the note that he was working out. But he saw that in the message, '¢ stands alone once and 'U' stands alone twice. He learned from the book that there are only two letters in English that are used alone like this. These are 'A' and 'I'. This didn't agree with his chart of the letters used in the message nor with the chart in the book. So he read on further and found that in a short message, it was not always possible to decode with this method. It was then that he began to type the original message and still thinking of the 'A' and 'I' which are used alone in English, he noticed that when he wrote 'U' on

So Johnny found out that Tom Quinn was a snooper and solved the puzzle of the code message that was found at the Pioneer meeting. Thinking that it would be a good thing for all Pioneers to know something about codes, he started a game. He coded a message with a code that he found in the book and after telling his Comrades how to use the method that he read about in the book he gave them two weeks to find the solution. Woll, Whalen, Fish and Other Labor Haters Investigate Pioneers

During the last month, the bosses as represented by such politicians as Congressman Fish and a few others, have begun an investigation of the Communists in the U.S.A. The Communists have been very successful in organizing the workers and their children and the bosses are very scared that the workers in this country might do what the Russian workers did. In order to prevent that, Congress, which is the political machine of the bosses has donated \$25,000 to start the work of investigating the activities of the Communists, which means trying to force the Communist Party out of existence.

The bosses were frightened most when they heard about the reports of the activities of the Young Pioneers in the Public Schools in different cities. This is not a surprise because the bosses know very well that the workers' child of today is a worker in a very short time. They also know that

Vienna, Austria-At the last Heimwehr Parade in Innsbruck not only shock troops with fixed bayonets participated, but also TEN AND TWELVE YEAR OLD children marched carrying bayonets on their belts. The Heimwehr are the Fascists, in the most cases small business men and professionals, who are used by the bosses to prevent the workers from organizing and making the revolution in Austria. This parade was legalized by the government which allowed these reactionaries to parade completely armed. Had the workers done the same, there would have undoubtedly been much bloodshed caused by the attack of the government police and soldiers on the workers. Dr. Stumf who is the chairman of the National School Council, and a very big fascist (supporter of the Bosses) is the one responsible for the arming of the school children to participate in the parade. He, as the tool of the bosses, made the arrangements for the children of workers to be armed by their school authorities and to participate with these fascists in the parade.

The lesson to be drawn from this for workers' children everywhere and for us in America is that we must take every occasion to learn the use of arms for the workingclass and not allow the bosses to militarize us for their interests. We must learn to shoot down our only real enemies, the bosses and their servants, the fascists.

The silk factory in Novisad employs about 300 girls between the age of 10 and 24 years. Older workers are not engaged, so as to keep down wages. The pay for a 10-11 hour day is between 10 and 25 dinars, only a small number of workers getting the highest pay. Children and very young girls earn on an average of 10-15 dinars a day.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden. — In preparation for the Second International Meet of Workers and Farmers Children in Europe, there is being held a frontier meet between the Finnish and Swedish workers children in Haparanda, Sweden. At this frontier meet the children of North Finland and North Sweden will meet to demonstrate together against the white terror in Finland the war preparations of the Swedish and Finnish Bosses (Bourgeoisie) against the Soviet Union. This frontier meet is to be combined with a camp in which Finnish as well as Swedish children will participate.

This camp will be a great success because there should be very little language difficulties since there are many in each country that know the language of the other. Such a camp will be of tremendous political importance. Not only will the Pioneers and the leaders have an opportunity of exchanging experiences, they will also be able to demonstrate that the Scandinavian proletarian children are not affected by the national differences, but that the Swedi.h and Finnish workers' and peasants' children have the same interests and want to carry on together their struggle against the common enemy—the Bosses.
