## LIEBKNECHT DAY VITAL FACTOR AS **WORLD HEAD FOR ANOTHER WAR**

He Said: "Turn Your Weapons Against Your Common Enemy".

T no time so much as now did the young workers and farmers struggles of Carl Liebknecht.

American marines are in China and Nicaragua. In Nicaragua they have overthrown the government, set up a puppet government suitable for Wall Street, and are at work shooting and bombing those Nicaraguans who refuse to accept Wall Street as master. In China the armed forces of the United States helped

the reactionary butchers (the socalled "Nationalists") repress the workers and farmers in Canton and CANTON SOVIETS are now encouraging and supporting them while they wallow in the blood of the Chinese masses, while they run wild in the most brutal frenzy of murder and destruction. In Europe, the United States is the backbone of attacks that are being planned and prepared by the capitalist governments against the Soviet Union of the united front of the imperialist powers against the First Workers Republic. Right here in America troops and militia are in action against the striking miners in Colorado, where they have already taken their toll in murder-and they are ready to fall into action in the mine fields of Pennsy vania and Ohio.

Not a day goes by-not an hourthat American militarism is not thrown into action against the workers and farmers of other countries who are fighting for or who have won their freedom.

This is what Liebknecht taught us -that militarism is a tool of the bankers and bosses to "protect their interests"—that is to fight the workers --at home and abroad.

Liebknecht also taught us that the youth, who are the greatest sufferers from militarism, who are called upon first of all to go out and fight for the interests of the bosses, the youth must first of all take up the fight against militarism.

Liebknocht showed that militarism is part and parcel of capitalism as a whole and that the struggle against militarism is a struggle against capitalism. Finally to des. by militarism we must destroy capitalism root and branch.

Liebknecht showed that what we must fight against is capitalist militarism, the militarism the capitalists use to fight for their interests at the expense of the workers. We are not against fighting in general, Liebknecht told us, we are not pacifists. But we believe that the workers and Young workers should fight for their own interests against the bosses and not for the bosses' interests. "You \* diers at the front, you workers at har". ## Litvinoff Shows Up Disarmament Farce At G**eneva Mee**t

Claiming that war was an inevitable part of the capitalist system, Litvineff. delegate from the Soviet Union to the Preparatory Disarmament Conference, showed plainly hat the League of Nations had only been playing with words when it came to disarmament, and that when any steps towards disarming were approved when it came to deeds nothing

The indignation expressed by the delegates representing the imperialist powers that Litvinoff should propose actual disarmament at a disarmament conference further showed un all the "peace" talk in its true light. In fact the delegates from the Soviet Union, attending their first conference, made the first proposal for actual disarmament ever made in recent years, of which the present one is the fourth.

In a supplementary report distributed to the delegates, Litvinoff further exposed the fake gestures towards disarmament by quoting figures to show that there has been a general increase rather than a decrease in armaments. He gave figures to show that the armies of the world are now 1,183,000 greater than in 1913. Military budgets of all the principal countries with the exception of Russia and Germany exceed pre-war figures, while expenditures of five principal maritime powers for 1925 exceeded 1918 by £130,300,000. ### CLEVELAND YOUTH MUST UNEMPLOYED JOIN IN FIGHT FOR "WORK OR FOOD"

## Thousands Marching Streets at Present Time

By M. K., Young Worker Correspondent.

CLEVELAND, Ohio.—That high salaried gang of war propagandists, the authorities in charge of army and navy recruiting, are at present engaged in a drive for new recruits here. Thousands of young workers here are jobless and walk the streets, so in every crowded spot, in stitutions such as the post office, etc., the militarists have established their recruiting stations.

Signs are put up which pictures life in the service as a paradise. They Annual Xmas Bunk have the audacity to exhibit a sign which says: "Join our army." But the Cleveland Plain Dealer in its editorial on Dec. 3 lets the cat out of the beg when it says: "Armies are neoded for police duties, navies have functions quite apart from offensive wars." Exactly, the "army" is not "ours" but belong to the boss ruling class and is used against the workers in strikes. The "navy" is used to shoot down the workers in Latin America and China.

Now they must join the Cleveland Unemployed Council together with the adult workers and fight the city administration for "Work or Food."


HURTS ME MORE THAN YOU

# PLUMBERS'HELPER FINDS SPEED-UP **MEANS LOST JOB**

By Plumbers Helper.

