MAY DAY

MAY First is the day of international solidarity of enemy-the capitalist class. May First was born in the historic struggle of the American working class for the eight hour day in 1886. May 1st, 1930, is of utmost importance to the young

workers of the United States. The economic crisis start-ing last November still exists, and with increased intensity. Nearly 2,000,000 young workers are out of work. The bosses are intensifying the speed-up, lowering wages, and lengthening the hours of employment.

At the same time, the bosses are feverishly preparing for enother imperialist blood-bath. The Naval Conference resulted in increased antagonisms between the vari-ous imperialist powers especially England and America. The imperialists are also preparing to destroy the Soviet Union, the only government of the workers and peasants. The tremendous strides forward in industrialization the success of peasant collectives, the 7-hour work day, are all salt on the wounds of world imperialism. They want to destroy the Soviet Union because it is a Workers Republic, and because of its rich markets.

Republic, and because of its rich markets. The young workers on May Day must conduct mass political strikes in all industries. "Food Rotten, Men Sick", Writes Soldier

Ft. Slocum, N. Y. Editor Young Worker: Men are sent to Fort Slocum to await ships going to foreign

service (China, Hawaii, Philippines, Panama). They are herded into barracks like sheep in a pen. Two or three men occupy the space of one. There is sel dom any heat in the harranke and men are being brought out on stretchers every day. Such sickness as tonsilitis annendicitis, flu, etc., are treated with a dose of salt, while more serious illnesses are allowed to stay in the gold-buck ward for a few days and then returned to duty.

Always Broke.

S. to build 185,000 tons of destroyers; 160,000 tons of cruisers of 10,000 tons each; 70,000 tons of light cruisers; 30,000 tons_ submarines, and 9,000 tons of aircraft carriers. This program will total over a billion dollars.
