The chief problems were: First, to draw into League work the great portion of our membership that recently came into the League, particularly from the ranks of the textile and coal mining industries. Second, to carry through a wide ideological and organizational campaign among the ! membership on the importance of organizing shop nuclel as our basic form of organization. Third, to overcome the hesitancy, or slowness of our membership in recruiting. Fourth, to swing the League's activ , principally among the industrial workers, through the in-Methons' Young Workers over 21! General Hanson B. E.y. Communal jutation of shop campaigns, issu-

cussions, were of great interest, While the "out of town" units are particularly because they all pointed to the splendid opportunities before the League, in the development of shop activity building of shop nuclei, and taking leadership of masses of young workers. Indeed a review of the discussion at all conferences, is the best evidence of the fact that our membership is beginning to turn its face outward to the working youth more energetically.

New Comrades Activized

It is particularly note worthy, that the chief participants at the conferences, especially those that brought the best shop reports, were comrades who are comparatively new members in the League. This is only natural when we consider, that most of those members that have been coming into our

MASSES IN INDIA DEFEAT BILL AIMED AT RADICALS

John Simon Praises MacDonald

The pressure of the revolutionary masses was so strong that the Indian Legislative Assembly was forced to reject the "Public Safety Bill", under which the government of India would have had the power to deposi foreign "agitators", without trial and on "evidence" which neither the arrested persons nor their lawyers would have been permitted to see. The Indian Nationalist bourgeoisie did not support this bill, not because they wanted to protect the "foreign agitators," but because they feared it would be used against them.

Meanwhile the Sir Simon Commension, which is investigating Inman conditions, and which is expected to report that the Indians are better off without independence, has returned to India. As an answer to the protest that there was not a single Indian member on this commission, the Viceroy has nominated a Rajah, four Knights, a Bombay financier and one or two other "safe" representatives of the Indian hourgeoisie. Sir John Signa praised the invaluable services of Mr. J. Ramsay MacDonald (the Morris Hilquit of Great Britain) before he left for India.

TEXTILE YOUTH

THE FIRST convention of the National Textile Workers Union will go down in the history of the textile industry as a real turning point in the truggle of the workers.

The convention started September 23rd and ended on the 24th. Two days of compact work in which the basis for a real militant union was said. At this convention one could see the representatives of the fighting workers of New Bedford and Fall River. The fighting textile workers. of Passaic were represented by Gus Deak, Eli Keller, Ellen Dorson and others. Old fighters like Jim Reed, of 40 years standing in the textile industry were also present.

Officers Elected

Jim Reed was elected President of the new union. Albert Weis bord of Passaic was elected National Secretary, Gus Deak, President of the Passaic local was elected Second Vice President, Bill-Murdock, leader of the New Bed-

tion, women and youth committee. The youth committee had a full attendance. Jack Rubenstein, youth organizer of the New Bedford strike reported on the youth problems. There is a general impression that Washington is entirely free from sweat shops and that it is an "ideal" spot with most favorable conditions for the workers. The truth, however, is quite the contrary. If we take the National Pants Shop, for an example, we find that conditions here are just as miserable as in any other shop of any industrial city. There are 150 workers in this shop, most of whom are young and many of whom are young Negroes. The highest wage here is \$16 a week, but the majority of the workers receive \$10 to \$12 a week. Many receive even as low a sum as \$6 and \$8. The boss at the Pants Shop finds that the simplest method of exploitation is piece work, and this speed-up system destroys so much of their energy, that if one week a worker makes "as much as" \$14, he becomes so exhausted that by next week he receives the meagre bit of only \$8. Efficiency is the motto of the National Pants Shop boss. Though the workers are paid by piece work. if they are only 10 minutes late they are not permitted to enter the shop at all. Such slave-driving are his tactics that if a girl is ill and stays away from the shop for a day, he gets after her, fearing that she'll quit altogether.