The bosses at all times are awaiiing the opportunity to exploit the workers. The plumbing trades is not an exception to this condition. While the building trades unions are undergoing an attack at present, the plumbers and helpers through their valiant strike of three months have shown that the strength of Labor is not dead. We, who are in the Building Trades realize that there is no work being done at present in the building line, that less than 10 per cent of the workers are working.

My boss, Nat Rosen, plumbing contractor of Brooklyn, through the bosses association, knows this fact. On Saturday, we workers finished work at 12 o'clock and were waiting for the boss to give us our week's wages or the job. A little after 12 the foreman called up the office and he was informed to send the workers to the office for their pay. It was immediately sensed by all that such a sum-

mons meant but one thing, a layoff After waiting for a couple of hours by which time all the plumbers and helpers were congregated at the office the boss made a speech. A speech by the boss meant just one thing, a reprieve. And such it proved to be. The boss promised the men that if they would work harder to finish the jobs they were working on at present he would not reduce the pay, neither would he fire any of the men, the only work he (boss) has at present the men are now finishing.

The boss stated that through figuring less profits he expects to get a big job, the Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn at which all the plumbers and helpers could be employed upon. In other words, working hard to finish the old jobs all the men now employed will be steadily exploited for the next year, on the hospital job.

Results of the speech was that when the plumbers and helpers went back to work on Monday they immediately speeded up the work. Three weeks later when all the work was done the boss did not have the hospital job, and most of the men were laid off.

Edward P. Warner, Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Aeronautics, recently wailed over the fact that commercial aircraft have a small chance of being used in war, at a meeting of the Society of Automobile Engineers held at the Waldorf-Astoria. But he did not lose any faith in the possibilities of transforming commercial aircraft factories into military plane producing factories in a relatively short space of time. This faith is, no doubt, based on the very concrete knowledge that such a thing will

On the one hand Mr. Warner believes it not likely that commercial planes will be converted into military planes, they will be used only (own emphasis-D. G.) for rapid transport of men (soldiers-D. G.) supplies (munitions-D. G.) mails or passengers. On the other hand he "urges that commercial manufacturers familiarize themselves with military requirements." How innocent! Perhaps he thinks that he can fool the workers as to the real, militaristic, nature of his plans.

The case becomes clearer when Mr. Warner makes one or two practical suggestions. Since commercial planes are light they cannot be used as military planes can for heavier purposes than those of mail, etc.; bombing for example. However, the already existing commercial planes which are light may be transformed into a flying boat, "useful for both civil and military service." Enthusiastic with this discovery he goes further with his war designs. "There are today in the United States, airplane factories that never have built a military airplane or sold a machine of any kind for military or naval purposes, but which possess in the aggregate the capacity to-turn out within four months, at a conservative (!) estimate, 500 airplanes suitable for a considerable range of training activities. . .

We shouldn't be surprised if our militaristic boosters for a new war turn baby carriages into tubs for army metorcycles. If anyone fails to see war preparations going on, as typified by the above quotations, he is plain cock-eyed.

## ANTI-BOY SCOUT DRIVE

By WILLIAM RUST Sec'y British Y. C. L.

TN A recent article I described how Baden-Powell, Chief of the Boy Scouts, made an appeal for £50,000 from the "wealthy citizens" of London in order to fight the young Communists.

That following our reply to this atover." I went in the name of the Young Communist League not in order to "talk things over" but in order ing. to utilize the opportunity for strengthening our campaign against the Scout Movement.

The following is an account of the discussion based on the report of the Y. C. L. stenographer.

I first of all attacked Baden-Powell on the hypocrisy of declaring that the Scout Movement is non-political, whilst at the same time appealing for £50,000, in order to fight the Young Communists. He tried to evade this question by stating that he had not said anything of the kind to the fellow who arranged the "Daily Telegraph" interview.

I told him he could not get away with it so easily. The "Daily Telegraph" had bluntly blurted out the real aim of the Scout movement, knowing that that was the way to get money out of the "wealthy citizens." He had allowed the interview to go unchallenged; he could not dodge responsibility by denying in private what he had said in public.

I then offered him the opportunity of clearly stating his position by pubto Gary, Ind. Gary is a great steel licly debating with me on the question "The Scout Movement should not be supported by the working youth.." He refused on the grounds that he did not believe in tulking. Yet this man had written to me "Let us talk, let us argue, let us coeperate!"

When we got on to talking about the war danger, I asked what advice would be given the scouts in the event of a war between Britain and the Soviet Union. "I should tell them to serve their country!" was Baden-Powell's reply. I told him that Soviet Russia is the only country of the young workers and the motherland of the working-class. We would tell the young workers to defend Workers' Russia and to smash the Baldwin Government.

