



The efforts of the Socialist youth organizations to resort to radical talk made it necessary for the Plenum to declare that our object must be to reach the youth under the influence of the "socialist" leaders, to involve them in our fighting united front and to expose every effort on the part of these leaders to disrupt the fighting unity of the youth.

As a result of mass activities among the youth the Plenum emphasized that the Leagues must be transformed into a mass organization, much larger than the Party, within the shortest possible time.

In the struggle to win the majority of the working class youth it is necessary not only to recruit widely for the Y.C.L. but to organize the youth (who are not yet ready for the League) into every possible form of workers' organizations, in the first place within the unions and unemployed organizations. 



CLÉVELAND, Ohio. - Undernourishment and semi-starvation are the common lot of the unem ployed youth in the crisis. These facts were brought out in an in-terview with Colonel Hawely, in charge of recruiting for the "Re forestration Camps" in Cleveland

In reply to the question of what the general health condition of the unemployed youth evamine at the camps was, Colonel Hawely said. "Most of the boys had pret ty good frames, but no flesh cover the hones.'

The average weight of the boys was 120 lbs, for an average height of 5 ft. 8 in. The percentage of defective eyes and in sufficient teeth gave added proof to the slow starvation of the un employed youth.

However the reports of diseas in the camps, as a result of the poor food and rotten condition in the camps, show that the health of the boys will not b unless the youth in the camp organize and put up a fight fo better conditions.
