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The Blackleg of the Future.

From a Paper read to the Johannesburg I.S.L.

BY MRS. C. BARNET.

A friend of mine, absent from England for a period of about 30 years, asked on his return what change was most noticeable. replied "In the women certainly". The soft, clinging, dependent, somewhat baby-woman of the Victorian Age had disappeared, and in her place there was a new being a bright, alert, intelligent; caa public woman with interests no longer bounded by the narrow confines of the home. This change, so obvious to a stranger, is the more remarkable in so much as it has taken place and is continuing to take place almost unnoticed by the masculine mind which continues to believe, if it gives the matter a thought at all, that development can proceed along sex lines; and curiously enough, many Socialists who would scorn to be confined by the narrow boundaries of nationalism are quite prepared to dawdle on permitting wonland to remain hampered and undeveloped on account of her economic and social dependence on man. I know of many woman whose husbands are ardent workers for Socialism, who are quite, ignorant of the importance of those teachings to the propagation of which. their husbands devote all their leisure. That the status of woman and the status of labour are intimately connected, and that there can be no emancipation without equality of the sexes are facts that Socialists are slow to grasp.

Seven Million Woman Workers.

In England there are over seven millions of women workers and they are gradually becoming organised not with the help of, but in spite of the men. The war has forced women into employments never dreamt of before, she has fought her way into every sphere of human activity, and the exploiting class, knowing her ability to live more cheaply than man, has eagerly seized the opportunity of securing cheaper labour.

After the war, we are told matters will right themselves, but I can see no such prospect. Employers, obedient to popular outcry, will probably displace the women and fill their places with men working at the same wage as the women received. The women, refused admittance to the Trades Unions (The A.S.E. supposed to be the most progressive of Unions has just refused them admittance) will be forced to offer themselves at a still lower wage—that or prostitution—and so the game will go on until the subsistence point has been reached.

Greater Profits irom Women.

Industries wholly or partially run by women suffer exploitation much more than others. For instance in Iron and Steel Factories, Building and Contracting Trades, and Engineering Works the net output per person averages from 33½% to 40% in excess of the average annual wage. In Laundry Works, Cotton, Linen and Hemp Factories the excess amounts from 75% to 100%. This excess is of course gross profit, and shows the temptation to the

employer to engage female labour. The war has proved that the field of woman's activities has been largely extended, and the result of her exclusion from Trade Unions will certainly mean the curtailment of wages in many trades previously confined to men.

Thorny Path to Freedom.

As woman therefore become proficient in the new trades and industries in which they are now engaged their employment will increase: Thanks, not to her exploited brethren, but to the exploiter himself, she is now on the way to a greater measure of freedom than she has ever possessed. The pity is that this freedom must needs be reached by way of the stormy path of waye slavery.

If women are willing to sacrifice so much for such a little thing as a vote, what will happen when economic necessity (resultant from warf forces them into conflict with men. There are many who believe that after this war is over, a new order of things will be established. I agree; but it will be affected by influences they wor not of. The day of sex antagonism, (which is only peculiar to hughan beings) is drawing near, and the crudely material social order developed by men will never be disestablished until Socialism, to use the words of Daniel de Leon "arises like a mightier Perseus and strikes the shackles from the chained Andromeda of modern society, Woman, and raises her to the dignity of her sex."

Woman International.

Women's Inclined to think I have exaggerated the power women will exercise after this war I would lisk them to consider the mission of the Women's International Congress held at the Hague in April and May of last year. Little piominence of course, was given to it by the pro-war press, but nevertheless it was a remarkable gathering. 12 Countries (Bolligerent and Neutral) were represented by over 1100 delegates. 150 Societies numbering hundreds of thousands of women twere represented. Others, such as the Women's Co-operative Guild (England 32,000 members) and the Italian Union of Women Workers 24,000 members, League of Women Teachers U.S.A. 20,000, and Societies in Ireland, Bulgaria and Portugal, unable to be represented, sent greetings.

Thus has arisen a new International movement—a movement led by keen, clever, educated women—women opposed to War and Militarism certainly, but not yet, wholly imbued with the spirit of Socialism. Rejected politically and industrially by the male workers of the world, the women workers have banded themselves together—have chosen their leaders, and are on the way to a more perfect state of organisation than any existent body. It may be that the spirit of International Comrades up—will kill out the competitive spirit of commercial and Imperial rivalry, and help the nations to live together in peace. It may be that the new economic forces that will influence our daily lives will show the Women's Organisations of the future the futility of the sex-war, and awaken the male worker to his blindness. As co-workers only can they reach the co-operative commonwealth that means the abolition of the sexfdom of Labour, and the sexfdom of woman.