On the Russian question, it is important to quote another significant statement made by the General. I asked what he meant by stating to the press that he would not disclose Moscow's efforts to destroy his movement for fear of "imperilling some of our people in Russia." Here are the verbatim notes:

"Who are the people in Russia who would be imperilled?"

"I cannot tell you!" "Who are they?"

"I cannot tell you. After all, you would not tell me, would you? I will not tell you; but there are certain people there engaged in certain

MADE several attempts to try and get him down to what the Scout movement was prepared to do for the young miners young textile workers. and the victims of the Blanesburgh Report. Would he help the young workers to resist wage reductions? He evaded this question by saying that such matters were "outside his scope." He was not interested in politics or trial accidents in Illinois in the month

Yet Scout rule 2 says: " A Scou is loyal to the King, his country, n'e officers, his parents, his employers, and those under him."

On the question of the Scout attitude to the General Strike, the Chief Scout said, "I thought it was a silly thing; the workers were cutting their own throats." He added that the Scouts participated in the volunteer services organized by the government, tack he invited me to "talk things and that Scouts supported anyone in distress. This "distress" stunt is quite a good pretense for strike break-

I asked him if he knew that the "wealthy citizens" to whom he had appealed to help the slum boys were the people who were really responsible for the existence of the slums. Further, that it was not surprising that the people who made millions out of alum conditions were prepared to give him £50,000 so that the slum boys would become supporters of the slums, and loyal to their employers. The Chief Scout said "It would be difficult to say whether they were or not."

It may be difficult for him to say, but we know why the owner of the "Daily Mail," Lord Rothermere, gave £5,000, and why bankers, big bosses, Tory M. P.'s Generals and Admirals figure prominently in their subscription list. They regard the scouts as good insurance against class consciousness.

A "Magnificent" Empire.

SUBSEQUENTLY, we discussed the Scout attitude to the Empire, and I quoted his statement that "it was a magnificent Empire over which the Union Jack flies." I asked him if he persisted in his attitude in view of the child slave revelations in Southern Rhodesia and exposed in the statement of the Anti-Slavery and Aborigines Protection Society. He said he knew nothing about that, but "slavery was not bad for some people," and he "was sure that the 300,000,000 natives in India who had no voice in the Government were satisfied and content."

I pointed out that the children worked underground in the Indian mines, and that women worked twelve hours per day in the Bombay cotton mills. Further, that two out of three babies born in that city die in their first year. Yet, in the face of these facts he persisted in declaring that "it was a magnificent Empire and he would continue to tell the Scouts that it was so.'

Why Bosses Support.

THIS interview has served to confirm the original contention of the Y. C. L. that the Scout movement is controlled and financed by the bosses in order to delude the young workers into supporting militarism and poison their minds against their own class. The movement is entirely in the hands I militarists, conservative M. P.'s 🏗 nanciers and capitalists, who, under the pretext of being non-political, indulge in the most outrageous lying political propaganda.

The leaders of the Scout movement conceal the fact that capitalism is responsible for the misery and poverty of the youth and preach that it is an excellent system of society. They teach boys to be loyal slaves of the employers, they praise the army and navy, and advise the boys to join up; they are against strikes and the struggles of the trade unions, they disguise the "slave-pen" character of the Empire, and lie about the glories of the Commonwealth. They lie about the aims of the Communists and prevent the young workers from getting the ruth about Soviet Russia.

We are continuing our hig campaign against the Scout movement.

CONDITIONS and treatment of soldiers and sailors serving in the armed forces in America are very little known except for the sweet phrases uttered by the incruiting officers in trying to lure down-and-out young workers into the service of the Wall Street bosses. However, in spite of all the measures undertaken by the government to prevent the true facts of the treatment in the army and navy from becoming known outside, many cases of maltreatment have already been exposed at different times.

The capitalist press always praises veterans who fought for Old Glory but when cases of maltreatment are nade known no comments can be found in the press. In order to show he treatment the soldiers get for the good and faithful service to Wall Street the incident of William J. (Prien, ex-service man and veteran the army. of the Indian Wars, will serve as a oright illustration.



On Dec. 14th news was received that the reactionary forces attacked Canton late the night before and recaptured certain sections. Here the blood bath of the revolutionaries commenced. When the Communist International received the news of the peactionary victory it declared: "If the reports of the counter revolutionary victory at Canton are true, the victory cannot be stable and lasting." When the reaction got the upper hand in Canton the whole fury of the Chinese bourgeoisie, aided by the foreign imperialists, was hurled against the revolutionary masses.