It's your country when there's fighting to be done, but when dividends are declared the bosses seem to own it all.

Wall Street Dominates the World.

Poor, silly Europe, out to destroy Gérman militarism, it says, and destroying millions of the best of her sons, and all her liberties, in the process. For what?

The German and British cats quarrelled over some cheese and the American monkey offered to weigh it out for them; conditions being that he bites off for himself from the heavier side of the scales. Unlike the cats in the lable, these cats are too busy tearing each others wool off to see that the monkey is gobbling up all the cheese in the process of weighing.

Allied finance; in its greed to capture German trade, is delivering Europe bound hand and foot to a still greater power, the power of American Plutocracy, looming like a big spectre unawares behind.

Coming down to tin tacks, Britain has three million men more or less under arms. For every man under arms it is estimated that at least two are required at home to equip and feed him.

Even Great Britain's resources are not equal for this task. So the American workers have to produce munitions and foodstuffs to be fired off in Flanders, and they are working day and night.

Their masters, Morgan, Schwab & Co. are reaping harvests beyond the dreams, though not equal to the lust, of capitalist avarice.

Morgan floated the two hundred million loan to the . Allies, and netted ten million dollars commission on the deal.

The loan was paid over direct to the Munition Concerns, also Morgan, Schwab & Co., for vast quantities of armaments for Britain, and Morgan nets more profits.

Then these munitions are shipped over Morgan's railways.
Not being a benign English Capitalist, he bags what remains of his own two hundred million dollar loan in freights.

That's finance, and Morgan's corporations have consequently money to burn, and some of the most rotten investments of Wall Street have become gilt edged.

To carry on, England (or say rather. English Capitalism is compelled to mortgage its power over the labour of the British workers for ever and a day. Why? Because they are burning up more wealth in the holocausts of Flanders than Britain can produce, nay, they are burning up stored-up wealth painfully gathered by the co-operative labour of generations pasts.

To make up, America has already supplied the Allies with material to the value of 1600,000,000 dollars more than she has received from them. So far their credit is good; that is, the industry and resource of the workers of Europe promises Morgan a tolerably secure return. When Morgan, Schwab & Co., think that England is overdrawing on her credit, they will have to stop the war.

The end of the war will find American Capitalism bloated and arrogant, the Allied countries dependent upon the financial control of Wall Street.

This is not all. The plemands of war-mad Governments has sucked investments away from/reproductive industries to war securities. The result is that great wealth producing undertakings are being quoted at low figures.

Wall Street, wallowing in the huge surplus values gained from the sweat of American and the blood of British workers, is grabbing up these stocks all over the world, Russia and the Argentine especially,—Argentine, hitherto wholly run by British Capital.

American finance wants an army and a navy: and the American people are now in the throes of an agitation for "national preparedness." We are told that "the initial victory, in the shape of a billion dollar loan, is assured." Thus, the hundreds of new munition plants raised to meet the demands of the war will not be allowed to go idle.

Poor "Evening Chronicle," British Citizens and other petty trafficers, with your tupenny-hapenny schemes of docking a German barber here and there, this is what you and yours have done, this is what you have asked the mothers of Europe to give their sons for, sweethearts to renounce their loving promise, strong men their life blood, intellect to be patter its genius in gory mud, for this, you despicables, the enthronement of American plutocracy in dominion over the world. Only Socialism can cope with the bigger evil.

"The Interpreter."

We find it necessary to notice "The Interpreter" not because it is a new publication, but because it is a new apparition. It is the ghost of middle class sentimentality objecting to the burial of the corpse.

The apparation sometimes invade Labour Parties and Trade Union Branches. So let us nail him here to scare the crows.

"The Interpreter" says it represents Afrikander Nationalism. It says so in articles signed "John Bull," and in editorial notes gushing over the glories of the British Empire in best Bottom-ley journalese. Any kind of a "muffler" that will drown the explosions of the class struggle, is interpretable by it into one word "nationalism."

Society is becoming more and more openly a struggle of classes. The forces of the exploiters and of the exploited are marshalling for a clash ever postponed by wars and other digressions, but made finally more gigantic by every postponement.

The middle class squeals in between. Its members, politically impotent, ally themselves with one side or the other; or they take refuge in ancient sentimentality, high-sounding hollownesses, and alliances with the backward pastoral elements of a community, crying "a plague on both your houses." Such is "The Interpreter."

Workers rejoice, here is its charter of deliverance for yourMaking conditions of labour such that it may provide a suitable and happy career for any
self-respecting citizen, creating a feeling of confidence, sympathy between employers and
employed, establishing confidence in the sympathy of the government and its sincere-care for
the workers interests, with due regard to the interests of employers, creating a feeling on the
part of the workers of content for the present and confidence for the future."

"Strange ministrant! of undescribed sounds, that come a-swooning over hollow grounds!!"

"Organisation of industry on the orthodox Socialist lines" is not what "The Interpreter" wants. "It would be unprofitable to advocate it in the columns of a journal concerned with the affairs of to-day."..." And yet some kind of organisation and regulation we must have." Don't exactly know yet, but you will find it in the word "nationalism."

Not Socialism, but "nationalism in industrial affairs" is what the workers need. When you get the sack or your wages docked, say "Abracadabra Nationalism," better than bile beans.

"The class war...is a disgrace to our national intelligence," but "will be heard of no more when we begin to regard industry as a national concern." "Nationalism" boys, "nationalism." Christ riding the storm was not in it with this magic word.

The identity of interest between employers and employed, so persistently recognised in the ry, and so the grandy violated in practice, is a sober reality after all, and not a beautiful but impossible dream."

Indeed, my dear brethren, let the workers learn to feel the vacuity in their rebellious bellies gratefully assuaged at the profits that pour into the maw of their benevolent masters.


The word Internationalism means nothing except as the unity of the workers transcending all boundaries for their emancipation from the savage dualism of employer and employed.

VIII. WILFRID HARRISON.

Seventy five per cent of the prominent anti-militarists of South Africa served in the Boer war. Few of them were even confessed Socialists in those days. How many Socialists are going to emerge from the present unprecedented holocausts?



Wilfrid Harrison of Capetown, the most "ethereal" of our anti-militarits, went through the Boer war as a N.C.O. in the Coldstreams. It is a pleasure to give a snapshot, rough though it be, of our Capetown fellow-worker.

Comrade Harrison was one of the founders of the Capetown Social Democratic Federation in 1904.

At the death of King Edward. he first experienced the hostility of

the mob when he compared the lamentations over the death of the Potentate with the notice taken of the death of a poor man at

Claremont the same day whose passing would be a tragedy to his destitute dependents.

Later in Pretoria hestook a hand in reviving the Socialist Society. The great stilike of 1914 found him in Capetown jail and a fine of £50 over his head. At the beginning of the war he was again arrested for saving Botha is doing now what he did in the strike, asking workers to shoot down other workers. He was put on his good behaviour, which endured to last December. when he was again fined £3 for making speeches on the war likely to lead to a breach of the peace.

While commercialism has no value for the qualities that make a Socialist, and Capitalism finds it necessary to execrate and distort them, where shall our comrades be made khown to one another if not on the

pages of their own paper.

Wilfrid Harrison has, a fervour and an exaltation in his Socialism which cannot fail to impress. This is how a Capetown conrade describes him. "Marxians." Therefore Anti-War.

According to the daily Press. "when the evote for the war gredit of £20,000,000 was discussed in the Bulgarian Chamber Socialists Party abstained from voting, and the Marxian Socialists voted against the credit.

The peoples of Europe are getting acquaintance with terms of Socialism and with the names of the deaders of Socialism that they would not have got intwenty years of peace,

Why is it that, being Marxian Socialists. they could not but vote against the war credits? The Marxian theory is a scientifie system, -- by the ordinary kabourite regarded. as a cold, detached, bookish affair; strange that this should supply the resistance to war when all the people fed on the pacifist sentiment and humanitarian ethics of generations, nav centuries, should recoil before its power.

We have no record yet of any British Socialist voting against war credits. Is it because the I.L.P. is not Marxian, is not sure that there is an inexorable class strug-

Does it follow, when only Marxian Socialists can muster up courage to vote against war cradits, that to be really anti-war is to be Marxian? It is important to know be-

One of the two greatest minds of the last century was Darwin. He placed the theory of evolution on an unassailable basis. It was one of the great generalisations of history. Oh, are you ready to swim in blood. A cable received by the Federation By its help scientists have discovered conti-

call him bookish, and 'scientifie' and 'unpractical." Still more laughable would it be to hear of a biologist starting investigations into forms of life without bothering to enquire what Darwin said or did in the matter.

Well, the other great mind of the last century was Karl Marx. He also formulated vast generalisations which have shaken the foundations of centuries. Aveling was a friend of both Darwin and Marx, but more intimate with the former. He affirmed that Marx had a more universal sweep of mind than Darwin. He knew all Darwin knew. and more. As Darwin smashed the superstitions of ecclesiasticism, so Marx smashed the systems of the economists of property. He founded Socialism as a science. What is a fine physique by his unceasing endeacours for it in the domains of thought and action. His great hammer strokes resound through the hell of capitalism and tell its doom. To him we owe the certitude of our case. To him we owe that Socialists can defy the overawing power of capitalism in war, and all permanent victories for the workers are gained on the principles he laid down.

Is it not then the first duty of Socialists. not goodhumouredly affect to tolerate the manie of the man. But to love him and how at dismelhory. This cambest be done by broadly acquaining ourselves with his teaching. To assimilate the whole depth of his thoughts is the slow work of a life-time, so said Schaffle. the foremost anti-Socialisi writer of the age.

It had been holdly predicted by some of the early Christians that the conversion of the world would lead to the establishment of perpetual peace. In looking back, with our pres air experience, we are driven to the melancholy conclusion that, instead of dime nishing the number of wars, occlosiastical in thience has actually and very seriously increased it. We may look in vain for any period since Constantine, in which the Cler gy, as a body, exerted themselves to repress the military spirit, or to prevent, or abridge a particular war, with an energy at all comparable to that which they displayed in stimulating the fanaticism of the Crusaders, in producing the atrocious massacre of the Albigenses, in embittering the religious contests that followed the Reformation.

With the exception of Mohammedanism, no other religion has done so much to produce war as was done by the religious teachers of Christendom during several centuries. The peace principles (of Christianity) that were so common before Constantine, have found scarcely an echo except from Erasmus. the Anabaptists and the Quakers, and although some very important pacific agencies have arisen out of the industrial progress of modern times, these have been, for the most part, wholly unconnected with, and have in some cases been directly opposed to theological interests.

Socialism Must Act.

The Socialists entered into parliament as a forum for propaganda. Through intense and one-sided parliamentary activity they drifted into reconciliation with the capitalist state. More and more they came around to the view that the overthrow of capitalism and the e-tablishment of Socialism are fine phrases for propaganda, but could not be considered at all as practical; that the entire mission of Socialism Rás to go into parliament and there work for the betterment of the conditions of the working class.

The Socialists came to work against the capitalist state and stayed there to work with

August fourth, nineteen fourteen, startled the Socialists of the world out of their self-sufficiency. It struck them painfully to their hearts that the movement of great promise showed no fulfillment. What happenied? Did the Socialist movement fail.? No, the Socialist movement did not fail. It is here more vital and abiding than ever.

Did political Socialism fail?

No: pelitical Socialism did not fail. was never tried.

What did fail was parliamentary Socialism pure and simple.

We learn now that parliamentary Socialism will not suffice alone.

We are in the midst of a militaristic era. And in a militaristic state militarisen dominates the parliament. Parliamentarism is effective only when backed by force, actual or potential. Without force it is futile.

There is no seepwho can read in the stars the future course of the war even one year ahead. It may suddenly come to an end in a stale-mate. But also it may continue and spread, involving practically all man-Rell up! kind. A sudden termination would be merely an armistice, with mililarism rampant and dominating the world. A prolonged conflict may-engulf civilization and liberty.

What shall be done?

The answer is Act!

In this world crisis the Socialist movement must act. Or it is absolutely of no avail.

Socialist action must be political action in the full sense of the word. Against capitalist militarism the Socialists must oppose Socialist in litaricy. Aggression must be met by industrial force.

To the capitalist appeal for the defence of the country, the Socialists must answer with an appeal for the defense of mankind.

The Third International must ofganise the Defense League of the Human Race.

the standard of the militaristic Moloch and rally under the standard of Man. The rallying cry should be -- Peace and Liberty! Death to Militarism!

declare merely that we are opposed to war; that we desire to end the war.

We must act.

We must organize Peace and Liberty, as well, and as efficiently as War and Tyranny are organized. In parliament and out of parliament, wherever men congregate, we must sound the try?" appeal for Peace and Liberty.

We must act.

Our action must be organized internationally. It will not do to call strikes in one country so as to help the militarism of another. It will not do to paralyze the military industries of the United States so as to help. Germany. It will not do to strike for shorter country: Socialism asks you to live for it.
